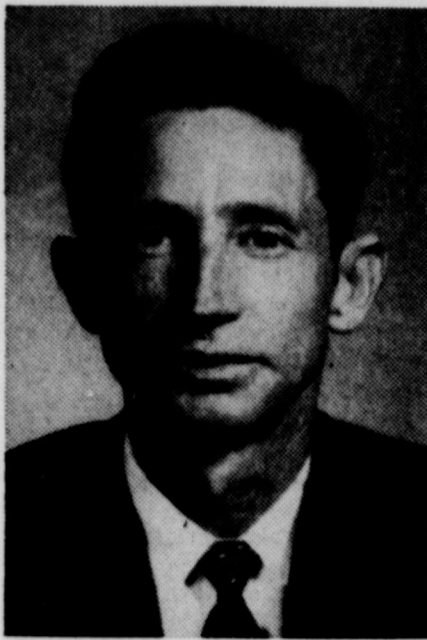

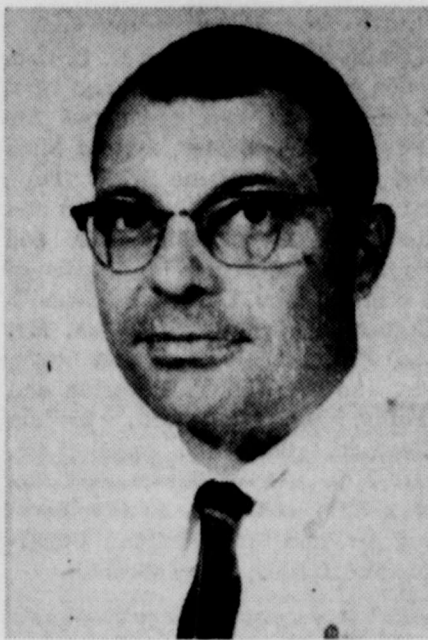

Dr. Stevens to Speak At Commencement Friday

Dr. John C. Stevens, assistant president of Abilene Christian College, Abilene, will speak tomorrow night, Friday, at the commencement exercises for nineteen 1961 Bronte Seniors.

Dr. Stevens joined the ACC faculty in 1948 as an assistant professor of history; became dean of men in 1950; dean of students in 1952 and was elevated to his present position in 1956.

He was graduated from Richland, Texas, high school and received a B. A. degree from ACC in 1938. He received an M. A. degree in history and his Ph. D. in history from the University of Arkansas.

He has also studied at the University of Colorado and attended the Chaplains School at Harvard University during World War II. He served as a chaplain with a U. S. Army infantry regiment in the European campaigns of Normandy, Northern France, the Rhineland, the Ardennes and Central Europe.

Dr. Stevens is active in civic and church groups in Abilene.

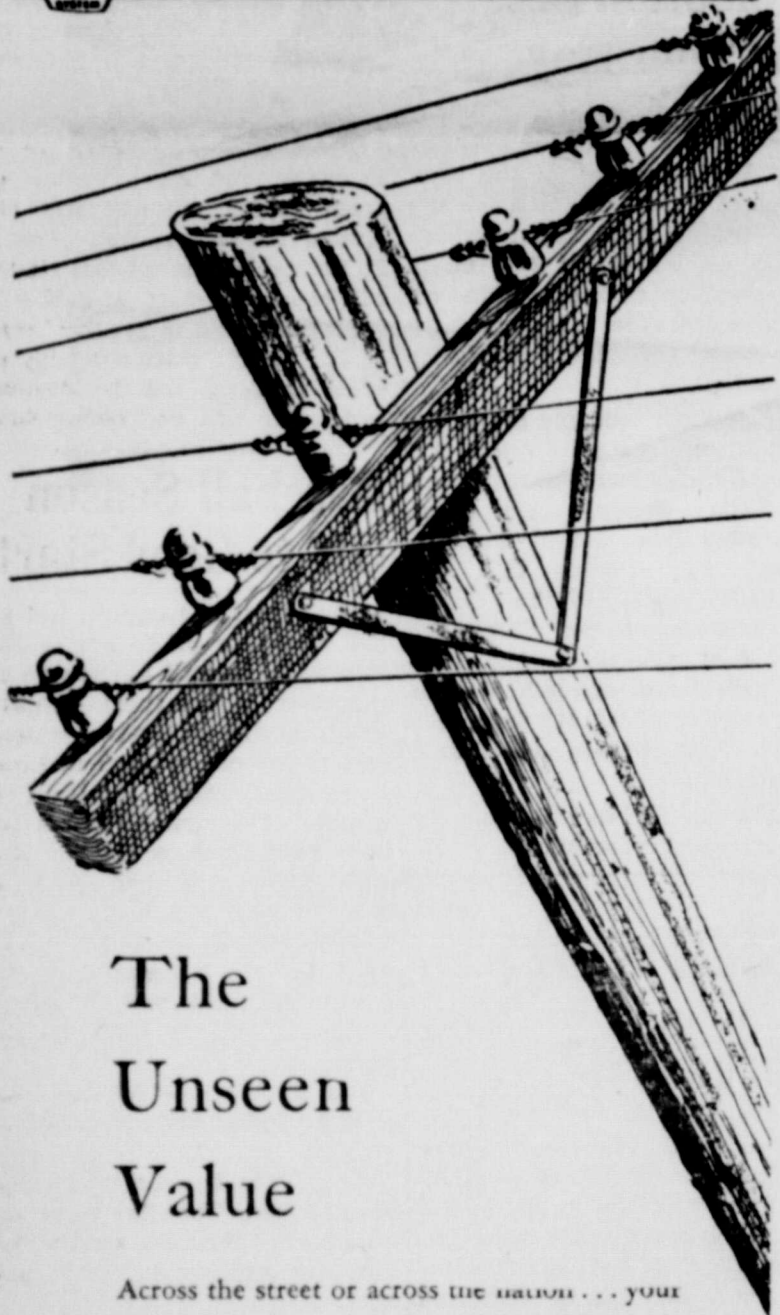

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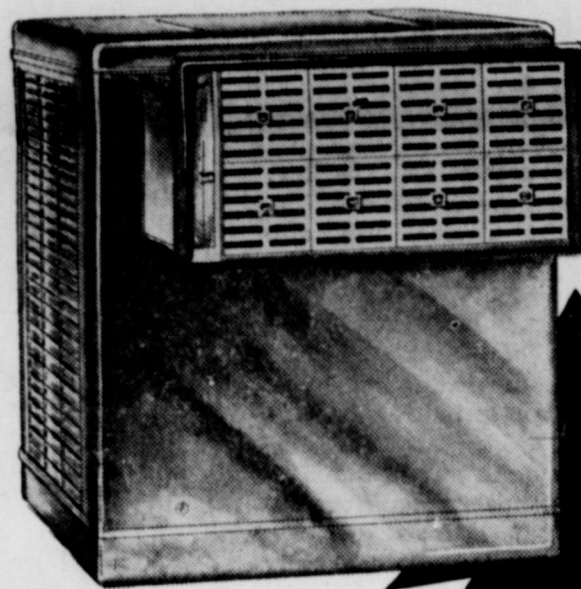
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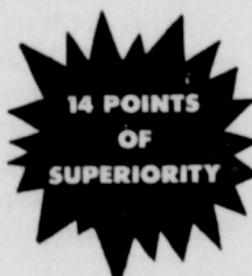
