Observance of Public School Week will be concluded Thursday with an assembly at 1:30 p. m. in the Bronte School Auditorium. The public is invited to attend. Classes will be dismissed at 2:30 p. m., following the program. Included on the program will be recognition of school personnel for outstanding service.

WWI Vets Endorse New Legislation

Unanimous endorsement of national and state legislative programs sponsored by Veterans of World War I was adopted by Coke County Barracks No. 2409 WWI Veterans of the U. S. A. at their meeting in Bronte Thursday night.

Copies of the resolution will be forwarded to Cong. O. C. Fisher and U. S. Senators Yarborough and Blakley.

Congress is being requested to increase pensions of WWI Veterans by 30 per cent to cover the increased cost of living. Additional hospital benefits are also being sought.

Among proposals presented to the state legislature are retention of the present 2 cents levy for Confederate Veterans to be earmarked for benefit of all veterans in the future. An appropriate memorial to World War I Veterans is also being sponsored. It would be erected on the capitol grounds at Austin. There never has been a memorial to the veterans of 1917-18.

A good turnout was one hand at the meeting in the American Legion Hall in Bronte, with Commander H. O. Whitt presiding. The commander was authorized to secure a film owned by the Texas Department WWI Veterans for showing in Bronte and other places in the county. The film gives a vivid account of the riots which took place last May when the House Committee on Un-American Activities held hearings in San Francisco.

Coke County Barracks now has 26 members. Five new members the past month include Frank C. Dickey, Monroe Alexander, W. G. Cresap, C. D. Beaver and Claude Ditmore.

Refreshments were served. Next meeting will be held Thursday night, April 6, at the County Park community hall in Robert Lee. It will be a 7 o'clock covered dish supper with the ladies as guests.

ADDITIONAL FUNDS AVAILABLE FROM FHA FOR FARM HOUSING

An additional \$50 million has been made available to the Farmers Home Administration for farm housing loans, Mr. Chester L. Sinclair, the agency's county supervisor, announced today.

He said that the new loan funds assure an adequate supply of this type of credit for eligible farm families during the balance of the fiscal year. Loans made so far this year plus those being processed had practically exhausted the funds previously available.

Farm housing loans are made throughout the rural areas of the United States. The loans provide farm families with an opportunity to acquire an adequate house and efficient service buildings.

Applications for farm housing loans may be made at the local office of the Farmers Home Administration, Mr. Sinclair said. The loans bear 4 percent interest and are repayable over periods up to 33 years.

Button Plumbing Co. of San Angelo has an ad in this week's Enterprise soliciting the business. Hurlin Lee is associated with Button Teague in the work here in Bronte.

Bronte's city council has made a deal with First National Bank in financing the lines. Application should be made to Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, by persons who wish to borrow money to extend a line to the mains.

Children Warned On Flying Kites Near Electric Lines

Local children were cautioned today against flying kites near electric wires by H. A. Springer, local manager for the West Texas Utilities Company.

He suggested an open field, away from electric wires and busy streets, as the ideal place for kite-flying. "It's dangerous to fly kites in the streets or anywhere near poles and wires, partly because of traffic hazards and partly because kites may come in contact with electric lines," the WTU manager said. Serious trouble may result if the kites becomes entangled in electric wires.

"If a kite gets caught in electric wires, a child may receive an electrical shock, or at best may lose his kite," Springer warned. He emphasized, however, that kite flying can be completely safe if a few simple rules are followed.

The WTU manager made his pleas for safety as warm temperatures and steady breezes signaled the beginning of the spring kite-flying season.

He also suggested kite-flying enthusiasts use only dry string. Wet string, wire or twine with metal in it are good conductors of electricity and increase the danger of electric shock, either from electric wires or from atmospheric conditions. Metal shouldn't be used in the construction of kites either.

Springer warned model builders against flying planes near electric wires. "The model builder could receive a serious shock if the control wire touches an electric line," he said.

"If a kite does become caught in the wires, don't try to get it

down. Either leave it alone, or call the WTU office for assistance," he suggested.

In discussing electrical safety, the power company spokesman also urged parents to use care when they are moving outside television or radio antennas without expert help. He pointed out that WTU linemen would be glad to advise them concerning high voltage lines near their homes.
