Bronte Receives Half Inch Of Rain During Past Week

The past seven days have been the driest week experienced by Bronte residents in some time. Only about .5 inch of rain has fallen here since last Thursday morning.

The half inch of rain fell in two showers, one Sunday night and an-

other Monday.

The year's total of more than 15 inches puts farms and ranches in this area in the best shape they have been in for many years and local people are looking for a good crop year.

Moisture has fallen this year without being accompanied by extremely violent weather, as it has in many places in the state. So far Bronte residents have not had the floods, tornadoes, hail, etc., which have plagued many sections of the state. Some hail damage was done east of town a few weeks ago, but most of the weather has been mild.

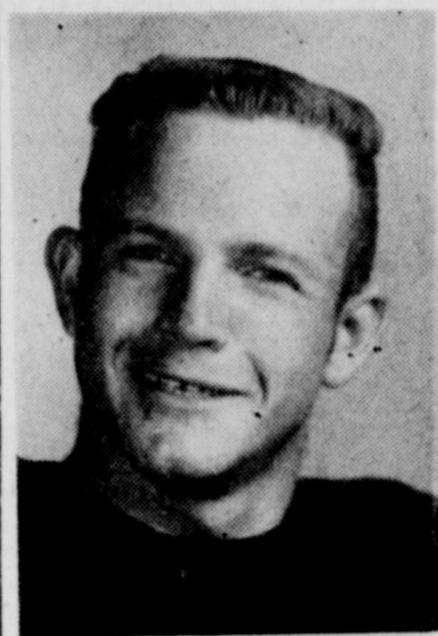

1514 Admissions To Swimming Pool

A whopping big number of 1514 admission had enjoyed the swimming pool in the new County Park here through Wednesday night. This is an average of 79.68 persons per day who have used the pool.

Aubrey Denman, park caretaker, said the admissions have been made in the following manner: by season pass, 730; by adult tickets, 118; and by student tickets, 666. He said 90 season passes have been sold for \$5.

Denman said he thought the number of pool users had been exceptionally high, particularly in view of the fact that "we really haven't had any swimming weather yet."

Quite a few persons are already using the park for picnics, also, Denman said. More picnic facilities are being added as fast as they can be built.

BUILDS 220 HOUSES HERE American Home Magazine's building editor, Hubbard Cobb, Saturday presented to Wynne, builder of 220 modern homes here, a citation award plaque recognizing the local builder's residence as one of three "Best Homes for the Money in Texas."

The other two Texas homes, in costlier brackets, are located in Houston. American Home readers and open house visitors will vote to determine which of the three rates "best for the money." The winner will be featured again in the January, 1958, issue of the magazine.

PRICE: \$12,350

The San Angelo prize winner is a three-bedroom, center-hall, 1½-bath home selling for \$12,350, with exterior predominantly brick.

The structure features a feeling of spaciousness in 1,110 square feet of living space. A center hall reduces traffic through the living room and makes for easy furniture arrangement. (The home is completely furnished by Shepperson's except for kitchen appliances installed by West Texas Utilities Co.)

Accordian doors, a frequent

Wynne-house feature, are used in many places to eliminate the dead area usually created by standard swing doors.

On the exterior, the predominantly brick walls, broken by oversized windows providing good cross-ventilation, and the spacious protected back yard, the wide carport with commodious outside storage are striking facts the open house visitors will observe.

As with many other houses in its medium-low price class, the Wynne home has an evaporative cooler to cope effectively with the hot summer months.

\$821 Puts Coke Far Over Quota In Cancer Drive

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor and Friends at Bronte,

As some of you know, for a week I have been considering going into the grocery business at Bronte. I had a lease on one of your buildings and the money up either to buy it out of restock it.

But under the circumstance I have decided not to do it.

Now let me pass a friendly word on to you.

"Pay your grocery bill! Pay it promptly and regularly. If you can't pay it all, go in there and pay something — fifty cents to fifty dollars. Better still pay cash.

Your grocery men have stood by you through all the drouth and hard times. You folks are not treating your grocery men right, or half right. They wouldn't say this to me or anybody else. But I know it is true and I am saying it.

In trading for a store or in buying merchandise in it there just one thing to do — right. Do you go into your home grocery and say "Charge it, please", then drive off down to San Angelo and come back with a car load of merchandise bought at cash prices? If so, you don't deserve the fine, capable, and faithful merchants who have made it possible for a lot of people to go through hard times and emergencies — people who charged for thirty days and owed it for thirty years, or at least six months, while the merchant struggled to keep his shelves stocked and paid interest on the money on which you and your family were eating.

Hal you noticed how tired your home town merchants look sometimes? Do you know that every grocery man in your town has offered to sell out at one time or another? Do you know why they get tired? If not, then it is time you knew why.

The thing that makes them tired is carrying that huge load of charge accounts you have piled on their backs. Borrow from your bank, not your grocery man. Then you can demand that he put his prices down two or three per cent, and you will save money — about \$1.50 per month on every one hundred dollars worth by paying interest at the bank, if your bank account runs a hundred dollars per month.

When you do that, nobody's going to even offer to sell a grocery store in Bronte as long as he can get down to it in a wheel chair, and you are going to have fewer, not more vacant buildings in town.

You see, I can talk plan. I am not in business there. You may own five oil wells and half the county, but I won't credit you thirty days at my country store.

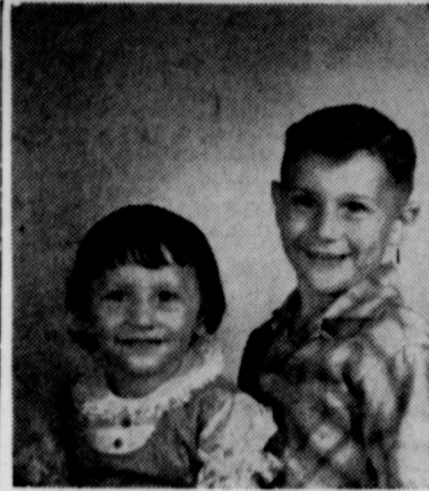

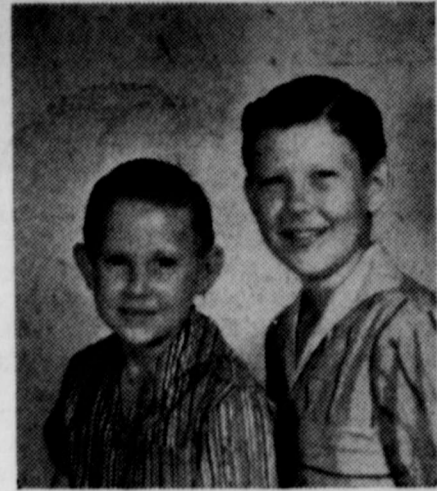
Mrs. Robert Harwell was honored with a family reunion and dinner last Sunday at the American Legion Hall. The occasion was her 80th birthday.
