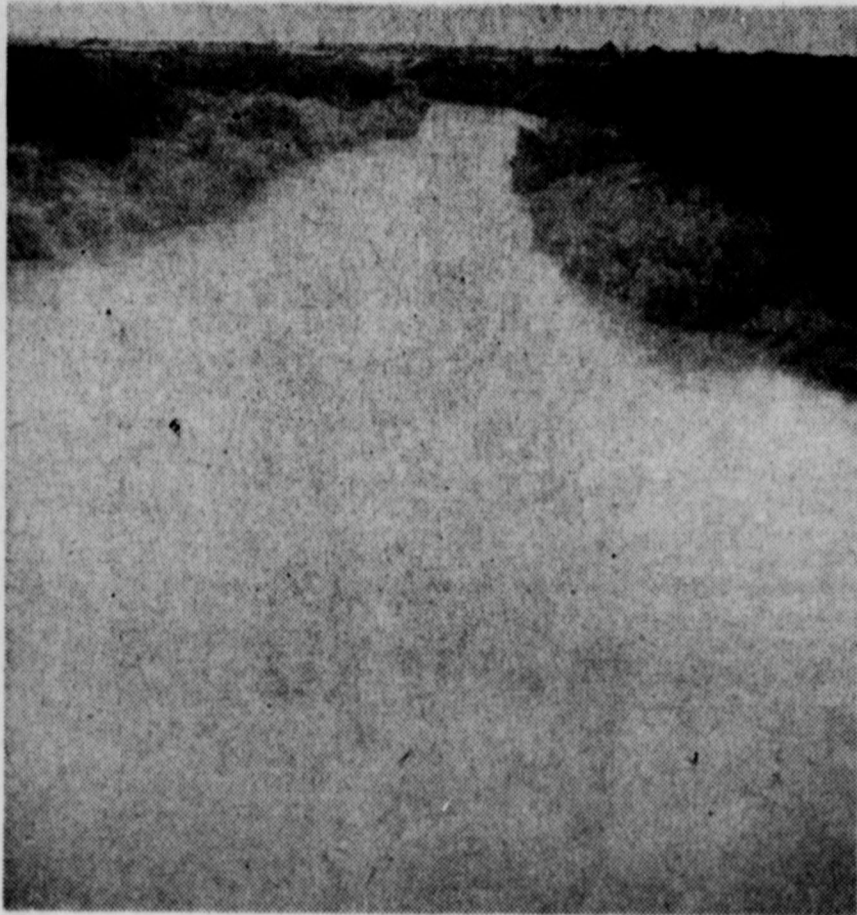

Labor Day Barbecue Postponed Till Sat.

The annual Labor Day barbecue which was scheduled Monday at the Bronte County Park was postponed until Saturday because of the heavy rains which fell Sunday night and Monday morning.

Aubrey Denman, who is in charge of arrangements for the big celebration, said the schedule of events will follow the same order as announced last week for Monday. Only exception will be

that the swimming pool will open at noon and everybody is invited to swim free of charge. Denman said the free swimming period was moved up to the afternoon because of the chance that weather might be too cool for evening swimming.

The crowd is expected to start gathering at the park at 5 p. m. The swimming pool will be closed at 5:30 and supper will be served at 6.

Ladies of the community are invited to bring salads for the community-wide supper. They are requested not to bring deserts this year.

Denman said that a musical group from Tennyson will provide entertainment for those present at the barbecue. Plenty of time will also be allotted for attendants to get in some time visiting with their neighbors.

Denman said that everybody is invited to attend the barbecue. It is sponsored, largely, by merchants of Bronte, and plenty of food will be available for the expected record breaking crowd.

Longhorn Club Work Party Set Thursday Night

A working party has been planned for Thursday night at 7:30 o'clock for members of the Longhorn Booster Club and others who are interested in helping the 1961 Bronte Longhorns. Conda Richards, president of the club, said the working party will take the place of the regular meeting of the club.

Coach Bob Howard said there is not too much work to do toward getting the field and stands ready for the first game Friday night, but that a few finishing touches need to be applied.

Richards invited everyone who wants to help the football team to be on hand at 7:30 with their working clothes on.

8 Inch Rain Gives Area Best Season in Years

One of the finest September rains ever to fall in this area fell Sunday night and Monday morning. Measurement reached over nine inches in some parts of this county and surrounding area. In the City of Bronte 8½ inches was

measured. The rain commenced falling Sunday evening about 7 o'clock and fell almost continuously until after 8 a. m. Monday. Little damage from the deluge was reported, and creeks around Bronte were able to take care of

the runoff.

Farmers and ranchmen were jubilant over the large rain, and said any damage which may have been done was many times outweighed by the moisture. They expect a good growth of grass to result before frost. It was also pointed out that the moisture will help the cotton crop. County agent Sterling Lindsey, in his column this week, warned that the heavy rain may bring on a swarm of damaging insects, however.

Heaviest fall reported in the Bronte area was on the ranch of A. N. and Joe Rawlings, southwest of Bronte. They received 9½ inches and no damage was noted from the excessive rainfall. Atlantic Pipe Line Station, south of town, received 8¼ inches. F. S. Higginbotham, who lives north of town, had 5½ inches, and Sam Gray, also north of Bronte, reported 5-6 inches. LeDrew Arrott said they received 4½ inches on their ranch southwest of town. Various amounts from 5 to 7 inches were reported in the Tennyson and Orient communities. Blackwell had 5.4 inches, while Oak Creek Lake reported a fall of 4.66 inches.

Accurate measurements were hard to find on the Sunday night rain, as most gauges ran over and their owners could only estimate the amount of rainfall.

Bronte Water Superintendent B. D. Mackey said that Oak Creek Lake rose about 18 inches from the rainfall. The lake is still down several feet below spillway level.

The rain was caused, weathermen say, by the meeting of warm moist air with a severe cold front. The cold front dumped heavy snowfall in the Rocky Mountain area and dropped temperatures to 36 degrees at Dalhart in the Texas Panhandle.

Barney Griffin Gins First Bale

Barney Griffin, who farms in the Juniper community, raised the first bale of 1961 cotton in Coke County, so far as has been reported to The Enterprise. It was ginned Aug. 30 at Castleberry Gin at Miles.

The first 1961 bale weighed 485 pounds.

Longhorns Start 1961 Season Friday Night Against May 11

Football fans will have their first chance Friday night to see the 1961 version of the Bronte Longhorns in real action. The team will take on an eleven from May. Kickoff time is 8 o'clock.

Dopesters have the game mapped out as being fairly easy for the favored Longhorns, as they say the May team is not too strong again this year.

The Longhorns have been undergoing some strenuous practice sessions the last few weeks getting ready for the coming season. They have made a good showing against several neighboring teams in scrimmage sessions. A real test will be in store for them next week when they travel to Ozona to take on the Class A Lions. Ozona will be seeking revenge for the 29-24 defeat handed them by the Longhorns last year.

Admission prices this year will be \$1.00 for adults, 50 cents for students and pre-schoolers will be admitted free. Tickets will be sold by members of the Bronte Lions Club and other interested school patrons this year.

No cars except those directly related to the playing of the football game will be allowed inside the fence, according to school officials. Cars wishing to park on the visitors' side of the field may get in line and go onto the stadium area when the gates are opened one hour before game time.

The football field is in excellent condition with a heavy turf of grass. The stadium boasts a new flagpole this year. The pole was erected by the Sorosis Club of Bronte.

School officials announced the following schedule for starting the football game: the National Anthem, pledge to the flag led by a high school student, with fans standing facing the flag; the invocation by Rev. R. W. Blackmon; visitors' school song; and Bronte school song. Two Boy Scouts will raise and lower the flag.

Final arrangements are being made this week for an improved P. A. system, which is to be installed.

Whorter June 20, 1936. During a short period between the time he was superintendent here and when he started campaigning for county judge, he operated a dairy in Bronte.

During the time he was Coke County Judge, he was elected as secretary, then president in 1952 of the West Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association. In 1953 he served as president of the Texas Association of County Judges and Commissioners.

The former judge had been in ill health for about 15 years and had been an invalid for the past several years. He spent a great deal of time in various clinics and hospitals, seeking relief from the rheumatoid arthritis from which he suffered. During May and June of this year he was a patient at the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, and apparently was much improved when he returned. However, he had to be hospitalized only a few weeks ago for treatment of stomach ulcers.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Jerry Mack and Tony Ed Dean and a daughter, Della Katherine Dean, all of the home; his mother of Weatherford; two brothers, Hill Edmond Dean of Lubbock, Douglas Dean of Robert Lee; six sisters, Mrs. Nora May of New York, N.
