## Soil Stewardship Week Set for May 7-14

People of many faiths throughout the United States will join their religious leaders during the week of May 7-14 to review with thanksgiving the rewards of good stewardship in caring for soil, water and related natural resources.

The observance has a long history. Rogation Days have been on the calendars of many churches for many years.

Fifteen years ago, a renewed and a more widespread interest in this observance was fostered in the United States by the publishers of Farm and Ranch magazine. They suggested to a few religious leaders that one Sunday in each year be recognized nationally as a time to remind all church congregations

of man's obligations to his Creator in being a good steward of his soil and water possession.

These ideas were so warmly received by ministers and laymen that by 1954 the observance had grown to nationwide proportions. Among the leading laymen who worked for this goal were the non-salaried Soil Conservation District officials in all states. Known first hand of the importance of man's relationship and dependence upon soil and water, these farmers and ranchers with the leadership of their clergy were helpful in re-awakening a spiritual response to an often neglected obligation.

## Bank Deposits Show Increase Over Year Ago

Most all the accounts of the First National Bank in Bronte showed a healthy increase over a year ago, according to a statement of condition issued on April 12. Deposits were up \$139,717.25 over a year ago. The figures are compared with those in a statement issued in March of 1960.

The increase in deposits shown above is the difference between \$2,386,265.39 in 1960 and \$2,525,982.64 in April.

Loans on April 12, 1961, amounted to \$825,519.20, compared to \$714,279.03 last March, an increase of \$111,239.17.

The capital accounts of the First National were also up slightly, from 266,878.74 in 1960 to \$277,976.31 in 1961, an increase of \$11,239.17. Total assets of the bank were up \$150,693.56, from \$2,653,265.39 in March of last year to \$2,803,958.95 this past April.

L. T. Youngblood, president of the bank, said that he could not attribute the deposits increase to any one factor. "We do have a steady increase of out of town customers who help our deposits total," he said, "but I would say that the increase was brought about by the general trend of business."

The condensed statement of the bank is being published in this week's Enterprise.

## New Elementary Principal Hired

James Lorraine Golson has been employed by Bronte School as elementary principal. He is currently teaching at Big Lake in junior high school where he has taught the past five years. Prior to that he taught one year at Fort Stockton.

Golson has a master of education degree from Southwest Texas State College at San Marcos. His wife is a qualified elementary teacher.

D. L. Estes, 3 miles south of Tennyson, has made application for a contract with the Great Plains Conservation Program. The plan will include cross fencing, pond construction, brush control, range seeding, deferred grazing, and proper use of range grasses.

About 1300 feet of earthen diversions were constructed on the Olin Blanks ranch, 4 miles southwest of Silver. The diversions were constructed to divert additional water into livestock ponds.

Bill Simpson has just completed rootplowing and seeding about 670 acres on his place 5 miles northwest of Robert Lee. Marvin Simpson completed about 788 acres of rootplowing and seeding on his place 5 miles northwest of Robert Lee. The rootplowed areas were seeded with the following mixture of native and introduced grasses: Sideoats grama, Green sprangle-top, Plains bristlegrass, Switchgrass, Blue Panic, Caucasian bluestem and K. R. bluestem.

D. K. Glenn has pitted and seeded about 114 acres of the rangeland on his place about 2 miles east of Bronte. Native and introduced grasses were used in the mixture.

**Deadline Set For Notaries**

Secretary of State Frank Lake announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1963 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1961 and June 10, 1961.

Lake emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public in Coke County and who desires appointment should apply before May 20, 1961. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of re-appointing present Notaries.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person ap-

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plying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

**FARMERS MAKE IMPROVEMENTS**

Farmers Home Administration county supervisor Chester L. Sinclair said today that owners of farms who need to replace or repair houses and other essential farm service buildings are showing a great deal of interest in the agency's farm housing loan program.

These loans are available to qualified owners of all sizes of farms provided the farm will produce at least \$400 worth of commodities for sale or home use each year, based on 1944 prices. Additional loan funds have recently been made available for this type of credit, Sinclair stated.

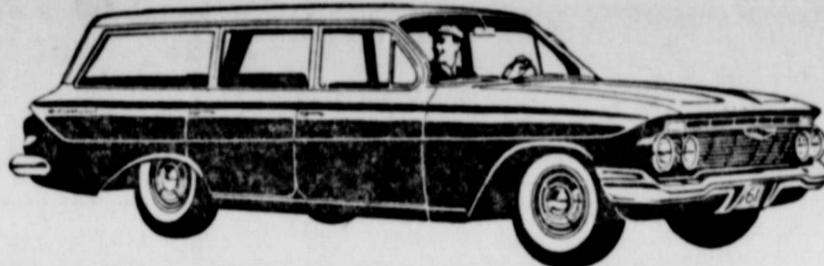
Abilene Student Nurses won over Tuscola to take the Consolation trophy. Other teams entered were Merkel "B", Tuscola and Buffalo Gap.

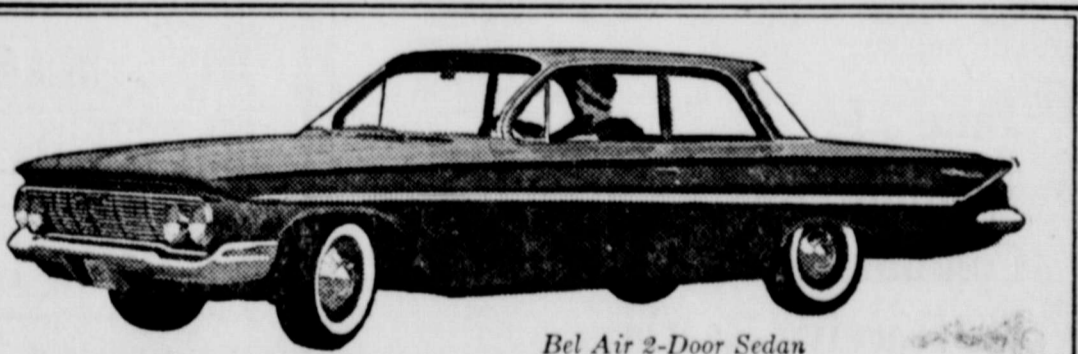

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## County Agents News Column

Seventeen Coke County 4-H club boys participated in six judging and/or demonstration teams in the District 7 contests held recently. Also, the 4-H soils judging team attended the national land judging contest held in Oklahoma City last week. We did not return with any first place ribbons, but valuable experience was gained from the practice sessions and contests.

The junior soils team and the Senior range judging team placed third in their respective contests — our best placings this year. The junior soil judging team was made up of Jimmy Blair, Edward White, Robert Wink and Leroy Casey, all of the Robert Lee 4-H Club. The range judges were William Ray Hood, Doyle Robertson, James Bird Pentecost and James Calder, also of Robert Lee. Our two electric teams gave good accounts of themselves but failed to make the top three. Bill Roach and Robert Holland made up the senior team while Jimmy Varnadore and Ronnie Smith performed in the junior division.

The senior soils team was made up of C. L. Sparks and Dickie Calder of Robert Lee and Eddie Glenn of Bronte. Two other junior aged boys participated in the grass contest. They were Carl Bloodworth and Gene Sorrells of the Silver 4-H Club.

The Coke County Senior Soils Judging Team of last year placed second in the State and was invited to attend the National Contest in Oklahoma City. Unfortunately the times are not congruent and we had to wait and attend the 1961 National Contest.

Dee Arrott and Eddie Glenn of the Bronte 4-H Club and Kenneth Wink and Dickie Calder of the Robert Lee 4-H Club represented Coke County in the big contest. Over 700 people were there with 39 teams from approximately 20 states entered in the 4-H club division.

We left shortly after the judging was completed and before all the results were in. Our team score was 607 points while the high team score at the time we left was 637. I am guessing we placed about 10th in the contest.

The boys did an excellent job considering the changes or adjustments that are necessary between their rules and the ones we use. Also, they enjoyed the trip and received valuable training in soil evaluation.

## H D Agent's News Dept.

I had a most enjoyable three days last week while assisting with the Community Improvement judging for Extension District 7. Curley Hays of West Texas Utilities; H. C. Stanley, Agricultural Agent in Taylor County, and Roy Huckabee, District Agricultural Agent, were also involved in the judging. We visited five organized communities and saw many improvements made since last year as well as sampling the wonderful cooking of each community! 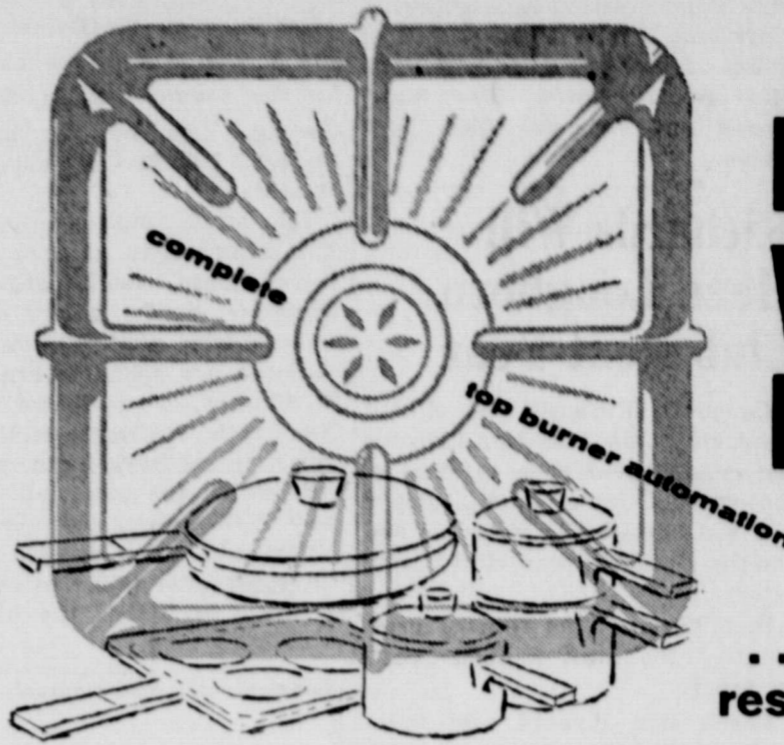

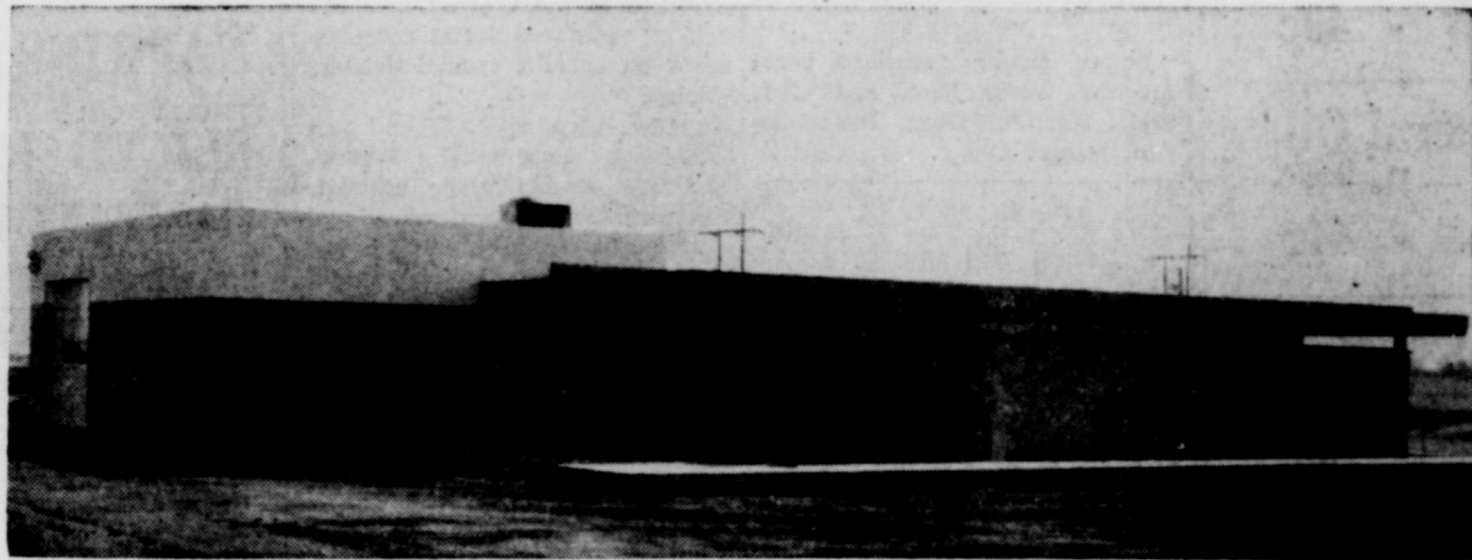

**MONEY ORDER PRICES TO INCREASE JULY 1**

Proposed increases in money order and special delivery fees starting July 1, 1961, were announced April 27 by Postmaster Gen. J. Edward Day.

No changes in special delivery fees for first class mail are planned.

Special delivery fees for second, third and fourth class matter will be increased by 10c in each non-first class fee bracket.

The increases for this service are expected to yield about \$2.5 million in additional postal revenues, based on current special delivery volume.

Money orders up to \$5 and over \$50 will be increased by 5 cents. The new money order schedule will combine the present 15-cent and 20-cent fee brackets into one at 20c. It also splits the present 30-cent bracket at the \$50 level, raising to 35 cents the fee for denominations up to \$100. These changes will affect over 100 million money order transactions. Based on this volume, new revenues would total about \$5 million.

These proposed changes can be put into effect by Postmaster General Day under his existing administrative authority. Similar action was taken recently to adjust postal rates for mail going to foreign countries.

These actions are part of the Post Office Department's program to place the Postal Service in a more favorable fiscal position, in accordance with the Postal Policy Act of 1958.

The Postmaster General is also requesting the Congress to take legislative action with regard to first, second and third class mail to eliminate the revenue gap of \$741 million.
