Audit Completed In This Paper

The audit of funds for Coke County which is published each year is concluded in this issue of The Enterprise.

The first part of the audit was published in last week's paper and gives a breakdown of receipts and expenditures in the various funds. This week a table giving a recap of the receipts and expenses is being published. Also, a table showing the bonded and warranted indebtedness of the county and a list of bonds and securities is being run.

County Auditor Weldon Fikes made the audit and he has requested that all Coke County residents study the annual report. Taxpayers and other interested persons can study the audit and tell pretty well how their county tax money is being spent.

Balance in all the county funds is down some \$25,000 compared to 1959, but receipts were also down approximately the same amount.

The balance in the various sinking funds of Coke County was up from \$116,830.03 to \$144,579.02, an increase of approximately \$28,000. The total balance for all funds, operating, bond sales, and sinking, is down about \$130,000. More than this amount, however, was on hand when last year's report in the form of bond money for paving in Precinct 1, and the paving has since been completed and the money paid out for it.

Coke County's bonded indebtedness has decreased during the past year from \$834,000 to \$750,000. Of particular interest is the fact that the last of the bonds voted in August 1949 to build Coke County Memorial Hospital were retired last year, leaving a zero in the last three columns of that fund.

County Agents News Column

"What people hear they may doubt, but what they see they cannot doubt,"—those are the words of Dr. Seamon A. Knapps, educator and acknowledged founder of what is now the Extension Service. Knapps, doing as his statement above dictated, conducted the first field demonstrations for people to view at Greenville, Texas—demonstrations on boll weevil control. Since that meager beginning, thousands of demonstrations have been conducted annually to convey some idea, practice, new method, or to show what a new variety can do.

The Coke County field crops planning committee plans to have a number of demonstrations within the county this year. Five or six grain sorghum variety tests have been planned. Four cotton variety tests have been lined out. Also, two chemical johnson grass control demonstrations are proposed as well as four chemical brush control plots. And if the chelated iron can be secured, several iron chlorosis control demonstrations will be set up. Two and possibly more fertilizer demonstrations will be conducted. And we hope to line up two early season cotton insect control plots.

As soon as the list of demonstrators is complete, we will include the names in our column. It is my desire, and I am certain the crops committee's also, that you visit the demonstrations to see for yourself what a certain variety or practice can do in the field here

in Coke County.

The Coke County 4-H clubs will hold their annual pancake supper next Friday night at the Robert Lee Public School lunchroom. Pancakes will be served from 5:30 until 8 p.m. We invite you to eat with us and help the 4-H clubs, then attend the District one-act plays that will be held in the Robert Lee School auditorium beginning at 7 p.m. I know you will enjoy both. Hale Kincaid, Ernest Clendennen, O. B. Jacobs and Howard Varnadore will be in charge of the cooking this year. I do not believe you can find a better staff. They plan to mix

the batter several hours in advance, so there should be no delays in the cooking. Eat supper out, then move over to the auditorium and see the four one-act plays to be presented by Merton, Robert Lee, Miles and Bronte Public Schools.

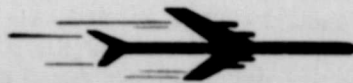

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

By CONG. O. C. FISHER

A revival of FEPC (Fair Employment Practices Committee) has been directed by President Kennedy. But the coverage will deal only with employment by contractors holding government contracts.

Under this policing plan, a committee will hear complaints from any disappointed job-seeker who claims he or she was denied a job or promotion because of race or religion. If found guilty the contractor could be penalized in various ways. The President appointed Vice President Lyndon Johnson to head the committees that will run herd on the hundreds of government contractors and sub-contractors who had better watch out. Small wonder business complains about too much government meddling and interference in their affairs.

The Supreme Court showed some signs of being judicial minded in a 5-4 decision the other day which upheld a contempt-of-Congress conviction of two men who refused to answer questions asked by the House Un-American Activities Committee. They had been questioned about subversive connections.

As you might expect, the dissent came from Justices Black, Douglas, Brennan and Chief Justice Warren. This decision may indicate a switch in the balance of power on the Court in favor of the moderate-conservative wing that does not choose to treat the Communists as just another political party but rather as a menace and a conspiracy.

The drive to up the minimum wage to \$1.25 per hour and extend coverage is due to be decided in the House this week. A mass of evidence has been presented at hearings tending to show that a considerable number of people will be thrown out of work if this effort succeeds.

As an example of this, the other day, a man telephoned me from our district and said his firm employs on a part-time basis 5 high school and college students, pays them a dollar an hour, but that it will not pay the firm to keep them at \$1.25 an hour. They simply do not produce enough to justify the raise, and the increase will cause all five to be laid off. All that glitters is not gold.

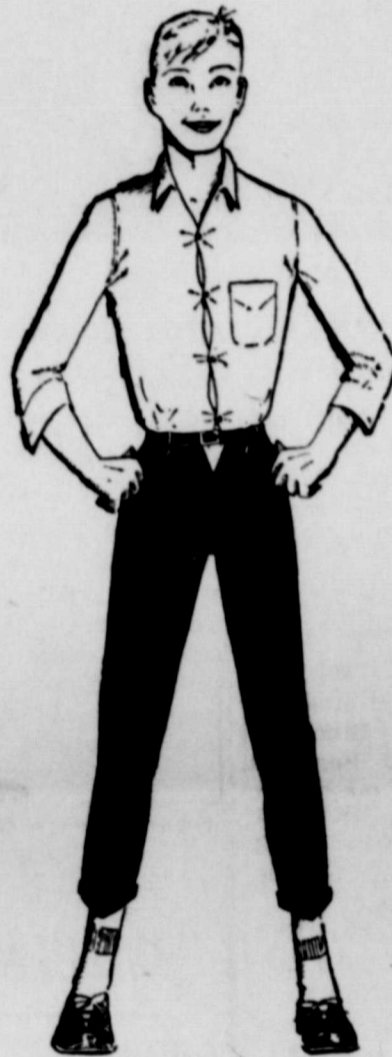

New Activity Shown in Housing Loans

The farm housing loan program of the Farmers Home Administration is picking up new momentum, not only throughout the nation, but here in Coke County.

That's the word from Chester L. Sinclair, county supervisor in charge of the agency's lending program here. He said this renewed farm housing loan activity follows the early February announcement that an additional \$50 million is now available to the Farmers Home Administration for its 4 per cent loans to farm owners to build or repair farm houses and essential farm buildings. Such

a loan may extend over a 33-year period.

The new loan money broke up a log-jam of applications that were being held because funds had been exhausted. Nationwide, loans are now being processed at the rate of about \$5 million a month but indications point to a probable doubling that pace.

In this area Sinclair said he looks for the main demand to continue to be for loans for new construction, although farm owners may need the credit to repair or remodel dwellings, put in modern kitchens, install pressure water supply systems, central heating, bathrooms, and other conveniences. Other uses include building, repairing, or modernizing barns, dairy and poultry facilities, and other farm service buildings. Farm owners find much of this type of construction necessary to cope with changing agricultural conditions.

Sinclair pointed out that by-products of this loan program include employment of carpenters and other skilled and unskilled labor, and increased business for concerns that handle building materials and equipment items.

Eligible to borrow are owners of farms that annually will produce at least \$400 worth of commodities for sale or home use based on 1944 prices, but who cannot be adequately financed through other sources.

Interested persons may contact the Farmers Home Administration office in the courthouse in Robert Lee any Thursday from 1 until 2:30 p.m.

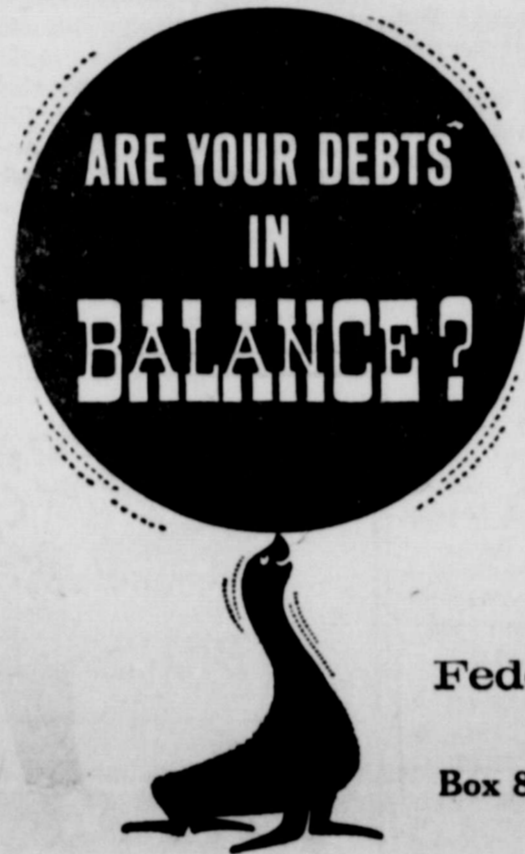

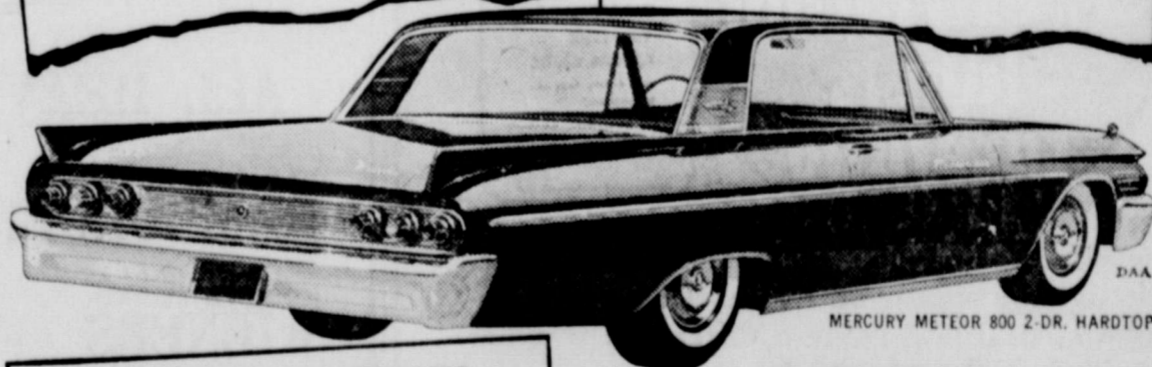

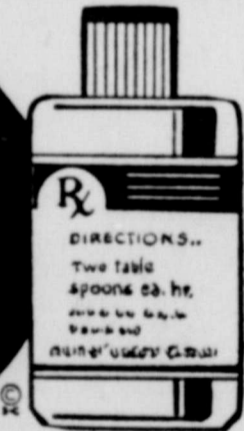
