Farm Home Committeeman Named

Finnell E. Smith of the Edith Community is the new member of the Coke County Committee for the Farm Home Administration. He succeeds the late Delmir Sheppard.

Smith's farming operation consists principally of livestock farming. He operates some 2130 acres

in cultivation and range land, of which he owns some 630 acres. His livestock operation consists principally of sheep with a few head of beef cattle.

A World War II veteran, Smith served in the Army Infantry and D. M. L. Headquarters with General MacArthur in Australia and New Guinea. He is also a former member of the Robert Lee School board. He is a member and deacon in the First Baptist Church and active in Masonic Lodge work.

Chester L. Sinclair, County Supervisor for both Nolan and Coke Counties, said that Smith's practical experience will enable him to make a real contribution to the County Committee actions when they review loan applications.

Serving with Smith during the coming year will be Vlademir V. Wojtek, senior member and chairman of the committee of Robert Lee, and James P. Arrott, committeeman from Tennyson.

UCRA to Study Plans for Bronte Water System Improvements

L. T. Youngblood, chairman of the Upper Colorado River Authority, has called a meeting of the group for Thursday, Aug. 3, to study plans and specifications for proposed water system improvements in the City of Bronte.

UCRA engineers, Parkhill, Smith & Cooper of Lubbock, have sub-

mitted plans for the proposed improvements and they were approved by the city council in a special meeting Monday night. It is expected that the UCRA will give final approval to the plans at the meeting next week and will authorize advertising for bids.

Main item of the improvement

program will be construction of a half million gallon storage reservoir at the site of the present water treatment plant in north Bronte. The big tank will be made of concrete and will be covered, so it can be used to store water which has been treated and filtered.

Other improvements will include construction of a new eight-inch water main from the filter plant to the stand pipes. Also, a new six inch line will be laid along East Railroad Street from Oliver to Reilly where it will connect with an existing line. Several six inch feeder lines will be laid from this six-inch main to existing lines. Eight new three-way fire plugs will also be installed on the new lines.

Engineers' estimate of total cost is \$67,053.38. However, actual cost will not be known until bids are received and opened. The UCRA is going to finance the project for the City of Bronte, and will loan the money to the city interest free. Repayment of the loan will commence when the present indebtedness to the UCRA is retired. Present payments amount to \$700 per month to retire the cost of the pipeline from Oak Creek Lake and the existing filter and treatment plant.

Engineers have pointed out that the proposed improvements should relieve Bronte's water shortage on hot summer days when a great number of local residents are watering yards, gardens, etc. They said in a letter to the UCRA officials that the problem is not one of being able to pump enough water from Oak Creek Lake, but rather of having capacity to store water in sufficient quantities to take care of peak periods of the day. The need has not been so apparent this summer, because of the large amount of rain which has fallen in this area. Last summer, however, the situation became critical on many days, particularly late in the afternoons when so many persons were watering.

The UCRA, in addition to financing Bronte's pipeline and these proposed improvements, has in recent years financed Mountain Creek Lake and treatment plant at Robert Lee, and water systems for Christoval and Carlsbad in Tom Green County. All the money has been loaned the towns interest free.

Baptist Revival Now in Progress

A revival meeting is in progress this week at the First Baptist Church in Bronte. Rev. Taylor Henley, pastor of Immanuel Baptist Church of San Angelo, is the visiting evangelist. J. O. Strother, educational director of First Baptist Church in Pecos, is in charge of the singing.

Rev. Lester Vinson, pastor of the church, said that everyone is invited to attend the remainder of the services. The meeting will be concluded Sunday night.

Morning services are held each day at 7 a. m., while evening services begin at 7:40 p. m. when prayer groups meet. Evening preaching service begins at 8 p. m.

61 Longhorn Football Schedule Announced; Practice Starts 14th

Coach Bob Howard announced this week that Bronte's first football game of the 1961 season will be played with May on Sept. 8. Ten games will be played this season with the last one on Nov. 10 with Robert Lee. The last five games of the season will be conference games.

The first five games, through the game with Roscoe, will have kick-off time set at 8 p. m. Remainder of the games, except with Trent, will be at 7:30 p. m. Bronte's homecoming date has been set for Oct. 27, when the Longhorns play Roby. Dad's Night will be Oct. 13, the date of the encounter with the Hermleigh Cardinals.

Coach Howard said, "The prospects look good right now for a very successful season." He added, "Potentially we have the best team we've had since I came to Bronte, but of course, it's too early to tell too much about the outcome."

The coach announced that football practice will begin Aug. 14, and that the annual football camp will be held the week beginning Aug. 21. Help is needed with the camp, Howard said. Donations of food, money and time will be appreciated. Anyone who wishes to assist the Longhorns in any way on the camp project should contact Howard, Supt. C. B. Barbee, or Conda Richards, president of the Longhorn Club.

Bronte high school will play a six-game schedule with its B team this year, and the same number of games are planned for the junior high team. Howard said that four games have already been scheduled for each of these teams. Games on the B team schedule will be played on Thursday afternoons, while the junior high games are set for Tuesday nights.

The coach said he expects about 32 boys to come out for football this season.

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County Agents News Column

Insects in the cotton fields have not built up to "push the panic button" proportions, but certainly close observation of cotton fields for boll weevil and boll worm build ups would be time well spent.

The "scourge of the South," the boll weevil appears to be the insect of the greatest concern at the moment. In six of 12 fields checked last week, boll weevils were found in from light to heavy numbers. Only one field had a heavy infestation—10 of 30 squares checked were punctured. However, build ups could occur in the others in the next two to four weeks.

The boll weevils' cycle is hard to break after the first generation has hatched off. However, if they can be controlled before the second generation begins to lay eggs in the squares and/or bolls, then a build up should be avoided until late in the summer or in the early fall.

The boll weevil may not be a pest of concern, but the way they are started and because our cotton is late, a build up now could be very costly before the season is out.

Several Coke County operators and I attended a meeting in San Angelo Saturday at which the possibilities of a screw worm control program being inaugurated in this area were discussed. Screw worms have been very costly in the County this year as well as elsewhere and a control program

could mean a large savings to a State the size of Texas. Such a program would be costly, but in a year like this one, screw worm losses and treatment costs are also costly.

Such a program is no longer a research man's dream. A program is expected to be launched in the near future to control screw worms in Texas.

The plan presented in the meeting Saturday would be a stock owner supported and operated program. The leaders of the movement hope to secure enough support to seed sterile blow flies in a 100 mile wide area along the Texas border next to Mexico and New Mexico. Research studies made in the last several years have shown that winter kills blow flies in an ordinary winter north of that point. By seeding the northern edge of the overwintering area, northward movements can be prevented.
