

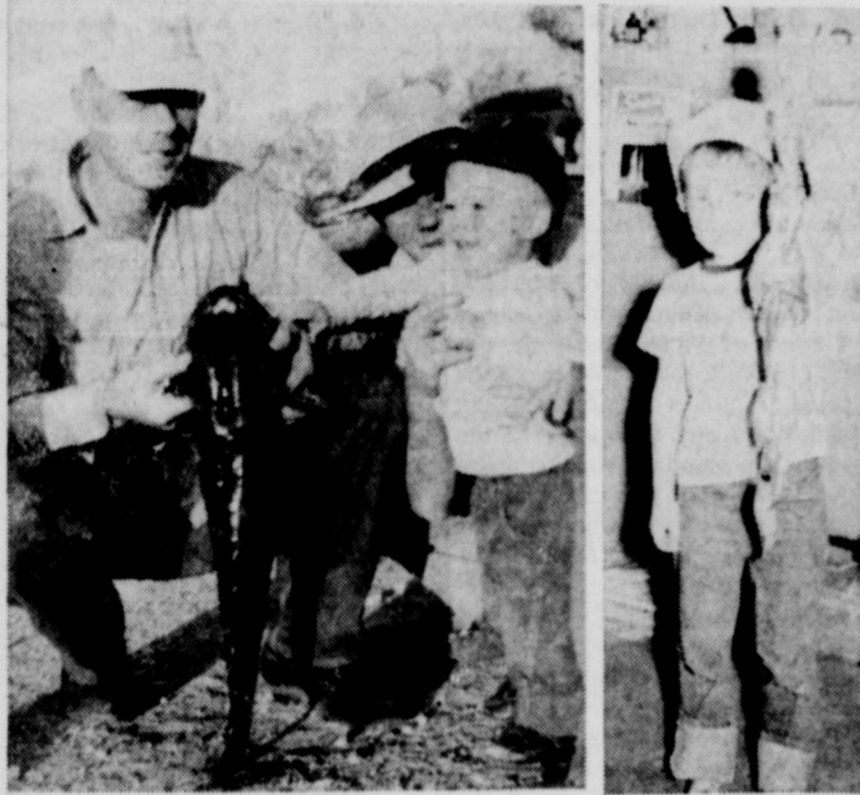

AD-LIB-BEN

Saturday is an important day for Texans. That is the day set for the special run-off election for United States Senator. The victor will fill the post vacated by Vice President Lyndon Johnson.

As usual in this column before an election, we want to urge you to vote. Your vote is of great importance and is the only say you have in what goes on in the all-powerful United States Senate. So, regardless of your preference for the two candidates, let us insist that you go to the polls and cast your ballot.

We are hopeful that you will cast your vote for the Democratic candidate in this race. Sen. Blakley, who is at present the interim senator from Texas, and John Tower, a Republican, came out as the top men in the first special election, and will be slugging it out at the polls Saturday to see who gets the coveted job of being senator from Texas.

We believe that Sen. Blakley is the best qualified and logical man for the job. A successful business man in many vocations, Blakley would take concrete business experience with him to Washington. On the other hand his opponent's chief qualification is that he has been a professor at Midwestern University. In other words, he has theory, while Blakley has experience.

Little good it will do Texans to elect a minority party member as its Senator. Traditionally Democratic Texas would have little voice in affairs of the U. S. Senate with a junior senator who is a member of the minority party. He would be about as influential as Dallas County's Republican Congressman, but without his seniority.

Another consideration in naming Mr. Blakley is the impact it would have in adding to the stature of our vice president, Lyndon Johnson. A lot of Texans are still disappointed that Johnson accepted the vice presidency, when

Special Senate Election Set For Saturday

A special election will be held in this county and all over Texas Saturday to elect a U. S. Senator. On the ticket are Democrat William A. Blakley and Republican John Tower.

Blakley is now serving as interim senator, having been appointed by Gov. Price Daniel to fill the vacancy created when Lyndon B. Johnson resigned to take over as Vice President of the United States. Blakley is a Dallas lawyer and business man.

Tower, the Republican candidate, was a candidate against Johnson in last November's general election for the senatorial seat. He is a former government professor at Midwestern University, Wichita Falls.

Matthew Caperton will be election judge in the Bronte box. The election will be held at the city hall and polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. C. N. Webb will be judge at Tennyson; R. V. Copeland, Olga and Homer Cornelius, Juniper.

Bronte Area Gets 2.5 Inches Moisture

Earth-soaking rains have fallen in the Bronte area during the past several days. Total moisture received in most of this vicinity measured from 2-2½ inches.

The big rain came early last Friday morning when better than two inches fell here in Bronte. Most of the surrounding area received about that amount. Cloudy skies covered West Texas again Tuesday morning and .3 to .5 of an inch fell around here.

Farmers and ranchmen, for the most part were jubilant about the rain, as it "came none too soon." The only drawback to the moist-

ure was that it came too late to be much help to small grain crops and some farmers were ready to cut the small grain when the rain came.

Farmers who have harvested oats say that the 1961 crop is turning out better than they expected.

L. T. Youngblood To Attend Meeting In Nation's Capital

L. T. Youngblood, Bronte banker and president of the Upper Colorado River Authority, has been named by Gov. Price Daniel to attend a National Rivers and Harbors Congress. The meeting is being held in Washington, D. C., at the Mayflower Hotel May 24-27.

Mr. Youngblood is one of 12 or 15 men who will represent the governor of Texas at the meeting. All river authority heads of the state were invited to go.

He stated that the purpose of the meeting is to take a long range look at the water problems of this country. He said the congress will take "a forward look to the year 2001 for the entire nation."

One evening while the group is in the nation's capital, the Marine Corps will pick up the visitors and take them to the big Marine base at Quantico, Va., where they will be guests of the base.

In addition to the various river authority heads, it is expected that water engineers from the several states, representatives of the Bureau of Reclamation, and legislative committees will sit in on the discussions.

Mr. Youngblood left Bronte Wednesday morning for San Angelo, where he boarded a plane for Dallas. From Big D he flew non-stop to Washington. He expects to return to Bronte Saturday night or Sunday.

138,000 Volt Line Ties Ballinger to Oak Creek Plant

Electric power from WTU's 138,000 volt transmission system was switched into the new bay of the Ballinger substation May 18 over 22½ miles of 138 KV line which has recently been completed to interconnect with the Abilene-San Angelo 138 KV system.

The system was tapped at a point 4 miles northeast of Bronte approximately 9 miles from the Oak Creek Plant. About 17 miles of new 138 KV line is scheduled to be constructed this year in that vicinity which will provide three direct lines from the Oak Creek substation to Abilene, Ballinger and San Angelo. Plans call for the construction of about 3 miles of new line to connect the existing line from Abilene to the new plant. Three miles of new construction will tie in the new Ballinger line to the Oak Creek substation and 10 miles of new 138 KV line will connect the existing San Angelo line to the new plant.

The huge Westinghouse transformer, weighing 128,000 pounds was installed in a new bay at the Ballinger substation in April. It has a capacity of 30,000 KVA.

County Agents News Column

"When should I spray my pecan trees?" I've heard that question several times in the last two weeks. Everyone wants to keep the deadly nut case bearer from taking their pecan crop.

The question is one that is well taken at this season of the year, but is one that is difficult to give a concrete, one specific day answer to. The casebearer hatch over a period of several days. The ideal time to spray is when the first eggs are hatching and have the spray on the tree when the maximum hatch occurs. And the spray must be in the vicinity of the cluster or your work will be in vain. The casebearer never moves further than the second bud away from a cluster of nuts unless he is forced to, to find food.

I checked trees in six locations in Robert Lee and in three locations at or near Bronte the first of the week. I found no eggs on the nut clusters on the trees checked at Bronte. The first generation—in the stem—had been completed so egg laying probably has started by now. If they do build up in any numbers in the Bronte area I believe the peak will hatch early next week. I will do further checking in the area. From our present observations I would spray on Monday or Tuesday, the 29 or 30. If you wish to spray twice, then I would spray on Saturday, the 27, and again on Thursday, June 1.

The six locations checked in Robert Lee produced eggs and/or casebearers at each stop checked. The eggs hatched, we believe, are eggs deposited by our "early bird." I believe the maximum build up is yet to come. No heavy deposits were found on any of the trees checked.

As for spraying in the Robert Lee area, spraying done from Thursday, the 25th, to Monday, the 29th, should give good protection. If you desire to spray twice, I would spray on Thursday or Friday then again on Tuesday or Wednesday of next week.

Several chemicals have given good control of casebearers when properly applied. DDT, Malathion, Taxaphene and Nicotine sulfate have all proven capable. Be sure to use ample pressure—400 pounds on large trees—to part the leaves and allow the chemical to reach the cluster of nuts. Also, be sure to add zinc sulfate to your mix to help control rosette. Most trees in the area will respond to a zinc treatment, even though they are not rosetted.

The casebearer build up is light so far. We hope it does not increase. If it does, spraying at the proper time will give you protection against the costly insect.

Price, south of Silver, 336 acres; and D. K. Glenn, Bronte, 605 acres. Plans are to use ½ pound acid equivalent of 2-4-5-T mixed with one gallon of diesel oil and sufficient water to prepare 4 gallons of mixture to be used per acre. Deferment will be done following spraying so grasses may make maximum use of moisture. Cost share will be under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Bert Blaylock of the Lometa Community, and Leo Radde on the Sterling City Highway are building earthen tanks for livestock water. Cost-share will be under ACP, and stake-out was by Les Wilkins, SCS.

The new 138,000 volt line will provide additional electric power into the Ballinger substation for distribution over the four 69 KV lines running out of Ballinger. The third runs north to Winters, Tuscola and Abilene, and the fourth runs southwest to Miles and San Angelo.

H D Agent's News Dept.

The second day of the laundering and small equipment workshop I attended in Abilene a few weeks ago was devoted to small electrical equipment. Blenders, skillets, sauce pans, grills, waffle irons and such items were actually used by we agents in preparing our noon meal that day.

I used an electric skillet to make a chocolate cake which is very good. Most important, its quick and easy. I think we are all interested in recipes and other aids that can help simplify meal preparation in our busy lives. Another good point in the cake's favor is the fact that it's cool to make since you don't use the oven!

Chocolate Skillet Cake

½ cup cocoa
½ cup cold water
1½ cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon soda
½ teaspoon salt
1 cup brown sugar
½ cup shortening
3 eggs
½ cup buttermilk
1 teaspoon vanilla
4 (1 oz.) milk chocolate bars
Add cold water to cocoa and mix well. Sift together flour, soda, salt and sugar in large bowl of electric mixer. Add shortening, unbeaten eggs, and ¼ cup buttermilk. Beat 3 minutes. Add vanilla, remaining buttermilk and cocoa mixture. Beat 2 minutes. Line bottom of electric skillet with aluminum foil. Pour batter on foil. Arrange milk chocolate squares on top of batter. Cover and set control at 275 degrees. Bake about 30 minutes or until cake is just done. Serve from skillet with whipped cream, ice cream, or plain.

Rice won't stick to the bottom of the pan if you boil it in an aluminum strainer.
