Two Important Elections Called

Two important elections will be held in Bronte in the first part of April. Coming up are elections on officials for the City of Bronte and for the Bronte Independent School District. The city election will be held the first Tuesday in April, which falls on April 3, while the school election will be held the first Saturday, April 7. An order calling the city balloting is being published in this week's Enterprise.

A new mayor and three new city councilmen will be voted on for the city and two new trustees will be named for the school.

Expiring this year are the terms of Mayor J. A. Stephenson and Councilmen Matthew Caperton, Cecil Kemp and Joe McCutchen.

A Lubbock engineering firm has been employed to make a survey of a large area of West Texas to determine the number of buildings suitable for use as fallout shelters.

Hasie & Green, and engineering and architectural firm, will make the survey in Andrews, Winkler, Loving, Ward, Crane, Upton, Tom Green, Reagan, Midland, Coke, Crockett, Glasscock, Ector, Sutton Nolan, Martin, Schleicher, Irion and Sterling counties. The actual survey in Coke County is expected to begin about the middle of March.

Purpose of the survey is to determine the number of structures which meet minimum standards and can be used in case of need. Buildings which may be used include those owned by the government (federal, state, county and city), schools, firms and individuals.

County Agents News Column

The El Paso Fat Stock Show was a good one as usual. The competition was keen in all classes. The limited number of animals sold at auction seemed awfully small in such fierce competition.

James Bird Pentecost's two hereford steers both placed ninth in classes of 28 steers. One was shown in the heavy weight class and one in the middle weight class.

When the list of buyers at the county show was published, we unknowingly left off four business concerns. In addition to the firms mentioned earlier, Ivey Motor Company of Robert Lee; Power Feed Mill and Plains Machinery Company, both of Abilene; and Dankworth's Packing Company of Ballinger made purchases in the county show auction sale.

The soil moisture situation is not what we had hoped it would be at this time of year and the forecasters are not painting a rosy picture for the immediate future. However, if moisture should come before it is too late to make the small grains respond the addition of nitrogen fertilizer is worth consideration.

If your crop has been grazed and/or is on sandy soil the benefits will be noticeable. Nitrogen added if the moisture is available would boost both grazing and grain yields. Many fields in the county would be benefited by the addition of nitrogen if we receive the moisture to produce added grazing or grain.
