(EDITORS NOTE: With Senator Lyndon B. Johnson's formal announcement Tuesday that he is a candidate for the Democratic nomination for President, we feel that our readers will find the following biographical article of much interest.)

Senate Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson is a man of many talents. And some of these abilities he uses daily as the senior U. S. Senator from Texas are the harvest of varied jobs held as a youth.

\$1077 Raised In Coke for Cancer Fund

Coke County citizens contributed \$1,077.34 to the Cancer Crusade this year, thus exceeding the county quota of \$600 by 179 per cent. The announcement was made this week by A. J. Kirkpatrick, Robert Lee newspaper publisher, who was chairman of the campaign for the fifth consecutive year.

Previous highest collections for Cancer Control were in 1958 when the total was \$870.63. Coke County did not sponsor a crusade last year.

Figures show that Bronte and the east side of the county collected an even \$500 while Robert Lee on the west side reported \$577.34.

Co-chairman of the drive for the east side was Ben Oglesby. He thanked all the workers who spent so much time on the drive, as well as all those who contributed so liberally. "The fine record set in this year's drive was made because we had so many people who were willing to give of their time and because of the generosity of the people of Coke County," he said.

The entire amount was forwarded to Raymond C. Gee, treasurer

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boys were playing baseball, Johnson was learning the sweat and toil that goes into the process of earning a buck. Lessons learned early—lessons of thrift and toil—were never forgotten.

At nine years of age, the rangy youth who was to become Majority Leader of the United States Senate was shining shoes in his hometown barber shop at Johnson City.

He finished high school at 15—in a graduating class of six. The immediate need for money came ahead of the long-range advantages of further education. For almost two years, the future U. S. Senator from Texas worked on a road building gang, starting at \$1.00 a day. This stint was interspersed with a hitch-hiking trip to the West Coast where he worked as an elevator operator, in a cafe, and washing cars.

Then, his face tanned, muscles hardened and hands calloused, Johnson decided there must be more to earning a living than driving a truck and shoveling gravel.

"By then it became increasingly apparent to me that there was something to this idea of higher education," he says. Johnson packed his clothes and hitch-hiked to Southwest State Teachers College at San Marcos.

He enrolled in school, and promptly got a job as janitor—sweeping the halls at night in the building in which he studied during the day. There were other jobs, including door-to-door selling of hosiery and working as secretary to the college president.

"One year I borrowed \$200," he recently recalled. But there still weren't enough jobs—and enough money—available to continue in college. So for almost a year, Johnson taught school in a small South Texas town attended by under-privileged Latin-American children. Despite his own need for money, he used his first month's check to buy athletic equipment for his students.

Study and work paid off. In 1930, at the age of 22, he received his Bachelor of Science degree

Good Rain Falls Tuesday Night

Much needed relief from the dry weather came to the Bronte area Tuesday night when rains measuring from .8 inch to 1½ inches fell. Heaviest rainfall reported to The Enterprise fell in the Juniper community where 1½ inches was measured.

Other reports included .75 to 1 inch at Tennyson, .9 in Bronte and the Fort Chadbourne area, and .8 at Norton. About ½ inch was received at Robert Lee.

Crops in this area have been needing rain for some time and farmers and ranchers welcomed the moisture.

Weather predictions for Wednesday and Thursday called for continued cloudiness and scattered thunderstorms.

Bronte Approved for Federal Aid on Sewer

Bronte has been approved by the State Health Department for a federal grant to be used to partially cover expense of building a disposal plant for the city's new sewer system.

In a letter to Mayor J. A. Stephenson from D. F. Smallhorst, Director of the Health Department's Division of Water Pollution, it was revealed that Bronte was one of 27 cities approved out of 49 applications received.

Smallhorst said in his letter that actually receipt of the money by the city depends on the amount of federal funds received

for distribution in Texas. Going on the assumption that Texas will receive its usual \$1.7 million, the director wrote that Bronte has been approved to receive \$13,092.

With the \$135,000 bonds voted to build the sewer system, this additional \$13,092 will help considerably in building a system that is adequate for Bronte's needs.

City officials said Tuesday that they are still waiting on word from the Housing and Home Administration concerning sale of the \$85,000 revenue bond which was voted. The \$50,000 in tax bonds has already been sold.

Plans are to get the actual construction underway just as soon as possible after the revenue bonds are sold. Legal requirements will take a few weeks before bids can be let, but city dads are hoping to have construction underway within the next month or two.

He was reported in satisfactory condition at the hospital Wednesday.

The accident occurred when the boy and his father were cutting posts across a mountain from their home. They had unsuccessfully tried to pull a stalled pickup, loaded with posts, up the mountain. As Jacky started to take the chain loose from the pickup, the tractor started rolling down hill toward him. He tried to jump on the tractor and his foot missed the draw bar. He hung on to the tractor as it rolled back into the pickup.

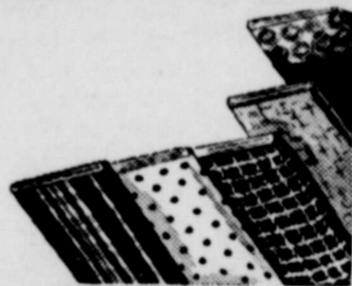

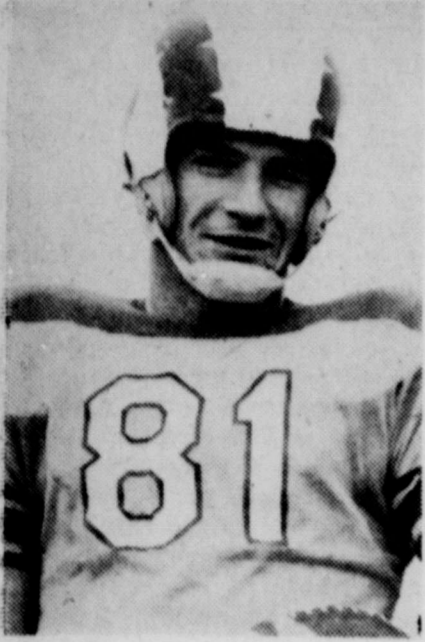

from college. This meant that in three and one-half years—including time out in which he taught—Johnson had completed three months of college preparatory studies and four full years of college work.

The fast pace he set has never slackened since then. Johnson was born August 27, 1908, in a farm house near Stone-wall, a few miles west of the town that bears his family name. His early education was in the Johnson City public schools.

After graduation from college, he joined the faculty of a Houston high school where he taught public speaking and debate.

Then came an opportunity to enter public life as secretary to Congressman Richard M. Kleberg. Johnson went to Washington. While serving with Kleberg, he also found time to attend Georgetown University law school at night.

In August, 1935, President Franklin D. Roosevelt appointed the hard-working young Congressional secretary as state administrator of the National Youth Administration in Texas.

Two years later, after receiving official recognition as one of the most effective NYA administrators in the nation, he resigned to enter a special election to fill the Central Texas seat made vacant by the death of Congressman James P. Buchanan of Brenham. Johnson won over a field of nine other candidates.

As a member of the Naval Reserve, Johnson became the first member of Congress to enter active duty following the outbreak of World War II. His service earned him the Silver Star, a decoration that was personally conferred by General Douglas MacArthur in recognition of gallantry in action while on a flight over enemy positions in New Guinea.

Then, in 1948, following re-election to five successive terms in the House, Johnson became a successful candidate for the Senate. Honors and responsibilities came fast.

His Democratic colleagues unanimously named him Majority

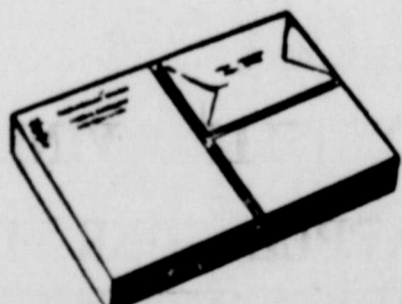
