"Working Together for a Better Community" will be the theme for the annual community Labor Day barbecue at the County Park here. Everyone in the area is invited and the ladies are asked to bring salads, or cakes or pies to complement the barbecue meal, which is being furnished by Bronte businessmen.

The program will begin at 5:30 p. m. next Monday with a 30-minute concert by the Bronte Longhorn band, followed at 6 o'clock by the

barbecue. Rev. Lester Vinson will give the invocation.

Following the meal, at about 7 o'clock the program will get underway with Rev. Bob Grimes, pastor of the First Methodist Church, speaking in behalf of Bronte Church; Supt. C. B. Ballots Being Mailed for Wool Vote

Ballots for voting the September referendum on the lamb and wool marketing development program are now being mailed to producers in Coke County. C. E. Arrott, chairman of the Coke County Agricultural Stabilization and conser-

vation Committee, announced on Aug. 5.

The referendum will determine whether or not deductions will continue to be made from producer payments earned under the wool incentive program. Funds collected are used by the American Sheep Producers Council to carry out a program of advertising, promotion, and related activities under an agreement with the Secretary of Agriculture.

The agreement, which has been in effect since the 1955 marketing year, will be extended for 3 years if approved in the September referendum. Producers having two-thirds of the volume of production represented in the referendum must approve if the agreement is to be extended.

Deductions from wool and lamb payments under the new agreement would not exceed 1 cent per pound for shorn wool and 5 cents per hundred weight for unshorn lambs. Deductions at these rates have been made from payments for each marketing year since 1955.

Producers may vote through September. The entire month has been designated as the voting period to encourage as large a turnout as possible. Any producer who believes he is eligible to vote and does not receive a ballot within the next few days should get in touch with the County ASC office.

To be counted, ballots must be received in the ASC office not later than Sept. 30. Arrott urges producers to mark and return their ballots as soon as they are received.

Science Dept. Receives Gift

The science department of the school received a welcome and unexpected gift this week in the form of several hundred dollars worth of equipment, donated to the school by David I. Haynes of San Angelo. Mr. Haynes, a retired chiropractor now in the advertising business, donated his entire laboratory equipment including books, scales, a microscope, bottles, bulbs, brushes, flasks and tubing, blood testing equipment, bunsen burner, work bench evaporator, and numerous kinds of chemicals.

Mr. Haynes had constructed part of the equipment himself and an evaporator, which he invented, was also part of the donated equipment.

School officials and members of the science department expressed appreciation for the gift and said that it would greatly benefit the department in this and other years.

Robert Lee Former City Secretary Is Indicted by Jury

(From Robert Lee Observer)

Mrs. Virginia Jay has been indicted on two counts for misappropriation of city funds while serving as city secretary. The indictments were returned by a grand jury in 51st District Court just before noon Tuesday read:

"Virginia Jay when serving as city secretary of Robert Lee, Texas, and as such officer by virtue of said office, there had come unto and was then in her custody and possession, the sum of \$100.50 in money, the same being then and there the property of the said city of Robert Lee, and the said Virginia Jay did then and there unlawfully and fraudulently take and convert the same to her own use."

A similar indictment was for the sum of \$71.50.

After the indictments were returned to Judge Joe L. Mays he fixed bond at \$1,000 on each count. Sheriff Paul Good served warrants on Mrs. Jay Tuesday evening and she expected to post the required bail Wednesday.

Action by the grand jury brought into the open rumblings of alleged discrepancies in city funds which have prevailed several weeks. Mrs. Jay, whose husband Sam Jay, is city water superintendent, resigned from the city secretary position May 1 after serving more than eight years.

She was succeeded by Jimmy Mac Mathis and some time later some alleged shortages were found. R. D. Travis, certified public accountant of Ballinger, was engaged by the City Commission to make an audit and his report indicated a shortage of \$1,002.48.

Mayor W. D. McAdams advised The Observer publisher that Mrs. Jay made restitution to the city of the entire amount, and that city officials did not push criminal charges. He also said Mrs. Jay did not resign under fire.

The Travis audit indicated all discrepancies were in the water department funds, involving payments for water sold at the loading rack, meter deposits and water main tapping charges. The alleged shortages dated back through 1957, 58 and the first half of 1959.

Neimeier & Pierce, Lubbock firm of accountants, had checked city records for a number of years and their last report for March 30 did not disclose any irregularities.

UNCLE HUIE from HOG CREEK says

DEAR MISTER EDITOR:

When that feller Tommy Manville got married the ninth time he was quoted as saying it was a victory for hope over experience. That's the way I feel about ole Khrushchev coming to visit us. I'm hoping but I ain't expecting much.

The papers is saying he's bringing his family as well as about 40 of them Kremlin boys along with him and I don't see how we're going to compete with that two-platoon system. We ain't got more'n four or five in our party that's pulling in the same direction and we can't git but about a half a platoon on the field at the same time.

Personally, I'll be mighty happy if we just hold our own on this visit. Them Russians is the best double-talkers the world has ever saw. Hitler twisted history but them Russians invented it. I recall onct when they claimed they was growing corn on the cob in bunches. Why they didn't claim it was already buttered, I'll never know. Then they fixed up a 14-volume history proving they won World War II all by theirselves. I went along with that, hoping they'd rest on their laurels fer 50 year. When they come up with a two-headed cabbage I didn't say a word, and when they claimed a feller Mozhaisky built the first airplane in 1885 and kept it in the air 26 minute, I didn't argue. They said it was in the Russian archives which was also invented by the Russians.
