

Bronte 2nd at Track Meet

The Bronte Longhorns finished a good second in the District 20-B track meet at San Angelo Monday. Coach Garland Black's boys led all the way in the meet until late afternoon when the distance races came up. The meet was originally set for Saturday but was postponed because of inclement weather.

Benny Corley was top man on the Bronte team and the star of the meet, earning 13 of Bronte's 33 points. He tied with Bobby Helmers of Mertzon for high individual honors of the day. Eldorado took first place honors by virtue of winning most of the distance races.

Bronte's Dee Arrott was able to secure 4th place in the 880 yard run, while Ray Eubanks took 3rd place in the mile run.

Other point earners for Bronte were Albert Grace, Dean Black, Ronnie Cole, Stove Taylor and Neil Black. Five of these boys qualified for the Regional Track Meet in Stephenville week after next.

Five new records were estab-

lished at the San Angelo meet, four by Eldorado and one by Robert Lee.

Outstanding in the junior high track meet was Rudy Olivas, who was high point individual, and Buddy Walker, who made an excellent showing in several events.

YOUNG NEGRO GOES ON TRIAL FOR MURDER

Willie McDade, 17, went on trial here Wednesday for the murder of L. H. (Shorty) Canada, Gandy milk truck driver.

The case was postponed from Monday because of a district court hearing at Lubbock in which attorneys for Roosevelt Wiley, 26, were seeking a new trial from a death sentence which was pronounced five weeks ago.

Wiley and McDade were partners in the robbery and murder of Canada which occurred last Oct. 24 on Highway 87 in the southwestern corner of Coke County. Both are Negroes.

Following a two day hearing the district judge at Lubbock advised attorneys to submit written arguments before he ruled on the matter of a new trial.

A jury panel of forty, including six women, were excused Monday and ordered to report again Wednesday morning.

District Attorney Justin Kever will lead the prosecution for the state with the help of his assistant, Jack Sessoms.

Clyde Vinson and Forrest L. Harding are the court appointed attorneys for the defendant. Kever is expected to demand a life sentence. McDade was under 17 years old when the crime was committed and state law provides he cannot be assessed a death penalty.

New Ice Dock Opens Wednesday

The new ice dock at Luckett's Texaco Service Station opened Wednesday after final installation of refrigeration equipment earlier in the week.

The new ice vending business is located south of the Texaco Station on Highway 277. It is owned and operated by Bill and G. D. Luckett.

The ice service will be available 24 hours a day and sales will be by vending machine only. Twenty-five pound blocks and 12½ pound sacks of crushed ice will be available.

Machinery for the new business was purchased from W. W. Millikin, who has closed his grocery store and ice dock.

Hearing on Water District Saturday

The hearing to discuss calling an election for the creation of a water district on the Kickapoo watershed will be held this Saturday. The meeting will get underway at 9 a. m. at the court house in Robert Lee.

A petition was filed in March requesting the Commissioners court to call an election for the purpose of creating the water control and improvement district.

Purpose for forming the water district is to build dams on the Kickapoo creeks and their tributaries so as to prevent future disastrous floods in the rural area near Bronte and in town. Two such floods have occurred in the past few years.

Rabbit Drive Set Again For This Saturday

The rabbit drive held last Saturday in the area east of Bronte will be continued next Saturday when the territory to be covered will be moved further north.

A "very successful" drive last Saturday netted an estimated 5,000 rabbits. Between 125 and 150 hunters participated in the day's sport.

A large group, including the hunters and many others from the community, met at the Coke County Park in Bronte at noon for a barbecue dinner. One of the sponsors said, "It looked like a community picnic." The same plan will be followed this Saturday and ladies are asked to bring pies, cakes and salads. All the other foods needed for the dinner will be furnished by the group sponsoring the drive.

Several foxes were killed last Saturday along with the hundreds of rabbits.

Hunters from everywhere who wish to participate in the sport are cordially invited to be present.

If the district is approved by the people of the area and details can be worked out by the Soil Conservation Service, the Department of Agriculture will finance the construction of the dams. Coke County Commissioners have agreed to finance the planning and surveying necessary to getting the project underway.

School Nurse Job Discontinued As Economy Move

The job of school nurse will be discontinued in the Bronte Schools next year. The decision to discontinue the position was made at a meeting of the school board recently as part of an effort to cut school expenses.

The position which is held by Mrs. Osmo Black, pays \$3200 per year, more than half of which is paid by the state. However, school officials say that if the position is continued the entire salary will have to be paid from local funds.

All teachers in the Bronte School have received notification of the board's intention to renew or terminate their contracts. No answers have been received from teachers as to their intentions to stay or leave.

The Enterprise expects to carry a complete list next week of all teachers who have been offered new contracts and those who have not.

Two teachers, Douglas Whittenberg, science teacher, and Norman Porter, grade school principal and coach, have already resigned. Supt. Garland Black also turned in his resignation several weeks ago.



COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Present Supervisors —

C. N. Webb, Chairman; W. E. Burns, Vice Chairman; D. K. Glenn, Secretary and Treasurer; Bryan Yarbrough and Robert Walker.

Ray Stewart on the C. D. Stewart Estate near Edith has completed 76 acres of root plowing, and grass seeding under the Great Plains Conservation Program. Grass mixture planted included Buffalo grass, KR bluetem, Sideoats grama, and Blue panic. Stewart plans to give the area complete deferment until grass is well established.

J. E. Quisenberry of Robert Lee has completed root plowing and seeding on his place east of Bronte. About 95 acres was root plowed and seeded under a GPCP contract. Grasses planted included KR bluestem, Green sprangletop,

Sideoats grama and Blue panic.

C. N. Webb is constructing a stock pond and diversion terrace on his home place west of Tennyson. Financial assistance is being obtained under Coke County ACP. Les Wilkins of local SCS office assisted in design and layout of the two conservation practices.

Simpson Bros. on their farm northwest of Robert Lee are constructing approximately one mile of field terraces and about 1700 feet of diversion terrace. Assistance is being given under the local ACP and SCD programs.

Cumbie Ivey who ranches just east of Robert Lee is constructing about 1600 feet of wire diversion. Work is being done under GPCP, and will be used to control excess runoff.

Olin Blanks has completed 2553 feet of diversion terraces under his GPCP contract. These are built to divert runoff water to stock tanks.

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

if it works together on a trip to Menard a couple of weeks ago. Folks there got tired of looking at the empty four-story old hotel building which stood on one of the main corners in town. They went to work, and it took lots of it, and now have in operation a four story, modern clinic, hospital and retirement home in the old building. The hospital opened late last year. We had the privilege of going through the entire establishment which was turned over to and is being operated by the Seventh Day Adventist Church. In talking with the administrator, we were surprised to find that the business is already being operated in the black and the money which had been set aside for the second year operating deficit has been channeled into new X-ray equipment.

On the ground floor are the doctor's offices, a spacious lobby, cafeteria, laboratory and X-ray rooms. The hospital proper is on fourth floor, where most rooms (renovated from the old hotel rooms) are large, light and most of them have their own baths.

On the third floor is the nursing unit where the non-ambulatory residents of the retirement home are cared for.

On second floor is the retirement home, with private rooms and baths, and modern furniture available to the residents. Where the big Bevans Hotel ballroom used to be is a lobby for the residents, complete with radios, television, magazines and other recreational facilities. A balcony overlooks the city park.

While there, we saw Mr. Ed McAulay, long time former resident of Bronte, who, with his wife, lives in the retirement home.

We have watched this project since citizens of Menard began work on it several years ago. They ran into disappointments, had some hard luck, but worked on until the solutions were found and the project complete. Which is an example of what a town can do when it makes up its mind to survive.
