## SHERIFF GIVES SUMMARY OF LAW ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITIES

Sheriff Melvin Childress has issued a summary of activities of his office during the past year.

The sheriff said he thought citizens of Coke County would be interested in some of the facts and figures concerning activities of his office and other law enforcement officers of the county.

During 1961, 48 arrests were made. Of this number, two were held for investigation and released, three were referred to Juvenile Court and dismissed. Four arrests were made and cases are still pending court action, and 36 arrests were cleared from the docket.

## County Salaries Set by Commissioners Court

The Coke County Commissioners Court set salaries for various county officials and employees for the year of 1962 at its last regular court meeting.

Some salaries for the year of 1962 had been set previously which included the county auditor's salary at \$5,800 per annum and the assistant auditor's salary at \$3,000 per annum.

The salary schedule for 1962 for Coke County officers and employees is:

County Judge, \$5,000 per year plus \$900 allowance per year for car expense.

## Ben Timmons Rites Held Here Monday Afternoon

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2:30 in the First Baptist Church here for Ben Timmons, 64, resident of Bronte since 1936. Mr. Timmons died in the Bronte Hospital Saturday evening following a long illness. He had been bedfast since last June 23 when he suffered a stroke.

Officiating at the services were Reverend C. R. Blake of Welch; Reverend Lester Vinson, pastor of First Baptist Church in Bronte and Reverend R. W. Blackmon, pastor of the Kickapoo Baptist Church in Bronte. Interment was in the Fairview cemetery under direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Born October 16, 1897 in Tahlequah, Oklahoma, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Willie T. Timmons. He completed his education in Proctor, Comanche County. Prior to moving to Bronte, he had lived in Proctor, Lamesa, Winters and San Angelo. He was engaged in farming, carpenter work, produce sales and brick laying.

Ben Timmons and Twala P. Scott of Dawson County were married December 23, 1930 in Lovington, New Mexico.

A member of the First Baptist Church, Mr. Timmons was a candidate for Justice of the Peace in the 1958 election.

Survivors include the wife; one daughter, Jean Timmons of San Angelo; one son, Charles Timmons of Odessa; two granddaughters, Queta Ann and Rita Gayle Timmons of Odessa; one brother, Roy Timmons of Brownwood; one half-sister, Mrs. Paul Spencer of Odessa and a half-brother, Tilman H. Self of Plainview.

The County's share of the County Agent's salary will be \$1,800 per year plus \$800 for travel expense.

The County's share of the Home Demonstration Agent's salary will be \$1,750 per year plus \$760 for travel expense.

Further action of the Commissioners Court at the meeting on January 8 included granting a salary increase of \$300.00 per year to all office employees with the exception of the Chief Deputy.

Each precinct will have a road hand drawing a salary of \$1.75 per hour while the other regular road hands will receive \$1.50 per hour. Minimum wage for extra road hands was fixed at \$1.00 per hour.

All county officials, unless otherwise provided, will receive 7c per mile for use of their automobile while on official business.

## SALARY INCREASES VOTED

The Coke County Commissioners Court voted to raise the salaries for the offices of Justice of the Peace in Precincts 1 and 2 and to raise the salaries of constables in Precincts 1 and 2. The amount of annual increase for these officers is \$300.00 per year. This brings the total annual salary for the Justice of the Peace in both precincts in Coke County to \$2,100 per year and the Constable salaries in both precincts to \$1,800 per year.

County Agent's secretary was also granted a \$300.00 per year increase.

The Commissioners Court entered into contract with attorney W. A. Johnson for the purpose of collecting delinquent taxes for the county. The attorney will receive 15% of delinquent taxes, penalties, and interest collected.

## Penrose Metcalfe Asks 2nd Term on Education Board

Penrose B. Metcalfe, San Angelo attorney and ranchman, announced this week that he will seek re-election as a member of the State Board of Education from the 21st Congressional District. Metcalfe, presently serving on the board from this district, said in announcing his candidacy that he felt the board should be free from political pressures, but that he would be glad to serve another term if the people of the district re-elect him. The job pays no salary.

Many accomplishments have been made in the Texas Public School System during the time Metcalfe has served on the board. The state's permanent school fund has increased from \$160 to \$455 million dollars, an investment that yields more than \$18 million a year for the school children of the state.

Metcalfe pointed out that Texas now has more than two million children in public schools, emphasizing the importance of the job of helping guide the operation of the educational institutions of the state. Another progressive step for the state's schools is the increasing number of teachers who now possess college degrees. The candidate pointed out that 97 per cent of Texas' teachers now have degrees.

In addition to the free public schools, the State Board of Education deals with Texas public junior colleges and the Texas Education Agency. The latter agency, through its Vocational Rehabilitation Agency, has during the past fiscal year provided training for 2,720 disabled Texans. This training has enabled them to pursue gainful employment and increased their purchasing power an estimated \$4.5 million a year. An increase of 100 per cent has been enjoyed by Texas junior colleges in the past ten years.

In making his announcement for re-election, Metcalfe stated, "If the people of this district think I have looked after the interest of our schools in such a manner as to merit re-election, I will be glad to serve them for another term."
