Blakley Takes County; Tower Carries State Church of Christ Starts Work on New Building

Coke County didn't go along with the rest of the state in last Saturday's election of a United States Senator. John Tower, Republican candidate, won over the Democratic candidate, William Blakley, by a margin of some 8,000 votes. Approximately 890,000 votes were cast in the state.

Coke County gave Blakley 360 votes, while Tower received 201 votes. Heaviest vote in the county was in the Bronte box where Blakley got 135 to Tower's 45 for a total of 180 votes cast.

Tower's election marks the first time Texas has sent a Republican senator to Washington since reconstruction days following the Civil War.

Forrest Weimhold, 46 year old publisher of the Levelland Sun-News, died last Thursday night of a heart attack. This man was our friend and he was a friend of all Texas newspapermen. Not only was he our friend but he probably had more influence in shaping our lives than any other person.

It had never occurred to me to enter the printing and newspaper business back in 1936 when I was in high school and started working for Weimhold, who was then fresh out of Texas Tech and publisher of the Sudan News. At any rate, he started me out as a printer's devil and I began to learn the printing trade. That, in turn, brought about a series of events, like going to Texas Tech, studying journalism; meeting a girl who was also a journalism major and marrying her; re-entering the weekly newspaper field working for this same man after the war; and eventually winding up in Bronte.

Weimhold's career in the newspaper business has been somewhat spectacular. From Sudan he went to Levelland. He grew along with his city and developed the Levelland field from a weekly into a semi-weekly, and then into an afternoon daily newspaper. He also established a radio station in the South Plains town some ten years ago. He sold the station last fall.

He had earned the respect of newsmen over the state of Texas and only next month was slated to become president of the Texas Press Association.

The sudden end of so brilliant a career is deeply mourned by his fellow townsmen, by residents of the South Plains, by his many friends all over the state. It was a deep personal loss to us.

He was married November 23, 1935 to Mildred Irene Shults at Stanton. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and the Church of Christ.

Graveside Masonic rites were conducted at the Fairview Cemetery under the direction of Cliff Funeral Home.

Announcement has been made by officials of the Bronte Church of Christ that the church will begin at once with a new and completely modern church building. Estimated cost of the new structure is \$30,000 to \$35,000.

The new building will be constructed on the same site as the present building, which is being moved to the south side of the church's property and will be used until the new building is completed. Plans for disposal of the old

building are not definite, and one elder for the church said there is a possibility that it will be retained for church use.

The new structure will be tied onto the five Sunday School classrooms which were built adjacent to the south side of the church building a few years ago. The entire structure, including the older classrooms will be bricked. The new building will be of laminated beam construction and will be semi-circular in shape. It will

be 40 x 70 feet and in addition to containing the church auditorium, will house three more classrooms, the minister's study and a nursery.

The new building will be centrally air conditioned and heated and will have indirect lighting throughout. Seating capacity will be increased to 300 persons.

Joe Wolf, local minister, and C. E. Bruton, an elder in the church, said that the local Church of Christ congregation has needed additional space and facilities for some time, and once the decision was made to build, they are ready to go with the construction.

Charles Gray of Hobbs, N. M., is the contractor. Bruton said he has recently completed several new church buildings in Texas and New Mexico.

Statement Issued On Sewer Tie-ons

Bronte's city council issued a statement this week concerning tying on to the city's new sewer system. According to the council there has been some misunderstanding on the matter of hooking on from houses to the mains and members said they hope the statement will clear up any problems arising.

Here is the statement: "It has come to the attention of the City Council that some people in the community have the mistaken idea that we have forced some plumbers out of town and have shown favoritism. It is true that we have an ordinance as to the type of pipe and type of fitting that will be used for a tie in from the houses to the main sewer line. This ordinance is on file at the City Hall and any plumber or any individual who wishes can refer to this ordinance and tie on to the sewer as long as they tie on according to the ordinance. After careful consideration we accepted the type of pipe and fitting because we feel that no part of the sewer is any better than its weakest part. The sewer system belongs to the people and we feel that the stronger the initial system the less upkeep and maintenance will result, thereby saving money for all concerned in the long run."

M. J. Krall has seeded about 60 acres of Blue Panic in row for pasture. He also has had about 80 acres of brush controlled by treedoing and seeded to a mixture of native and introduced grasses. The above practices were done through the Great Plains Conservation Program on his place three miles west of Robert Lee.

A soil conservation district plan has been approved on the Mattie McCutchen place operated by L. F. McCutchen.

A conservation plan has also been approved on Clark Glenn just north of Tennyson.

A net wire cross fence has been constructed on the Sid Eubanks stock farm about 6 miles north of Bronte. The fence was installed as part of his Great Plains Contract to protect a seeded area and to enable him to get more even distribution of grazing.

S. C. Sayner with assistance from the SCS has developed a conservation plan for his ranch near Tennyson. Practices will include brush control by aerial and basal spraying, seeding of grasses, range deferment, and proper use on pasture land. Practices on cropland will include terracing, and planting of perennial grasses.

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

I am employed by a major mining company here and for several years have enjoyed the acquaintance of Mr. Ed Holman, who is also employed here and is originally from Coke County. Ed subscribes to your paper and passes it on to me. Now and then I see a name in print that strikes a chord of memory, for I once went to high school near you at Norton in 1932. I have been away for about 28 years.

This illustration of the big ore truck going from the shovel to the mill gives a graphic picture of the modern day mining methods used now. The ore body is first stripped of the overhead waste after it is diamond drilled and located, then a pit is formed as the ore body is hauled away to be processed. In the left of the picture on the far bench is the rotary drill preparing holes in the solid rock for blasting powder. After the copper laden rock is

broken up it is loaded in 20 yard trucks by the electric shovel and sent to the crusher to be crushed for the mill. It is then milled and concentrated and shipped to the smelter at El Paso, to be there the final copper product. This way, a low grade ore can be profitable, by volume.

This plate is my own design and my personal property and you may feel free to use it if you care to. I thought perhaps the local

people might be interested to learn what one of the wandering sons of Coke County was doing now and so did Ed.
