Mr. and Mrs. Sims are announcing the sale in an ad in this issue of this newspaper, and Ivey is also running an ad inviting continued patronage of the firm.

Included in the sale were tanks, trucks, lines, etc., used in the sale of butane in Bronte and Robert Lee. Ivey said that he will continue operation of a truck in both Robert Lee and Bronte. Wesley Kinsey will remain as Robert Lee representative of the firm.

In announcing the sale, Mr. and Mrs. Sims said they found it necessary to dispose of the butane business for reasons of health. They will continue to operate their hardware store and automatic laundry in Bronte. The firm will be known as Sims Hardware and Ivey's business will be known as Butane Service Co.

Mr. and Mrs. Sims expressed their appreciation given them during their six years of servicing the butane needs of their customers in Robert Lee and Bronte.

Ivey will maintain an office in the Sims Hardware building for the time being, at least until he has time to secure quarters for his new business.

worked out the plans, and representatives of Bronte city council.

The UCRA is financing the improvements for Bronte's water distribution facilities. Estimated cost of the work is \$67,053.38. Included in the improvements will be a half million gallon covered reservoir for storage of treated water. City officials are hopeful that the big reservoir will alleviate Bronte's water shortage on hot summer days when facilities are taxed to the limit on account of residents' watering yards, gardens, etc.

Also included in the plans are some new eight and six inch water mains, which are expected to more adequately distribute water over the city. Eight new fire plugs are also planned.

Purpose of today's meeting is to study the plans and specifications prepared by the engineers. If the plans are approved, it is expected that the UCRA will give the go ahead to the project by authorizing its officers to advertise for bids on the project. City officials said they expect the project to be completed in time for use next summer.
