Funeral Rites Held In Bronte For Jake Morrow, 78

Funeral services for J. J. (Jake) Morrow, 78, prominent rancher in this area for many years, were held at 3 p.m. Wednesday from the Bronte First Methodist Church. The local pastor, Rev. Lin Loeffler, and the Rev. Harold Odum, Presbyterian minister of San Angelo, officiated.

Burial followed in the old Fort Chadbourne cemetery under direction of Clift Funeral Home of Bronte. Pall bearers were Charlie Boecking, Jesse Parker, Matthew Caperton, W. D. McDonald, Joe Hester, Charles Sims, Conda Richards and Tige Richards.

Mr. Morrow died at 8 a. m. Tuesday, April 1, in Shannon Hospital in San Angelo. He had been troubled with a heart ailment for several months, but had only been hospitalized the day before his death.

He was born in Hill County April 20, 1880 and moved to Sterling County when he was about 17 years old. He lived there until he moved to Coke County in 1912, locating at Robert Lee. In 1914, he was married to Mrs. Irene McCallum of Robert Lee and the couple moved in 1915 to her father's old home, the William Clift place, about 7 miles north of Bronte in the Fort Chadbourne community. They have lived there since that time.

He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church in San Angelo.

Survivors are his wife; one son, Jacob Bruce Morrow of Bronte; one step-daughter, Mrs. Willie Irene Woodward of Sinton, Texas; 5 grandchildren; 2 great grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Maggie Rogers of Abilene; and one brother, L. M. Morrow of San Simon, Arizona.

Stephenson, Thomas, Bruton, Springer Win Bronte City Election

A new mayor and two new councilmen were elected for the City of Bronte at the annual election held Tuesday. J. A. Stephenson was elected mayor and C.

E. Bruton and H. A. Springer are the new members of the council. Bill Thomas, the other councilman elected Tuesday, was running for re-election.

Candidates defeated were Dr. John R. Harris for mayor and Joe George Wilkins and Ben Oglesby for councilmen.

An unusually heavy vote of 203 persons cast their ballots in the election. Unless an election is hotly contested, the usual turnout in Bronte runs less than 100.

The ballots were counted as follows:

For Mayor: J. A. Stephenson, 145; Dr. John R. Harris, 55.

For Councilman: Bill Thomas, 148; C. E. Bruton, 122; H. A. Springer, 111; Ben Oglesby, 107; Joe George Wilkins, 89.

Holdover members on the council are Bob Wilson and Matthew Caperton. The other incumbent councilman, Charlie Boecking, nor the mayor, Ernest Ivey, ran for re-election.

D. K. Glenn was election judge and clerks were Mrs. Robert Forman and Mrs. Olive Keeney. The election was held at the Bronte city hall.

Trustee Election To Be Held Sat.

Two school trustees will be elected in an election to be held tomorrow, Saturday. Only two candidates names, those of the incumbent's, Allen Sherrod and Jacob B. Morrow, will appear on the ballot.

Voting boxes will be set up at the city hall in Bronte and at the Green Store at Tennyson.

Although a lively race is lacking, school patrons are urged to show their interest in the school by voting in the election tomorrow.

Housing Program To Be Expanded

An expanded farm housing loan program, designed to speed up farm building construction improvement as well as act as an additional anti-recession measure, was announced March 28 by Walter T. McKay, Farmers Home Administration State Director.

Paul C. Shillingburg, the agency's local supervisor, explained that now an owner of a farm in agricultural production and on which the operator plans to produce at least \$400 worth of farm commodities may qualify for a 4 percent long-term housing loan, provided that he meets other standard eligibility requirements.

Formerly an eligible applicant had to own a farm that produced a more substantial part of the operator's annual cash income.

Loans may be made to build, improve, or repair farm houses or other essential farm buildings or to provide water for farmstead and household use. Shillingburg also said that the loan funds can also be used to help meet many other needs for farm home modernization such as adding bathrooms, utility rooms, better kitchens, and other improvements to the home as well as to farm service buildings.

Tenants and farm laborers are not eligible, though the owner may borrow to do the construction work

CANTATA SUNDAY NIGHT
