She was escorted by Dee Arrott, president of the Bronte FFA chapter. Miss Gayle Lewis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Lewis, Jr. of Robert Lee, and Miss Ruby Armor, of Lakeview, were runners-up in the contest.

Miss Allen was elected in a balloting by two delegates from each of the chapters of this district. Included are Garden City, Sterling City, Robert Lee, Ozona, Wall, Eldorado, Lake View, San

Angelo and Bronte.

By winning the district contest, Miss Allen will be eligible to compete in the area contest which will be held in Midland. Winner of the area will compete in the state contest which will be held next summer in conjunction with the state FFA convention.

\$246.50 Collected By JP in November

A total of \$246.50 was paid in justice court here during November, Justice of the Peace J. T. Liles reported this week.

As usual, speeding was the offense in the majority of the cases.

And, as usual, Abilene residents led the parade of violators, with four offenders. Sweetwater was second with three; Bronte had two and one each was reported from Cisco, Wingate, Indiana and Illinois.

Judge Liles urged all drivers to exercise caution during the coming holiday season. "Speeding can cause you lots of trouble and I will hate to fine you, but it will have to be done if you are guilty and get picked up," he said.

Election Called for January 12 To Vote on Kickapoo Project

January 12, 1960, has been set as the date for calling an election which will determine to a large extent whether or not flood control dams will be built on the Kickapoo Creeks in the area north of Bronte.

The directors of the Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District No. One have called the election to determine whether or not qualified tax paying voters

favor levying a tax not to exceed 30 cents per \$100 valuation for taking care of expenses connected with construction and maintenance of the flood prevention structures. An election will also be held at the same time to name two directors for the district.

The planning party which has been here for the past several weeks has completed its preliminary survey of the watershed and

have returned to the state office at Temple to complete plans for the dams. If approved, federal funds will be used to finance actual construction.

Only voters who are qualified under laws of Texas and who are property tax payers will be eligible to vote in the election.

Humble Wants Deal with City To Take Over Water Pipeline

A meeting of the Bronte City council was held last Friday evening at the city hall, with the main item of business being a discussion of a proposition made by Humble Oil & Refining Co. for the city to take over its pipeline which runs west from Bronte to the repressuring plant and the Humble camp site.

Humble's offer was to turn over the pipe line to the city in exchange for 70,000 gallons of water free of charge each month for 30 years. The offer stipulated that Humble would be allowed to use up to 70,000 gallons per day and would pay 25 cents per 1,000 for all excess over the 70,000 per month.

Members of the council decided to reject the proposition as presented by Humble. Particular objection was raised over the 30 year period of time proposed. The proposition also provided that not more than 20 outlets be placed on the line, and this provision also met some objections from the council.

feet of 4-inch line galvanized pipe and at the present time has four users besides Humble.

Objections were also raised over a provision which stated the city would have to furnish as many outlets and meters as Humble desired any time they are needed.

The council wound up the discussion by instructing Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, to write the company and ask them to consider a proposal more favorable to the interests of the city.

Other business considered at the meeting included:

Okaying the placing of two street lights in the south part of town which has recently opened up and has several new homes located in it.

Granting a one year permit to R. H. Sims for the installation and operation of a motor fuel dispensing unit at his place of business on Highway 277. The council specified in the minutes of the meeting that any equipment used must meet the approval of the Railroad Commission of Texas.

A discussion was held concerning a proposal for business men in Bronte to help bear some of the expense of paying a night-watchman. The entire expense of this is now met by the city. No definite action was taken.

The council decided to postpone a meeting with officials of the General Telephone Co. until after the first of the year. The company has requested an audience with the council for consideration of a rate raise in Bronte.

It was decided to pay all city employees a \$25 Christmas bonus. Mrs. Kirkland reported that \$4,651.42 of current city taxes had been paid.

To the inevitable last-minute mailers he suggests that Air Mail postage be used on all gifts and cards going to distant cities.

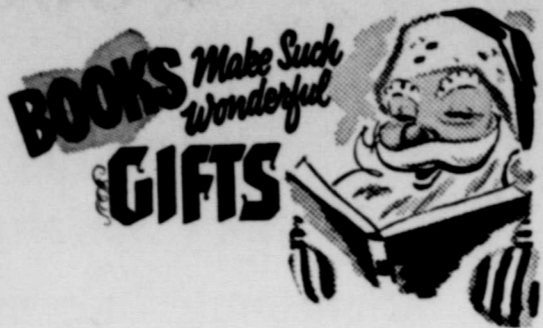
The Postmaster said that Regional Postal officials were expecting the Christmas mail volume this year to break all previous records. And this mail load is expected to hit its peak next week.

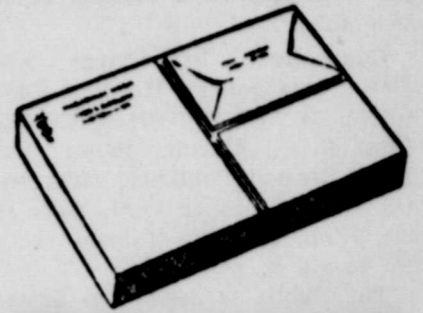

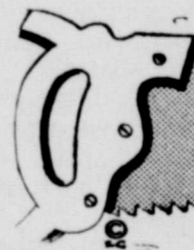

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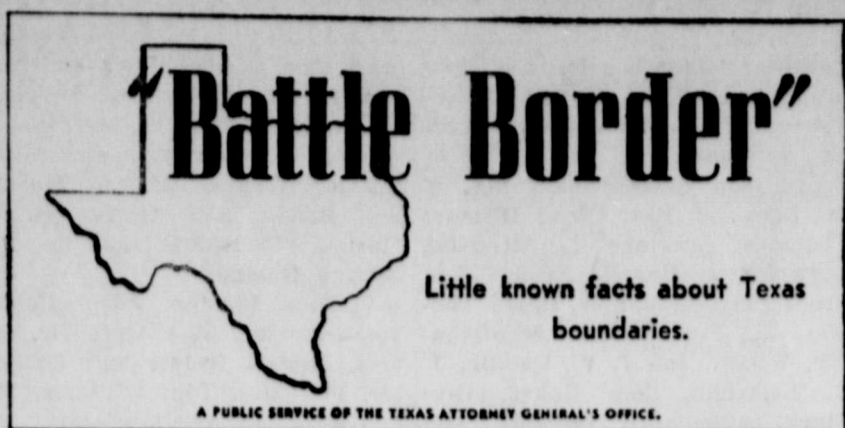
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Bronte, Texas



(Editor's Note: This is the seventh in a series of articles outlining the numerous boundary conflicts dating back to 1716, pointing up little known facts which shaped the Texas of today).

Old Red River is a fabulous stream.

It has served as a boundary between the possessions of France and Spain; the United States, Spain and Mexico; the United States and the Lone Star Republic; and, now Texas and Oklahoma.

When heavy rains fall in its watershed, Old Red River becomes a mighty torrent unfriendly to everything within its temperamental path.

But, during drought and dry spells it becomes as lean in water as it is rich in history — a ribbon of water wandering in a shimmering sea of hot sand.

In 1919, Oklahoma brought suit in the U. S. Supreme Court against Texas to fix the boundary line between the two states along the south bank of the Red River — a distance of 500 odd miles.

The two states were busy loading their best courthouse guns for a very good reason — oil.

The drilling rigs, first sprouting in Burkburnett, crept northward to the very river banks. The river bed was two miles wide at this point.

Soon one drilling rig ventured out into this strip of sandy wasteland and, in November, 1919, struck oil.

It was not long before derricks were scattered along 40 miles of the Red River bank and bed.

Oklahoma claimed the south bank had been settled as the boundary by the U. S. Supreme Court in the Greer County case.

The Federal Government got into the fight by claiming Indian rights were at stake in a large part of the river bed and nearby islands.

The Supreme Court decided against Texas and held the south bank to be the boundary and not the middle of the river.

There were other disputes just off stage bidding their time to jump into the act.

The first: where is the south bank of Red River?

"This developed one of the most complicated boundary disputes ever recorded," Attorney General Will Wilson says.

"It involved massive research into law, history, geography, physiography, botany, plant ecology, topography, geology, and engineering."

Wilson recently returned from fighting another boundary dispute for Texas, the tidelands issue before the U. S. Supreme Court.

With the bluffs, flats and river bed full of derricks tapping oil it suddenly became downright urgent to know what was meant by the words, "south banks."

Parts of the river bed were being taken and held by intimidation and force. Both states were assuming jurisdiction. Armed conflict between oil and gas rivals threatened.

The Texas militia was called to support court orders. An effort was afoot to call the Oklahoma militia for the same purpose.

Texas Rangers prowled the area, discouraging a throwback to the law of tooth and claw.

If you are fishing in the Old Red on the Texas side, the valley

bluffs will be two to five miles south of you. Between the bluffs and the water's edge you will notice a well defined water-worn bank known as cut-bank.

This cut-bank separates the sandy river bed from the upper lands that extend southward to the distant bluffs. The ordinary rises of the river are held by this cut-bank. The rises occur in May and June, called "spring rises."

"At the time of the Oklahoma-Texas dispute the Red River had jumped the cut-bank four times and flooded the valley lands in 1876, 1891, 1908, and 1915." Wilson points out.

Oklahoma and the United States claimed these bordering bluffs were the banks of the Red River. Oklahoma claimed title to the entire area, bluff to bluff.

Texas fought back and insisted that the line be fixed at water's edge when the river was at its ordinary stage. Texas claimed the south half of the river's sand plain.

The United States disputed the claims of both by claiming all of the south half, portions of the north and all islands in the river bed.

"The referee, the U. S. Supreme court, had its work laid out. To the oil men milling around the outer fringes, it certainly looked like 40 miles of bad road ahead.

"It was, forty there and forty back," Wilson notes.

State Trapper Makes Report On Year's Work

A semi-monthly meeting of the Coke County Ranchers Committee last week heard a report by the government trapper, Leroy Elliott. During October and November he killed 6 bobcats, 2 coyotes, 10 red fox, 25 smaller varmints and other foxes.

His report for the year indicates the following predatory animals and varmints were disposed of: 17 bobcats, 2 wildcats, 4 coyotes, 40 red fox, 360 smaller varmints.

During the year he worked on 34 separate operations and placed bait on 12 ranches. He has operations now going at Edith, Blackwell, Valley View and two in the Juniper area.

The association has 37 members involving an area of 398 sections of land in the county. Ranchers are assessed \$1.00 per section every two months to help carry on the fight against predatory animals.

Mr. Elliott's salary is paid one-half by the state and the county and ranchers make up the other half. The association has a director from each precinct as follows: 1, J. O. Rudd; 2, Walter King; 3, Finnell Smith; 4, Bert Blaylock. Sterling Lindsey, county agent, serves as chairman of the group and Mrs. R. C. Patterson is the treasurer.
