

## Fox and Varmint Poison Bait To Go Out This Week

Farm and ranch operators are again advised that poison bait to kill off varmints will be distributed this week at the county agent's office in the court house.

Friday afternoon, April 3, and Saturday forenoon, April 4, are the dates when the supply of bait will be available.

It is being furnished FREE by the county and is a vital part of the county-wide program devised to combat the spread of rabies.

Carl Baker, district field agent of the Predatory Animal Control Service, will be in the county this week to supervise preparation of the bait and administration of the program.

Fresh horse meat with strychnine will be used as bait. It is to be placed on the farms and ranches by the operators themselves.

A further warning is that dogs must be kept up where the bait is set out. Mr. Baker says the bait will deteriorate quite rapidly and there should not be any danger from it after two or three weeks at the most.

### City Council Election Set For Tuesday

An election will be held Tuesday, April 7, at the city hall in Bronte to name two new members to the city council.

Three candidates, Billy Joe Luckett, Royce Fancher and Joe "Binks" McCutchen are on the ticket for the two jobs.

The two vacancies exist because of the expiring terms of Matthew Caperton and Bob Wilson, neither of whom sought reelection.

D. K. Glenn will be election judge and polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. Persons eligible to vote must have lived in the city limits for at least six months and have a poll tax or exemption.

The three candidates are employed in Bronte as follows: Luckett is operator of Luckett's Texaco Service Station; Fancher is a rancher and parts man for Caperton Chevrolet Co.; and McCutchen is a rancher and works for an oil company.

Other members of the city council who have another year to serve include Mayor J. A. Stephenson and Councilmen C. E. Bruton, H. A. Springer and Bill Thomas.

### Rabbit Drive Set April 4th At Tennyson

A rabbit drive in the Tennyson area has been set for Saturday, April 4. Hunters from this entire part of West Texas are invited to be present and take part in the day's sport.

The school election will be held at the city hall in Bronte and at Tennyson. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Persons eligible to vote are those who have lived in the school district for at least six months and who have a poll tax receipts or are exempt from paying poll tax because of age.

Lee is owner and operator of the Bronte Feed & Supply store; Wilkins is a farmer and rancher; Adams is on the staff of the Bronte Hospital and Harris-Adams Clinic; Caperton is a partner in Caperton Chevrolet Co.; and Cumbe is a rancher and field representative for the Texas Farm Bureau.

A fairly large turnout is expected at the balloting Saturday due to the large amount of interest which developed in school affairs during the past year.

Holdover members of the seven-member board are Luther McCutchen, Allen Sherrod, Conda Richards, Joe Sherrings and Jacob Bruce Morrow.

Trustees are elected for three years and draw no pay for their services.

### 72 Per Cent of Coke Autos Have Been Inspected

A representative of the Department of Public Safety reported this week that Coke County vehicle owners are doing well in getting their cars and trucks inspected. 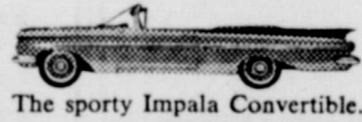

# Crow's Return From Long Stay In England

Mr. and Mrs. Linton Crow came back to Bronte last week after being away for the past year and a half. The Crows have been in England the last 18 months where Mr. Crow has been doing construction work. He is a mechanical engineer for the Kellogg International Corporation, a large construction company that operates all over the world.

Mr. and Mrs. Crow had some most interesting experiences while they were away and brought home some favorable impressions of our mother country. Mr. Crow said they wouldn't take a million dollars for their experience, but wouldn't give a dime for any more of it.

The construction job they were on was an oil refinery, called an Olofine by the British. Mr. Crow is a pipe engineer and was in charge of that part of construction. He pointed out that pipe work constitutes a large percentage of the job in building a refinery and that he had about 110 men working under him on this particular project. The plant built recently was the third of its kind and the largest to be built in England by the Kellogg Company. The refinery was built for the International Chemical Industries, one of the largest corporations in the world, with plants all over the British Commonwealth.

In speaking of the political situation in England, Mr. Crow said, "People are scared to death over there. They think that Ike is fomenting a war because he won't go along with every idea of their Phime Minister McMillan." He said he believed the British would look more favorably toward policies of the United States since McMillan's recent visit with Eisenhower and other top U. S. officials.

Mr. Crow said the Labor party is working constantly to get the chemical, oil, and steel industries nationalized. During the Labor regime right after World War I, the coal and electric industries and railways were nationalized. Mr. Crow said that socialization had not been too successful, particularly in the coal industry. "Instead of trying to find new markets for coal when electric power is substituted for it, they just close down some of the pits, and the worker are thrown out of a job. The coal industry, which has always been so important to the economy of the British Isles, is being replaced more and more by electric power," he said.

As for wages of the average working man, they amount to less than half what American workmen get. For example, Mr. Crow said, a plumber gets five shillings and six pence per hour. With seven shillings equal to a dollar, his wages run about 75 cents an hour. The 40 hour workweek is also unknown, he pointed out. Workers put in nine hours a day, six days a week, making their week amount to 54 hours. Average take home pay is 13 pounds, 10 shillings. The English pound is worth \$2.80 in

American money.

Housing is good, Mr. Crow said, with most of them being made of brick. In spite of their sturdiness, however, they are cold and sanitation facilities are practically nonexistent. Mr. Crow said they had a hard time getting used to the way the houses are built. "They are all narrow and long, and will be three or four stories high," he said. During their stay in England, they lived in a flat on the ground floor, with the widest part about 12 feet. The landlady lived on the second floor, and the third floor apartment, which was the smallest of the three, was usually rented out to a young couple with no children.

Food and clothing prices vary somewhat from those of the U. S. Overall, the food prices will average out about the same as ours, Mr. Crow said, since locally produced foods are cheaper than here and imported foods are higher.

Clothing, he said, is a great deal cheaper than here. "All Englishmen wear wool," he pointed out, "and a \$30 suit of clothes there will cost you about \$75 here." He said the cloth is of superior quality but the workmanship is somewhat below our standards. Cleaning and laundry service is very poor and he said he lost all the buttons off a suit the first time he sent it to the cleaners. Rich people have their own valets, he said, and most of the others just don't have their clothes cleaned.

When Mr. Crow was asked about England's socialized medicine program, he made a few disparaging remarks about it. He didn't like it because the patient has no choice about the doctor to whom he goes. All doctors are paid a flat fee of 3500 pounds per year regardless of how many patients they see, unless they see a great many patients, and then their fees are increased accordingly. "About the only thing the doctors do is write you a prescription after you've told them what's wrong with you," he said. For a shilling a doctor will write your prescription and for another shilling the chemist will fill it.

The modern diesel train service is wonderful, he said. Only thing wrong with it is, you have to be on your toes and know where to get off, as there are no conductors or porters on the trains.

Mr. Crow said that his wife liked their stay in England fine. She went to a small Congregational Church while they were there and made many friends. "She got along fine with the English," he said, adding that like him she would not take anything for the experiences they have had.

The English government, Mr. Crow said, is doing everything possible to relieve crowded conditions by encouraging emigration from the tiny island to other parts of the Commonwealth. The program has not been too successful, however, for the English people are home lovers. "I remember one case," Mr. Crow said, "when

20,000 emigrants left and before a year was over 10,000 of them had already returned." The people like England as it is, he said.

Mr. Crow's job was in Yorkshire, and they lived in a small resort city of 18,000 population named Saltburn by the Sea. It is directly on the North Sea and they lived only half a block from the beach.

The Crows have a 20 day vacation period accumulated and after that they don't know where the company will send them. In fact, they don't know when they will be sent to another job, as they may be put on a stand-by basis after their vacation is over. Mr. Crow said he did not expect another overseas assignment, since he will be eligible to retire very shortly. He has worked for the Kellogg company for 19 years.

Mr. Crow concluded the interview by saying that it was mighty good to be back in the United States and that he wouldn't trade his place here for anything he saw during the nearly 18 months they were gone.

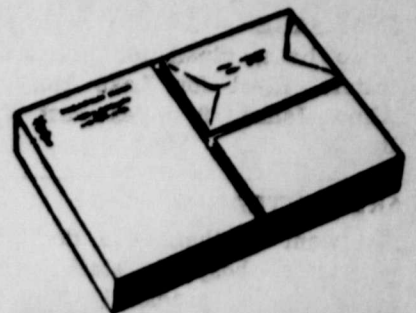

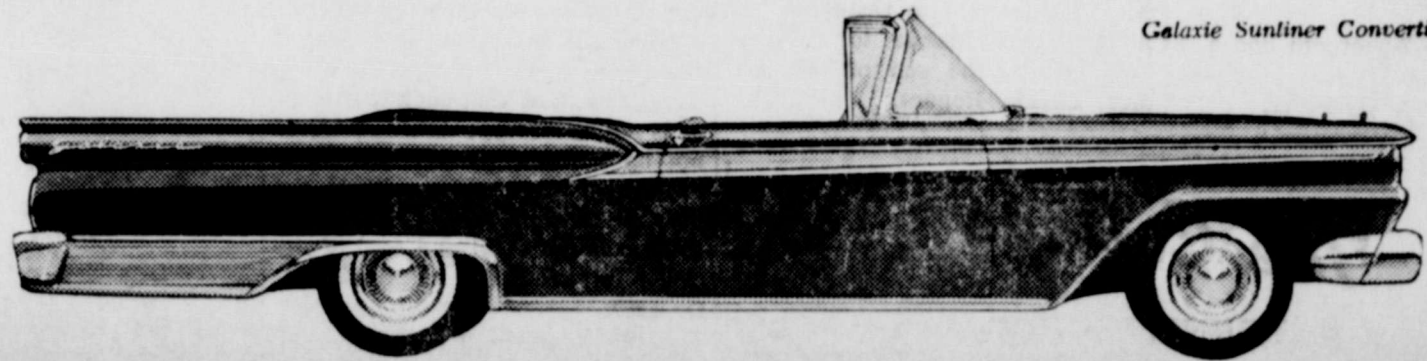

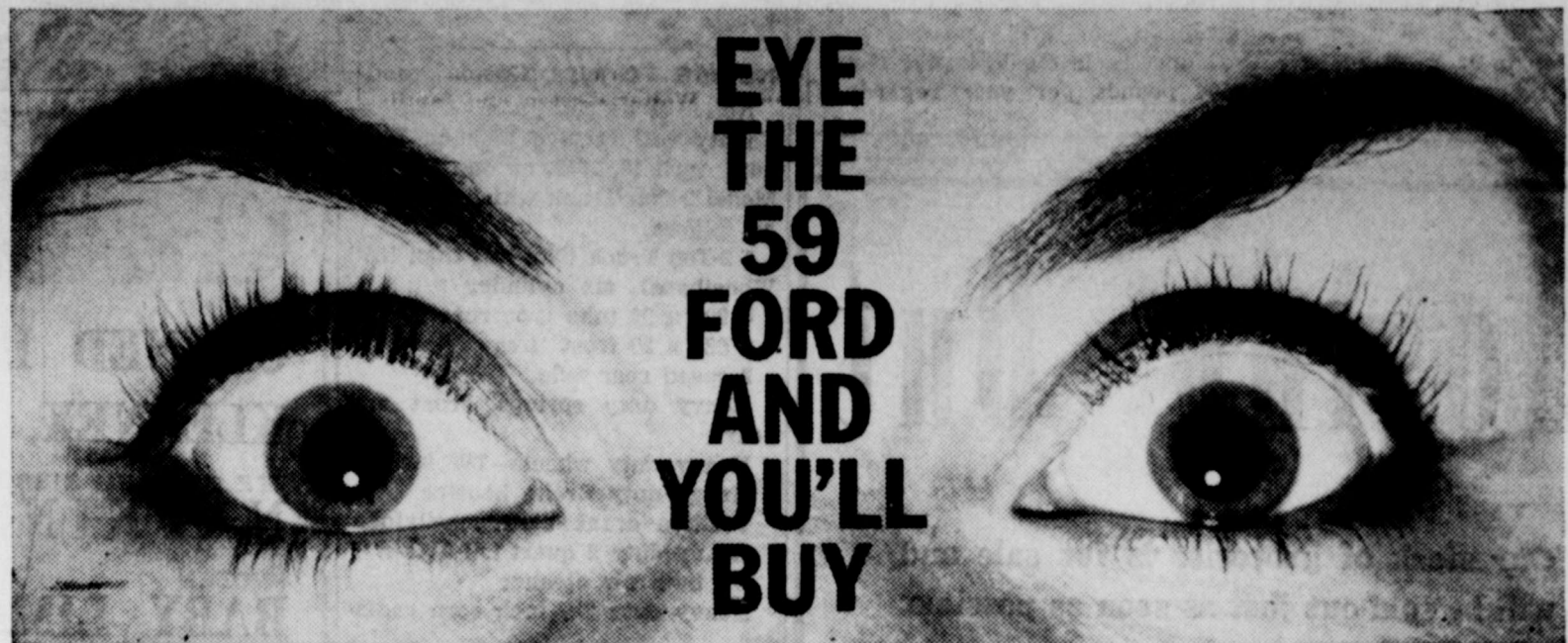
