Farmers Busy After Last Week's Rains

Farmers over most of the Bronte area have been able the past week to work in their fields and kill some of the millions of weeds which have sprung up since the rains of week before last. Scattered showers have peppered down in spots, but no widespread rain has fallen since more than a week ago. The Blackwell area was the only spot in this immediate vicinity which reported any sizeable rainfall this week.

Robert Lee had a shower Monday night and it was reported that a small amount of hail fell Sunday night at the Lone Star plant north east of Bronte. Bronte had a light sprinkle Monday night.

Crop prospects are very favorable over this entire area of West Texas. A bumper grain crop is expected to be made here, and some fields are already beginning to change to a ripening red color. Cotton knee high or better can be found in many fields around here. Warnings of insect damage have been issued by the county agent and considerable spraying is expected to be necessary.

Lots of moisture has been in the air this week, having been blown here by hurricane Debra, which caused havoc along the Gulf Coast over the weekend. The forecast calls for more thunder-showers in West Texas.

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Come in and Look Around

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Kill Rabid Fox At Seltz Farm

Rabies has been found in the area again. Francis Seltz, of Sanco, found a fox bothering his chickens a few nights back. His dog killed the fox and Mr. Seltz sent the fox head off for a rabies analysis. The report came back positive for rabies.

This is the first case in several months that has been found positive for rabies. Nevertheless, we should be observant around dogs, cats and varmints. If your pet should act abnormal, such as becoming wild eyed, nervous, or it becomes sullen and drowsy, place it in confinement or restrain it. Varmints that act strangely that have not exposed any animal or human should be destroyed. If someone or some animal has been exposed, then a laboratory analysis of the brain should be made.

Two 4-H Girls Tops In Sears Pig Contest

Prescilla Wylie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. M. Wylie, Robert Lee, and Juanita Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Johnson, Bronte, had the first and second place litters of pigs in the San Angelo store area of the heavy litter contest, according to a release from the District Extension Office.

Prescilla, a 5 year member of the Robert Lee Senior 4-H Club has received \$30.00 in prize money to further her swine program. Her litter of 9 pigs weighed 365 pounds at 8 weeks of age. Juanita, in her 4th year of 4-H club work with the Bronte 4-H club had a litter of 10 pigs that weighed 359 pounds at weaning time. She received \$20.00 in prize money for her achievement. Both club members reared all the pigs farrowed by their respective duroc gilts.

Other club members with entries

The pastures and fields have a spring like appearance. The heavy growth of vegetation will deplete what has been stored rapidly, but the present situation is heartening.

Cotton Boll Warning

Cotton farmers need to be watching their cotton closely for a possible build up of cotton boll worms. Conditions have been favorable for a boll worm build up in most of the county. I have found light to heavy deposits of bollworm eggs in scattered cotton fields over the county.

Again, check your cotton at regular intervals. If you find a few hatched bollworms, numerous white to brownish dome shaped eggs on the terminal leaves, then it is time to apply control measures. One boll worm, if uncontrolled can knock off three to eight forms and bolls. Allowing a hatch to get by you could prove costly.

Gas Tax Refunds

Have you applied for your Federal gasoline tax refund? Last year alone \$50 million in refundable gasoline taxes was unclaimed. Qualified operators have until September 30 to apply for the refund, but there is no better time than now to complete and send in the simple form. If you do not have an application blank or need assistance in completing the form, we will be glad to assist you or provide you with the necessary form.

Pecan Trees Hit

Walnut caterpillars continue to plague the pecan trees of the area. And they will probably complete another cycle and have another hatch before the summer is out.

Check your pecan tree daily if possible for groups of worms feeding on the leaves. They hatch and feed in a cluster, moving from limb to limb as a limb is stripped of foliage. Left uncontrolled, one cluster can completely strip a fairly large pecan tree. To control the caterpillar, you can use DDT, chlordane or toxaphene sprays; however, if you find the cluster when they first hatch, removing the small twig they are feeding on is much simpler. If you find a cluster on your pecan tree, search the tree thoroughly for other clusters. Normally, more than one group of eggs will be deposited on the tree.

4-H Boys Camp

The 4-H club boys of Coke County will be off on their summer camp when you read this. Approximately 30 boys, adults, and leaders along with myself are spending a couple of days camping, fishing, swimming and gaming at the park in Ballinger. 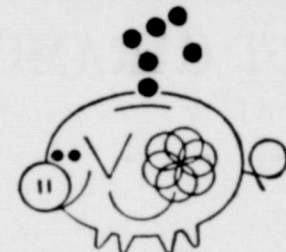

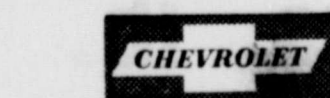
