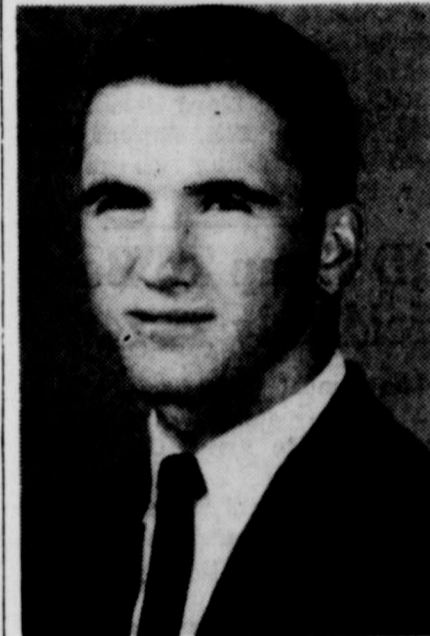
Fire Destroys Two Homes Here

Another disastrous fire leveled two homes in Bronte early Monday afternoon. Residences of Mrs. Lena Shaver and Mr. and Mrs. Rayson were destroyed in the blaze. The fire occurred during a heavy rain storm, and might possibly have been worse had it not been for the heavy downpour.

It was the second major fire in Bronte in a little more than two months. On May 3 a fire in the downtown section destroyed two business buildings and badly damaged a third.

Cause of the fire is unknown but Fire Chief Bill Luckett said the blaze, which started in the Shaver home, could have been set by lightning or from an electrical

Aubrey Don Denman, S'water Man Die in Headon Collision

A shattering two-car collision Tuesday night about 9:30, six miles south of Bronte, took the lives of two men, one from Bronte and the other from Sweetwater.

Killed were Aubrey Don Denman, 22, of Bronte and Fred C. Ohlenbusch, 58, of Sweetwater. Apparently the two men died instantly, as the terrific impact totally demolished the two cars. Both men were riding alone. Denman was driving a 1959 Chevrolet and Ohlenbusch was driving a 1958 Buick. Engines of the cars were driven into the front seats by the crash. The accident occurred on a straight road and the point of collision was on U. S. highway 277 just north of the house formerly occupied by Clark Glenn.

Sheriff Melvin Childress, Deputy Jesse Parker, Constable Oscar

Renshaw, and Texas Highway Patrolmen investigated the wreck. Both bodies were brought to Clift Funeral Home. Ohlenbusch was later moved to Sweetwater.

Funeral services for young Denman will be held today (Thursday) at 4 p.m. at Bronte First Baptist Church. Burial will be in Fairview cemetery under direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Aubrey Don Denman was born March 22, 1940 at San Angelo, the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Z. Denman. He moved to Bronte with his family in 1947 from McCamey. He was an oil field worker and was employed by Dixon Drilling Co. of Abilene. He was working at the time of his death with a night crew on a rig near Wingate.

He was a 1958 graduate of the Bronte high school.

Survivors include his parents; two brothers, Lanny and David; a sister, Jeanna Kay; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Denman of Robert Lee; and his maternal grandfather, J. R. Patterson of Robert Lee.

Pallbearers will be Cecil Coalson, Doyle Rogers, Jerry Parker, James Arnold Tidwell and Dale Luckett, all of Bronte; Ronnie Robbins of Kermit, Bub Burson of Kerrville, and Wilburn Martin of Orient.

Funeral services for Ohlenbusch will also be held at 4 p.m. today. The rites will be at Patterson Funeral Home Chapel of Memories in Sweetwater. A farmer and oil man, he is survived by his wife and several children; also his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Ohlenbusch.

City Hall Bond Carries 3 to 1 Joe Wolf Resigns Church of Christ Minister Position

Voters of Bronte went to the polls in small numbers Saturday and approved a city hall bond issue by a three to one majority. A total of 103 votes were cast, with 79 voting for the issue and 24 against. The election was held at the present city office, with Noah Pruitt Sr. serving as election judge.

The order calling the election specified that bonds were to be issued in an amount not to exceed \$18,000.

Tentative plans are to build an 80 by 27 foot structure on a site north of the Bronte postoffice. It will contain offices for law enforcement officers, justice of the peace and city secretary, a meeting room, stalls for two fire trucks, two holdover jail cells, a small kitchen and rest rooms.

No announcement has been made by the city council as to when bids will be taken and construction will start.

PASSERBY WAS FIRST PERSON AT FIRE MONDAY

Some people passing through Bronte were the first ones to arrive at the scene of the fire Monday. The Huey Nivens family of Palestine, going through here toward Robert Lee, saw the smoke, turned off the highway, and helped move the furniture from the Coalson house.

The Nivens were on vacation and were headed for Kermit.

Youths from Gatesville Are Returned After a Merry, Two-County Chase

Three youths, who had escaped from the State School for Boys at Gatesville, were captured west of Bronte last Thursday evening. The boys were found hiding in a barn on the Ollie Eubanks place west of here. Walter Stapp of Oak Creek Lake and a Texas Highway Patrolman nabbed the youths after they were spotted walking toward the barn by Sheriff Jim Cantrell of Sterling City.

Law enforcement officers from a wide area assisted Sheriff Melvin Childress and other local officers in the manhunt. The youths were first detected in this area when they drove through Winters

at a 90 mile per hour clip. Winters Police Chief chased them through town and out into the country, where he clocked their speed up to 100 miles per hour. The boys were driving a 1962 Buick which they had stolen at Dublin.

Sheriff Childress said the escapees stole a car at Gatesville, drove it to Dublin and abandoned it for the Buick. They drove to Abilene, got the car filled up with \$4.50 worth of gas and left without paying for it.

Abandoning the car north of here, the boys proceeded on foot until they came across a tractor belonging to Bill Wrinkle. They cranked it up and rode it for some distance, knocked down two fences, and abandoned it after it hit a high center and would go no further. Their travels were on foot after their tractor experience.

Childress identified the boys as Billy Wright, 16, of Greenville; George Williams, 15, of Columbia, S. C.; and Michael Hall, 15, of Midland.

Officers from Winters, Colorado City, Sweetwater, Sterling City, and Abilene joined Coke County officers in finding the escapees. Sheriff Childress asked The Enterprise to express the thanks of his department to all of them for their cooperation and help. Officers from the Gatesville school came for the boys Friday.
