New Insurance Law Effective Jan. 1 Penalizes Accident-Prone Drivers

Texas will have a new automobile insurance law to become effective Jan. 1, 1960. The new plan gives consideration to past accident and traffic violation records of drivers in setting up the rate to be charged each policy holder when his insurance is taken out or renewed.

Purpose of the plan is to encourage careful driving, and a person who has a record of no accidents nor traffic violations for the past three years may be allowed a discount of as much as 20 per cent on his premiums. On the other hand, persons who have poor driving and traffic violations records may be charged as much as 200 per cent of the established rates.

Forms will be provided by agents for each of their policy holders to fill out, giving a history of their driving record the past three years. This information will be used to determine the rate

Dr. Percifull Succumbs To Long Illness

Dr. Tom Percifull, 77, former Coke County resident, died Saturday at his home at 15 East 9th St. in San Angelo. He had been in ill health for a number of years.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Monday at Massie Chapel with Rev. Taylor Henley and the Rev. Arthur Alley officiating. Burial was in Lawnhaven Memorial Gardens.

He was a brother of Jess Percifull of Bronte and the late Frank Percifull, former Coke County Sheriff.

Dr. Percifull was born July 10, 1882, in Erath County. The family moved to Bronte community many years ago and Tom was a stock farmer before he became a chiropractor.

He had lived in San Angelo since 1951, moving there from Christoval where he operated a sanitarium for many years. He retired from active practice in 1955 because of failing health.

He is survived by his wife, who is a sister of Mrs. H. C. Allen of Robert Lee, and two daughters, Mrs. K. B. Watson of San Angelo and Mrs. Jack L. White of Del Rio. He is also survived by three sisters, Mrs. Addie Pomeroy of Logan, New Mex., Mrs. F. P. Brasher of Ranger and Mrs. Forest Clark of Bronte.

He was an uncle of Will and Frankie Percifull of Robert Lee.

Ballinger Firm Submits Low Bid

F. A. Seidel of Ballinger was the successful bidder Nov. 20 on a street paving contract in Robert Lee. The bids, 16 in number, were opened at a meeting of the Commissioner's Court. Seidel's bid was \$86,111.65 for paving approximately 115 blocks of paving in Robert Lee.

Money for the project was provided by a bond issue voted by Precinct 1 on June 25. The bond issue was for \$150,000, so more streets will be paved than had been originally planned, because of the low bid received.

Bids ranged from Seidel's low up to \$178,502. It is expected that a contract with the Ballinger firm will be signed in the near future.

the individual policy holder will have to pay.

Two points will be assigned a driver for each accident in which property damage amounts to more than \$25.00 or in which somebody sustains bodily injury or death. Certain exceptions to the rule provide that the points not be assigned, even though a driver is involved in an accident. Some of these exceptions include: when only medical coverage payments are made; when an auto is legally parked; when a car is hit from the rear unless the driver is guilty of some traffic violation; when the other party is convicted of a traffic violation causing the accident; when hit by a hit and run driver.

In addition to the points which will be assigned or accidents, four points will be assigned for driving while under the influence of alcohol or narcotics, for failure to stop, render aid or disclose identity when involved in an accident, and for negligent homicide, murder by driving while intoxicated or aggravated assault arising out of the operation of a motor vehicle.

Ratings will be determined by the number of points a person has and the higher the number of points, the higher the insurance rate will be.

The requirements as set forth in the new provisions are mandatory, it was pointed out, and no insurance can be issued or made effective until the forms have been filled out and a rating assigned.

Rites Held for Suzanne Latham, 4 Year Old Child

The unexpected death early Tuesday of Suzanne, small daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hervey Latham, brought sorrow to the entire community. She was discovered lifeless in bed by her parents about 7 a. m.

The child was rushed to Ceke County Memorial Hospital where the doctor and nurses worked in vain for more than an hour in an effort to revive her.

Elder of two small daughters in the Latham home, Suzanne had an apparent mild attack of croup and was given medical attention the previous afternoon.

Her parents were up with her a considerable period during the night but she had gone back to sleep at 5 a. m. and seemed to be resting, prior to discovery that she had quit breathing.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Wednesday in the Robert Lee Baptist Church. Officiating was the pastor, Rev. Robin Guess, assisted by Rev. Travis McNair, Methodist minister.

Burial was in Fairview cemetery at Bronte under direction of Clift Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Garland Davis, Hulan Harris, Douglas Dean and Frank C. Coalson.

Suzanne was born at Merkel March 11, 1956. She has a sister, LuAnne, two years old. The family moved to Robert Lee in 1958 when Mr. Latham was engaged as elementary school principal and Mrs. Latham also accepted a teaching position. The past year Mr. Latham was advanced to high school principal.

Besides the parents and sister, Suzanne is survived by her grandparents, Mrs. J. W. Latham of Bronte and Mr. and Mrs. A. F. McMinn of Texarkana, in addition to many other relatives and friends.

Pruitt Urges Early Christmas Package Mailing

Postmaster Noah Pruitt Jr. this week announced his annual "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign, and outlined plans for insuring delivery of all Christmas gifts and cards by Christmas Eve.

"Public cooperation" he said has been a key factor in moving Christmas mail on time in recent years, and I am hopeful that it will be even better this year."

The Postmaster urged patrons of the Bronte Post Office to start mailing Christmas packages now. Packages to distant places especially should be mailed as early as possible.

"This is also the week to prepare and mail your out-of-town Christmas cards," he said.

Pruitt gave these pointers on the proper mailing of packages,

"Use sturdy corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy brown wrapping paper, and be sure that every package is tied with a strong cord. Cartons containing several gift packages should be stuffed with tissue or old newspapers to cushion the contents.

"If your article is of unusual size or bulk, check with the post office because there are restrictions on size and weight.

"It is also important to make sure that your package bears the correct mailing address and your return address. If you are sending your package to a large city be sure to include the addressee's zone number. Including the zone number in the address always will facilitate delivery in large cities. Zone numbers also should be used

on Christmas cards and other mail to cities with postal zones.

"The address should be on the top of the package and it should be carefully written or lettered. A piece of transparent cellophane tape placed over the address will usually prevent defacing in transit." Pruitt said it is also a good idea to include the address inside the package in case the outside address should become defaced.

All packages going to distant cities should be in the post office by December 10. Other mail should be sent on its way as soon as possible. This kind of cooperation would mean that all Christmas mail would be delivered on or before Christmas Eve, the Postmaster explained.

Firemen Have Busy Week; More Members Needed

Members of the Bronte Volunteer Fire Department have been pretty busy the past several days having answered three calls since last Tuesday.

Worst fire damage was at the house formerly occupied by the John Coalson family. It burned Tuesday night of last week. The house, which is located north of Bronte, was a total loss. Firemen were unable to find water close by and had to return to town to refill their tank. By the time they got back to the house the fire was completely out of control and there was little they could do to save the structure.

A grass fire on the railroad right of way adjoining W. D. McDonald's place north of Fort Chadbourne brought the firemen out Sunday night. Another brush fire was put out Wednesday of last week on the highway right of way on the farm to market road to Winters.

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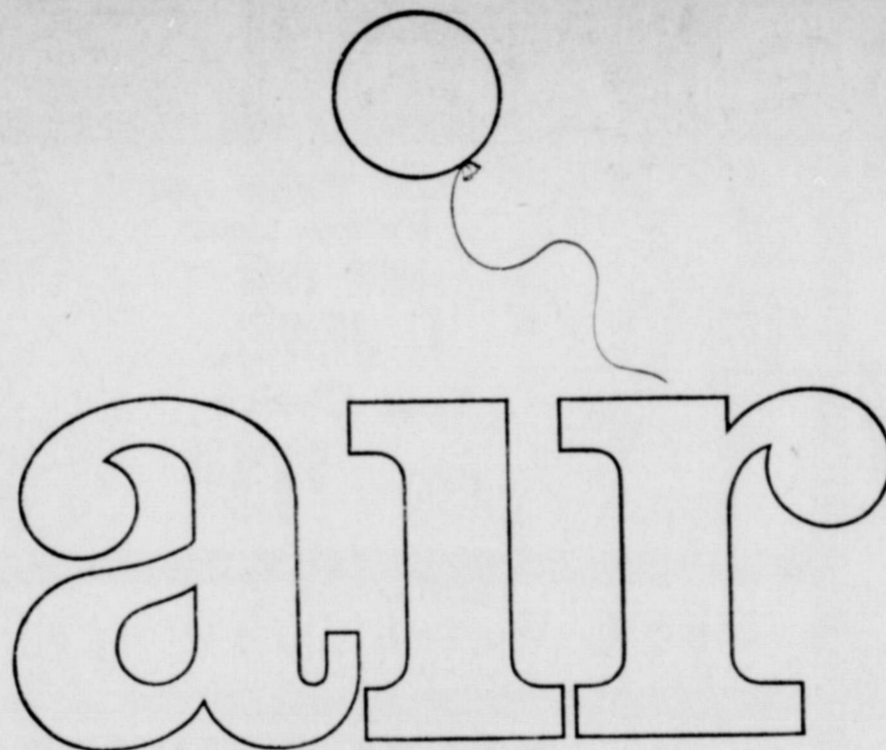

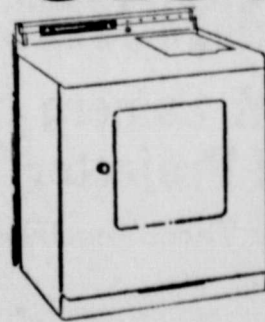

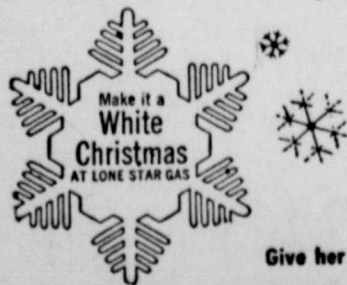

State to Build Road Extension

A new state highway into Robert Lee from the west has been approved for early construction. It extends from the bank corner west-northwest and will intersect with Highway 158 near the farm home of Mrs. J. E. Roane.

J. A. Snell, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department at San Angelo, has stated that the following farm-to-market road in Coke County is scheduled for work under this program.

From Loop 229 in Robert Lee, Northwest to F. M. Road 387, a distance of approximately 1.2 miles.

Mr. Snell stated that this year the Commission has authorized the development of some area roads which will serve the dual purpose of service to the adjacent land as well as aiding in the development of the entire area of the State.

It was announced that work will begin on this project just as soon as final planning is completed and right of way secured. Resident Engineer H. L. Bailey of Sterling City will be in charge of the work in this county.

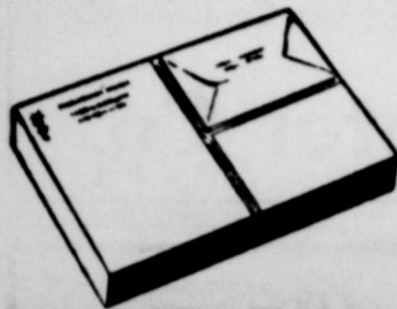
