Water District Officers Call For Bids on Flood Control Dams

Officers and directors of Coke County Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 have called for bids on construction of two flood control dams on the Kickapoo watershed. The bids are on sites No. 1 and No. 4. The bids will be opened at 2 p. m. on Dec. 19.

Site No. 1 is located on land owned by Barton Waldrop, while site No. 4 is located on W. D. (Pete) McDonald's property.

The Invitation to Bidders is being published in this week's Enterprise, and will be run for three consecutive weeks.

F. S. Higginbotham, chairman of the WCID, said this week that much work and preparation has gone into this project and that the opening of bids on the first two structures will be quite an occasion for the water district's board of directors.

Work toward getting the million dollar flood control project actually started soon after the disastrous flood in 1953. There was much talk and some meetings were held, but interest in the project lagged until another flood hit the area in 1957. This flood, not so damaging as the 1953 flood, served notice to residents of the area that they could expect the high water oftener

than they liked. One estimate of damage says the Kickapoo Creeks have done more than \$2 million damage in the past 30 years, the heaviest of this in 1953 and 1957.

In December, 1957, the project had been pushed by Bronte Lions Club to the point where a steering committee was named to work on the project. Higginbotham was named chairman of this committee and members were W. D. McDonald, Noah Pruitt, Sr., Austin Sandusky, J. A. Percifull, Preston Davis and Edward Rawlings.

Many meetings were held, tours of similar projects were made, and the ball was started to rolling.

A special bill was passed by the Texas Legislature in June 1959, creating the water district. This was a major hurdle and gave the organization a legal status with authority to act. The next big project was to get the approval of the area embraced by the district to vote a tax to support it. The election was called in December, 1959, for Jan. 12, 1960. The election carried 132-27.

In July, 1959, organization of the district was completed. Higginbotham was named president; D. K. Glenn, vice president; J. A. Percifull, secretary; Preston Davis

and Austin Sandusky, directors.

With its organization set up and preliminary planning taken care of the Kickapoo district was ready to start making concrete plans. First thing needed was assurance that federal money would be available for the project. The Congress approved the bill locating the money last fall.

Another big step on the project became a reality in March of this year, when a five-man survey crew arrived to make the survey for the dams.

Regional Game Set For Thursday at 2:30

The injury-riddled Bronte Longhorns will host the Eden Bulldogs Thursday in a Thanksgiving Day regional playoff game at 2 p. m. The two schools will meet as a result of both winning bi-district games last weekend. The Longhorns defeated the Canutillo Eagles, 39-20, while Eden defeated Gorman, 13-6.

The Longhorns will be without the services of Fullback Buddy Walker who sustained a broken leg in the game with Canutillo. The team's starting blocking back and quarterback, Eddie Spiller, is still out with a back injury received at Trent three weeks ago.

Coach Bob Howard said Tuesday that Bronte's star ball carrier, Tailback Lee Arrott, is on the "doubtful" list, having had a knee injury all season. The coach said Arrott might be able to play by Thursday, but that at Monday's

workout he was not able to run.

End Charles Lee, who fills in for Arrott, also has a knee injury received in the Canutillo game. Rudy Olivas, the other starting back for the Longhorns, has a bruised knee, but Howard thought it would be all right by Thursday.

Reports from Eden say they are also suffering from injuries, but not so much as are the Longhorns. Troy Allen Choate, who was a prospective good backfield man this year, has been out all season. More recent injuries have removed Halfback Wayne (Slick) Brown and Guard Roger Smith from the active list.

Bronte residents will be interested to know that Wayne Bridges, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Bridges, former Bronte residents, is a starting guard for the Bulldogs. He is the grandson of Mrs. B. F. Bridges of Bronte.

Coach Howard said the boys are in a good frame of mind for the ball game and if determination can win it they have a chance. "If we win it will be on tape and guts," the coach said.

Eden has a better season record than the Longhorns, having won seven, lost two and tied one, in addition to their bi-district win over Gorman. The Longhorns won five, lost three and tied two in regular season play.

Tennyson Church Total Loss Following Fire

A large crowd of Tennyson residents as well as interested passers-by had to stand helplessly last Sunday afternoon while the Tennyson Baptist Church burned to the ground.

The fire was discovered shortly before five o'clock and the Bronte Fire Department was called, but by the time the truck arrived the fire was burning fiercely. However, the Bronte crew was able to bring the fire fairly well in check when the tank ran out of water. No water was obtainable in the vicinity, so by the time the truck came

back to Bronte and refilled the tank it was too late to save the building.

Some of the equipment in the back part of the building, which housed the church kitchen was saved, along with a piano.

The fire apparently caught in the ceiling, as when it was first discovered smoke was boiling from the roof and had filled the building, but no fire was seen in the down inside part of the building.

Rev. Robert Ritchie of San Angelo, pastor of the church, said that the congregation will meet

at the Tennyson community center for the time being. No plans for rebuilding have been learned.

The Tennyson church was completed and dedicated in 1952. The frame and stucco building had a seating capacity of 100 persons in its sanctuary. The building also contained five Sunday School rooms and the kitchen and fellowship hall at the rear.

The Tennyson Baptist Church building was the only one in southeast Coke County, and served a wide area in this county as well as northern Tom Green and western Runnels counties.

Longhorns Win Bi-District Title; Defeat Canutillo 39-20

The expert ball handling of Dee Arrott backed up by all his teammates carried the Bronte Longhorns to a bi-district victory over the Canutillo Eagles Saturday night. The game was played at Stephenson Field here in Bronte.

Bronte made six touchdowns in the ball game, with Arrott carrying two of them over and Charles Lee carrying another. The other three were on passes from Arrott to Eddie Glenn, Lee and Tommy Boecking. Canutillo's three counters all came on pass plays from Quarterback Manny Molina to Ricky Salinas, Sylvester Reyes and Rey Ochoa.

First Half

Tommy Boecking kicked off for the Longhorns to Vicente Arias who ran the ball out to his own 36. The Eagles couldn't gain and suffered a six yard loss when Tommy Lee got through to tackle the ball carrier behind the line of scrimmage. After three futile attempts Mario Moreno punted to the Bronte 47, where the Longhorns took over.

Buddy Walker, Arrott and Rudy Olivas carried the ball for three 1st downs but were checked on their fourth effort by the Eagles and had to give up the ball on the Canutillo 13 yard line. Reyes carried twice and Arias once for a

total of 5 yards, so once again the Eagles were forced to kick. It was partially blocked and stopped on the Eagle 44 yard line. A Longhorn fumble was recovered by Ralph Rivera, so the Eagles took possession on their own 47.

The Eagles started a drive that was to give them one 1st down before C. Lee intercepted an Eagle pass and returned it to the Canutillo 45. Arrott tried two passes but they were high, then he picked up 5 but left the Longhorns with a 4th and 5 to go. Lee punted to the Eagle 19. The Eagles, with the help of a 15 yard penalty against Bronte, were able to make a 1st down before they had to punt. Olivas took the kick and returned it 49 yards to the Canutillo 16 yard line.

Olivas fine runback set up the Longhorns for their first TD. Arrott carried the ball three times in a row for the needed 16 yards to give the Longhorns a 6-0 lead. Arrott's conversion pass was no good.

Boecking kicked and the Eagles got up to the 33. Three passes were broken up by C. Lee and Bobby Allen, forcing the Eagles to punt. Bronte took the ball on their own 26. Arrott made short yardage and threw an incomplete pass intended for Olivas. On the next play Arrott connected with Eddie Glenn for a 62 yard pass play which took the Longhorns across the double stripe. Arrott ran the conversion to give the Longhorns a 14-0 lead.

Boecking's kick was taken by Molena and the Eagles had the ball on their 28. Molena threw two incomplete passes and had his arm cocked for another try when Rudy Phillips got through and nailed him for a 12 yard loss. The Eagles punted to the 48 where Ar-

rott took the ball and ran it back 30 yards to the 18. On the next play Arrott tossed an aerial to C. Lee for 18 yards and the third TD. Conversion was no good, so the score was 20-0.

After the kickoff Canutillo threatened its only time in the first half of the ball game. Arias started on his 30 and got down to the Bronte 20 for a 50 yard gain before Allen tackled him. Jack Corley went through the Eagle line to throw the visitors for a 14 yard loss and Leslie Brice stopped Angel Perales for a 2 yard gain before the half ended.

Second Half

After the kickoff, the Longhorns were forced to punt, and the Eagles were ready for their first touchdown drive. After pushing the ball up to the 3 yard line Molena tossed a pass to Salinas for the tally. Score 20-6. After the kickoff the Longhorns were unable to move the ball past their own 37, so C. Lee punted to the Eagle 29. A penalty called the play back and Lee punted again, this time to the Eagle 45. Salinas picked up good yards on one carry. After that short gains and long penalties against the Longhorns moved the ball down to the Bronte 22. From that point Molena fired a pass to Reyes for the second Canutillo counter. Score: 20-12.

Charles Lee received the kickoff and returned the ball to his 37. Malcolm Johnson cracked the line for 11 yards and a 1st down. Lee made 4 and then Arrott, who had been out of the game since the half, came in and went for a 1st on the Eagle 41. Olivas made a yard before the end of the third quarter.

Arrott continued to make good gains and 4 downs later the ball was placed on the 7 yard line, with the help of a personal foul penalty against the Eagles. On the next play C. Lee went over his right side for the touchdown and the Longhorns increased their lead to 26-12. Boecking kicked the extra point for a 27-12 count.

Boecking kicked to Molena on the 34. After four plays, one nullified by a penalty, the Eagles were faced with a 4th and 11 situation, so they kicked. C. Lee took it and returned to his 37. Arrott tossed an incomplete pass intended for Olivas and then he gained 7 on the ground. Bronte drew a 5 yard penalty for illegal procedure, then Arrott passed 15 yards to Olivas for a 1st on the Eagle 46. Arrott and Johnson carried for a 1st down on the Canutillo 32, and Olivas added another 4 yards. The Eagles were then penalized down to the 14 on a personal foul. Committee Members Named to Work With Animal Health Foundation

The Coke County Animal Health Committee which was organized in a meeting in the county courthouse recently to cooperate with the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, has selected, in addition to the officers and steering committee named by the group last week, the following members to work with the program:

Walter King, L. B. White and Vernon Copeland from the Blackwell area; D. K. Glenn, F. S. Higginbotham, Jacob Morrow, J. L. Brunson, J. B. Mackey, J. W. Labenske in the Bronte, Olga, Marie and Hayrick areas.

C. E. Arrott, James Phillips, Hollis Ensor, Claude Ditmore and J. P. Arrott in the Southeast part of the county in the Lometa, Juniper and Tennyson areas.

South of Robert Lee in the Valley View area, Frankie Percifull and J. O. Rudd will serve on the committee, while Fred McCabe, Ben Boykin and Paul Coulter will represent the Divide, Water Valley and Wildcat areas.

Crowley Harmon and J. Q. Counts were named from the Paint Creek, Edith and the Divide to the west areas.

North and west of Robert Lee, J. W. Service, Guy Denman, Nolan Pentecost, Robert Walker and Raymond Bloodworth from the Graham Valley, Sanco, Friendship and Silver areas will serve with the committee.

The Southwest Research Foundation goal to control screw worms in Texas will require assistance and cooperation from many quarters including the livestock producers of the State.

The proposed program of holding screw worms in check by seeding a buffer zone with male sterile screw worm flies will require financial assistance to inaugurate the program. The Foundation is asking, and the Coke County Animal Health Committee will support it locally, for a small contribution per head of livestock from each producer in the state.

A contribution of 50c per head on cattle and horses, 10c per head on sheep, goats and swine is requested.

Coke County operators desiring to contribute are requested to make checks payable to the Coke County Animal Health Committee, in care of the group's secretary, William H. Allen, of Robert Lee.

The contribution made will be held in escrow until a forward movement is made on the program.

Similar programs to the one proposed for Texas and the Southwest have been conducted in Florida and on Curacao Island in the Caribbean Sea. Both were successful. Texas and the Southwest present problems not found in the two above-named areas, but they are believed surmountable. The main difference is that Texas will

have a source of reinfestation until such time as an eradication program can be conducted in Mexico.

The proposed program, basically, will involve eliminating the northward movement of the screw worm in the spring. The screw worm fly lives normally about two weeks and move northward approximately five miles a day or 70 plus miles in its lifetime. The Research Foundation desires to restrict this forward movement by seeding male sterile flies in a wide band across the northern extremities of the one wintering area and just to its north.
