Bronte's New Post Office



Post Office Moves Into New Building Wednesday Morning

There was quite a bit of confusion at the Bronte post office Wednesday morning. It was the first day the office occupied its new home on Washington Street. Postmaster Noah Pruitt Jr. was busy showing patrons how to open their new boxes and some of them were having difficulty learning the new combinations.

Workers have been busy for the past several days with the moving job, and it was completed Tuesday, so the office could open in the new structure Wednesday morning.

The building is owned by Kenneth L. Musgrave of Abilene. He has leased it to the Post Office Department for 10 years with an option for an additional 10 years. Private ownership of post office buildings allows the property to remain on local tax rolls, whereas, if it were government owned, no

local taxes could be collected on it.

Having an area of 2,639 square feet, the new building is constructed of brick and concrete. It is centrally heated and air conditioned. Fluorescent lighting has been installed throughout the building. The new post office is designed so that customers will be waited on over a counter instead of through windows. The part of the building where the boxes are located is separated from the sales department by a glass wall and door which is locked after hours. The side of the building which contains the boxes will remain open at all hours.

A paved loading area is located behind the building, and paved parking area is located south of the new structure. A mail box has been erected in front for convenience of those who wish to

mail letters from their cars.

Most of the fixtures in the office are new. However, some of the furniture in the old office has been repainted and is in use.

A formal opening of the new post office will be held Dec. 7. Bronte Lions Club is sponsoring the program. Congressman O. C. Fisher will be on hand, as will Dale Buckley of Dallas, field service officer with the Post Office Department. Open house will be held during the day and the program will be at 2:45 p.m.

Postmaster Pruitt said the new building is modern in every respect and will be a definite asset to the city. "We hope the new building will make doing business with the post office more pleasant for our patrons," he said, "and we also hope it will enable us to render better service to them."

Longhorns to Meet Canutillo Eagles on Local Gridiron

Bronte will be host at a bi-district playoff Saturday night at 7:30 when the Bronte Longhorns play the Canutillo Eagles. The Longhorns gained admittance to the select bi-district circle last Friday when they defeated Robert Lee, 25-8, while the Eagles won District 5-B by defeating Clint.

The Longhorns won a toss with Canutillo after the games last week, and thereby became the host team for the bi-district playoff. High School Principal Joe B. Simpson, Larry Robinson, Jerry McCutchen and Bobby Wrinkle scouted the Eagles last Friday and made the arrangements following the game.

Canutillo is located northwest of El Paso just this side of the New Mexico border. Simpson said it is a town about the size of Norton and the school has been playing football only the last two years.

District 5-B is made up of only three schools, Canutillo, Clint and Dell City. They play a double round robin series to determine the district winner.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said this week that a large crowd is expected for the game and he hopes to have some additional bleachers moved to the field. If the added seats are moved in, Barbee said that parking space on the visitors' side of the field will be limited, and there will no space to park on the north side.

An advance ticket sale is being conducted by the Longhorn Club. Tickets may be purchased from Central Drug, at Bob Wilson Barber Shop, from members of the Longhorn Club, and at the office of the school superintendent. Tickets are \$1.50 for adults and 75c for students.

Programs for the game will for sale at admission gates. The programs have been distributed free of charge all season, courtesy of Bronte business men, but they will be sold for 10 cents at the game.

Winner of the Saturday night game will play the winner of the Gorman-Eden game which will be played Friday night in Eden. This game will decide the regional champions and will end the 1961 season for Class B schools in this area of West Texas.

A pep rally will be held in downtown Bronte Saturday at 4:30 p. m. School officials urge that fans turn out for the pep rally as well as the game.

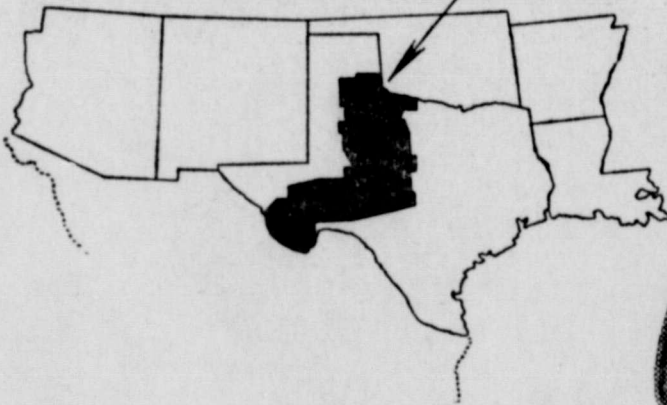

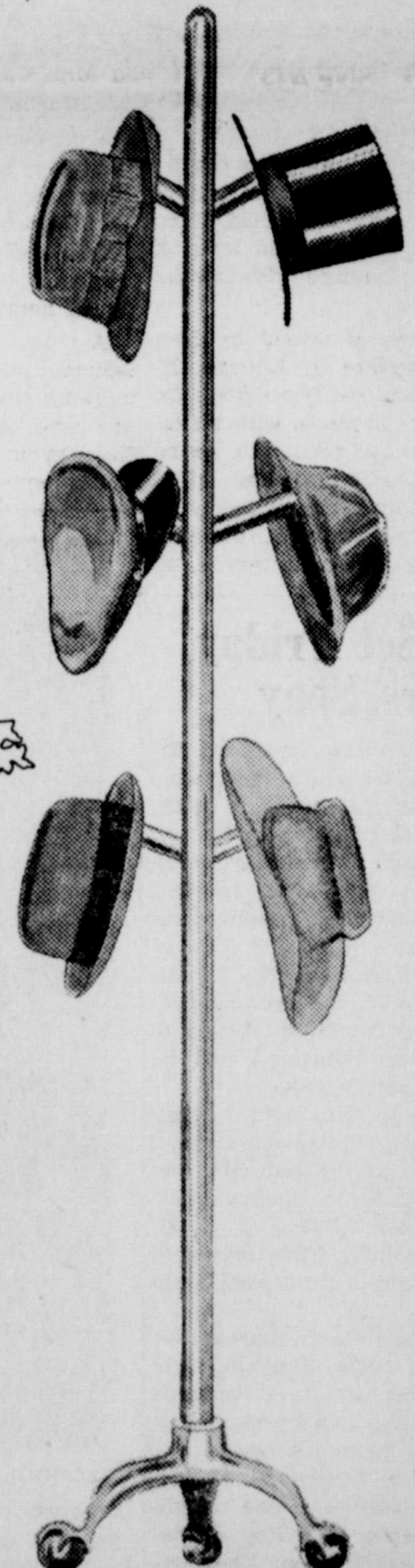

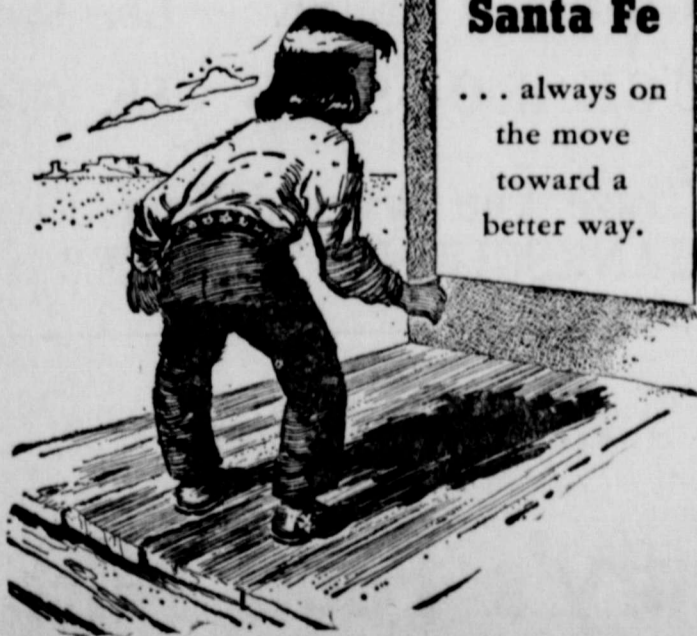

Work Underway On Storage Tank

Work is underway on a new storage tank that will add a half million gallons to the water storage capacity of the Bronte waterworks system. Contractor on the job is Texas Lawn Sprinkler Co. of Amarillo.

Also included in the project is construction of a considerable amount of new 8 inch and 6 inch water mains. Pipe for the new lines has been distributed along the routes where they will be laid.

Cost of the waterworks improvement project will be \$55,955. Money for the work is being furnished interest free by the Upper Colorado River Authority. It will be paid back by the city over a period of years.

The new storage tank is located near the water filtering plant in north Bronte.

Longhorns Defeat Steers; Win Dist. Title

Bronte Longhorns took a reasonably easy 25-8 victory Friday night from Robert Lee Steers to win the championship of District 6-B. The Longhorns made their 25 points on three touchdowns, a field goal and two successful conversions.

Tommy Boecking got things to rolling with the kickoff, which went to John Kinsey, Steer quarterback, who ran it out to his 24 yard line. After three tries the Robert Lee lads had to punt. It went to Dee Arrott who handed off to Rudy Olivas. Olivas went up to the Bronte 45 before he was stopped.

A nice pass from Arrott to Charles Lee set up a 1st down for Bronte on the Steer 31. After making 6 yards on the 1st down, Arrott handed off to Olivas on the 2nd, and he went to the 15 for another 1st. Fullback Buddy Walker picked up 2 through the middle and then the Longhorns were penalized 5 for back field in motion. A couple of tries were stopped by the Steers, leaving Bronte with a 4th and 14 situation. Coach Bob Howard sent Boecking in with his kicking shoe on. Boecking booted the ball between the uprights for 3 points and Bronte went ahead 3-0.

Boecking's kickoff went to the 30 where C. Hallmark was stopped for no return. Kinsey, Curtis Higginbotham and Joe Roe made good yardage and picked up a 1st down. Their drive was stopped 2 plays later, however, when a Steer fumble was recovered by Olivas on his own 44. Seven yards by Walker and a pass from Arrott to Eddie Glenn gave the Longhorns a 1st on the Steer 45. The Longhorns continued to push forward to the 25 where they were stopped by Steer defenders.

The Steers took over, but couldn't make the needed yardage. Roe punted to the Longhorn 45. From there, Walker, Arrott and Olivas carried the ball up to the Steer 4 yard line where it was 1st and goal. Bronte then drew a 5 yard penalty for backfield in motion. With the ball on the 9, Arrott carried twice up to the 1, and then went over the double stripe. Boecking's conversion kick missed, leaving the score at 9-0.

Boecking's kick went into the end zone where Kinsey took it, but he made it only to the 12 where Olivas nailed him. Roe carried three times for 6 yards, but a penalty wiped most of it out. He then punted to the 27. On the first play of the new series, Arrott made 19 yards for a 1st and goal to go on the 8. Arrott then carried for 5 and again for 2 before he went over from the Steer 1 yard line. Walker ran the conversion try for an extra 2 points. Score 17-0.

Second Half

Roe's kick fell short and the Longhorns took the ball on the Ro-

bert Lee 44 to start the 2nd period of play. The local lads bogged down, and C. Lee punted to the 21. From that point the Steers started a passing attack. Bobby Allen almost intercepted the first one and Olivas snagged the second and ran it all the way to the Steer 11 yard line. Arrott made 5 and Walker added almost 5 more. On the next try Arrott carried the ball over, and then he carried over the conversion, to make the score 25-0.

After Boecking's kick the Steers got a drive to going, with good ground gains, and two complete passes from Kinsey to D. Walker. The Steers worked their way up to midfield, and Kinsey unravelled another pass, but again Olivas was waiting and pulled the ball out of the air, giving it to the Longhorns on their own 34. Lee made a 14 yard run to the 48, and after two carries, which netter 1 yard, Lee quick kicked. It looked as though the ball would stop inside the Steer 10, but Lee put a little too much stuff on it, and it rolled across the goal line, for a touchback. Roe and Higginbotham carried for good gains, making 2 1st downs and working the ball up to the 44. There a 5 yard penalty and the Bronte line stopped them for practically no gain. The Steers punted and Lee ran the ball all the way back to the Steer 47 yard line. With steady ground gains and complete passes from Lee to Eddie Glenn and Malcom Johnson, the Longhorns were on the 20 yard line with a 4th down and 6 yards to go. Once again Boecking donned his kicking shoe, but his field goal attempt was no good. Robert Lee took over on their own 20 yard line.

From that point the Steers started their march which would result in their only counter of the game. Roe, Higginbotham and Kinsey carried to the Longhorn 7 yard line. From there Lynn White went across the double stripe, and Higginbotham carried the conversion over, making the score 25-8.

Robert Lee had time to kick off and the Longhorns got off 3 plays before the ball game was over.

The Steers were seriously hampered in their offensive efforts by Jack Corley, Russell Brown, Olivas, Walker, Johnson, Lee, Joe Shaver, Leslie Brice, Tony Montez and Rudy Phillips.
