Red Cross Lacks Half of Its Quota; More Help Needed

Robert Lewis Jay of Robert Lee, fund chairman for the annual Red Cross fund drive which is now in progress, announced this week that \$464.71 had been turned in for

Coke County. This amount is less than half of the county's \$1020 quota. The total amount was broken down with \$232.71 being turned in at Robert Lee and \$270.70 at Bronte.

H. A. Springer, Coke County chapter chairman, said that he was hopeful workers would make their contacts and wind up the drive just as soon as possible. "We still have quite a long way to go," Springer said, "but I feel confident that Coke County will meet its quota."

Money raised in the annual Red Cross drive for funds is used all over the country when disaster of any kind strikes a community. Floods, tornadoes, fires, and all kinds of disaster victims are aided by the Red Cross. In addition, the Red Cross has an extensive program for aiding servicemen and their families, both in the United States and abroad.

Auto License Deadline Near

Owners of motor vehicles should remember that March 31 is the deadline for getting their 1959 license tags.

Up to Tuesday forenoon only 563 passenger cars had been registered in Coke County, which is no more than one-half the total. A waiting line is in prospect at the county tax office during the last few days of the month.

Motorists are also advised that all vehicles must have annual mechanical checkups by April 15. Far less than half the cars and trucks are now exhibiting new inspection stickers in Coke County.

Revival Meeting To Start Sunday At Baptist Church

The First Baptist Church of Bronte will hold evangelistic services for an eight day period beginning Sunday, March 22, and continuing through Easter Sunday, March 29. The pastor, Rev. Lester L. Vinson, will do the preaching.

There will be both morning and evening services. Morning services will be of special interest to those who have to work through the day, Rev. Vinson said. The hour of meeting will be at 7 a.m. These services will be concluded in time for everyone to be at work by 8 o'clock.

The evening services will begin with prayer groups for each age group for women, men, young people, and a special group for juniors and intermediates, named the "Boosters." The evangelistic hour begins promptly at 8 p.m.

Members of the church have been making preparation for the special services with prayer groups meeting through this week. A special prayer meeting for men is planned for 8 p.m. this Saturday at the church.

"The friends and neighbors of the community are invited to attend any and all of these services during the week," Rev. Vinson said.

C. B. Barbee Elected School Superintendent

Bronte school board in a meeting last Thursday elected C. B. Barbee of Tomball as superintendent of the local schools. He was selected from a large field of applicants and members of the board said they were well pleased with the new school head's qualifications and experience record. Presently, Barbee is serving as high school principal at Tomball.

Barbee was reared at Rule and graduated from high school there. He holds a B. S. degree in Education from Howard Payne College, Brownwood, and obtained his Master of Education degree from the University of Texas with a major in education administration.

He has served as a classroom teacher and coach, as well as superintendent and principal. His experience includes terms of service at Elgin, Odell, Magnolia and Tomball schools.

Barbee is a veteran of World War II, having served with the Air Force in the South Pacific area. He is a Baptist and a member of the Lions Club.

The new superintendent is married and he and his wife, Wanda, have four children. They are Randy, 7, Deanna, 5, Alan, 20

months, and Leah, 4 months old. Mrs. Barbee is a qualified elementary teacher with seven years experience.

Barbee will succeed Supt. Garland Black, who resigned recently, after five years of serving on the faculty of the Bronte school.

The Barbee family will move to Bronte some time during the coming summer, when he will take over his new duties.

Board chairman Hurlin Lee said this week that Barbee will be in Bronte Friday, March 27. Lee said the new superintendent wants to meet all the local people possible during his visit here.

Ballots for both elections have been printed and are now available for absentee voting. Absentees will request ballots from the county judge's office for the school election and from the city secretary's office for the councilman election.

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573 Animals Get Shots

Coke County's program to combat rabies got off to a good start this week with mass vaccination of dogs and cats. The total number of small animals treated in two days was 442 dogs and 131 cats.

Vaccine was provided at county expense and County Agents Sterling Lindsey and James Coffman administered the shots free of charge. Here's the result of their efforts:

At Robert Lee Monday forenoon 144 dogs and 51 cats were treated. In the afternoon at Silver the number was 65 dogs and 22 cats.

Tuesday forenoon at Bronte 196

dogs and 42 cats were given the serum and at Tennyson Tuesday afternoon 37 dogs and 16 cats were brought in.

Mass vaccinations will be provided free again next Monday and Tuesday at the same place.

A record of each rabies vaccination and registration of the animals will be kept in the county agent's office. It includes name and address of the owner, date of treatment, breed, color, weight, sex and tag number. The vaccinations are good for a period of one year.

QUARANTINE IS ON
With the vaccination program

starting this week, a 30-days period of quarantine is also in effect and all animals treated must be kept up. All stray animals are to be picked up.

Constable Pete Gentry of Bronte and Constable Ollie Roe of Robert Lee have been appointed as special officers to be in charge of rounding up the strays, and will be given extra pay by the county for this service.

Everyone is requested to cooperate with these officers. Stray dogs will be kept five days so that they may be claimed by their

for the past 26 years, having bought it from the C. Baker Estate in 1933.

Sayer owns approximately 4,000 acres in the immediate area of this

home place. His operation consists entirely of ranching and he runs both cattle and sheep.

Another farm picture of another house on the Sayer place was run in the Enterprise a few weeks ago. It was the former home of Mr. Sayer's parents and grandparents. He remarked that he was born just about 1 1/2 miles from the site of his present home, adding that he "hadn't gotten very far during his life."

Mr. and Mrs. Sayer built the house pictured above in 1948. It is constructed of Austin stone.

The Sayer ranch makes use of soil and water conservation practices and only this week the owner signed up his place to participate in the Great Plains Soil Conservation program.

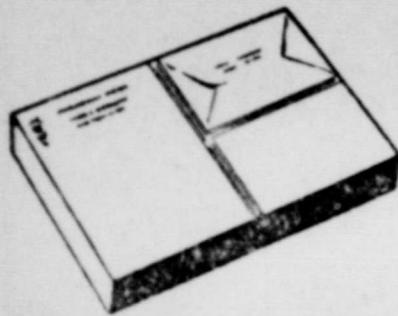

Lions Clubs Crippled Children's Week

Governor Price Daniel has declared March 16-21 as Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children Week to focus attention on the unique camp at Kerrville which has provided free summer recreation for 3,539 handicapped children during the past six seasons.

The camp was conceived and chartered 10 years ago this month. It is supported by 37,000 Texas Lions and their friends, who have contributed approximately \$1,500,000 to construct and operate the camp.

Its facilities are designed especially to serve the blind, deaf, mute and crippled. Fifteen permanent buildings — including a chapel, infirmary and giant recreation center—dot 504 hillside acres.

The camp, probably the only one of its kind in the world, is free to any eligible handicapped boy or girl in Texas between 7 and 16. The camp's capacity is

720 a summer and it has been operating at full strength since 1956.

The children camp under the stars at Inspiration Point, learn to swim in a specially-designed pool, develop talents in spacious arts and crafts building, many of them learning new skills; participate in stunt night and camp-wide activities—and have fun in general.

Prospective campers are being sought now for the six, two-week sessions this summer. Applications are handled only on the local level by the 780 Lions clubs in the state, who also arrange transportation to and from the camp.

Now is the time to refer the names of handicapped boys and girls to local Lions Clubs for the placing of applications. Lions Clubs in Coke County are established in Silver and Bronte.
