Carolyn Continues Toward Big Time, Appears on Tonight Show

Probably more people heard of Bronte, Texas, in a few seconds last Friday night than had heard of it before in all its history. Reason for this wholesale publicity was the appearance of Miss Carolyn Kemp on Johnny Carson's "Tonight Show" on a nationwide television hookup.

Quite a number of Bronte residents witnessed the appearance, since Carolyn was able to call her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Kemp, several minutes before the show came on, to tell them she would be in on it. They passed the word to as many people as they could in the limited time.

In addition to her interview with Carson on the show, she sang "Fade Out-Fade In" from the Broadway show of the same name, in which she is currently appearing as the understudy of Carol Burnett, star of the show.

Carolyn told Carson when he asked her that she was from Bronte, Texas. He then asked her to name a town it is close to, and she replied, "Robert Lee."

Carson was curious as to how a girl from Bronte, Texas, goes about making the big time on

Broadway and asked for her story. She told how she attended an opera workshop in upstate New York after her graduation from Trinity University in San Antonio, and there decided she might stop off in New York City and give show business a try. Arriving in New York with \$50, she was able to stay at the home of a friend. She spent the first day sleeping, and the second day she said she spent in a beauty shop getting her hair bleached. Pretty soon, she was able to land a job (which had no connection with show business) and was paid \$75 per week.

She started making auditions for as many forthcoming shows as possible and after a considerable length of time landed a small part. After this taste of stage lights, she was even more determined and stayed in the game. Before landing the part as Miss Burnett's understudy, she played parts in "Little Me" and "110 in the Shade." In addition to her understudy role, she has some singing parts in the show.

Carolyn's big chance came June 16, when Miss Burnett became ill only an hour and a half before show time, and she was notified she would have to take the lead role when the curtain went up at 8:30 p.m.

She was well received by her audience and took three curtain calls of her own besides the bows with the cast.

Since this appearance, she has received a great deal of publicity on radio, television and newspapers. Garry Moore spent several minutes of his radio show telling about her after seeing her in the June 16 appearance, and it is understood that Earl Wilson, who writes a nationally syndicated column was to interview her Wednesday for a profile presentation in his column.

Al Capp, creator of Li'l Abner, who was a guest on the "Tonight Show" following Carolyn Friday night, had some very nice things to say about her.

Bronte to Take Holiday July 4

A July 4th holiday will be observed Saturday by most Bronte business firms. Some cafes and service stations will remain open to serve local customers and travelers who come through here. Both Vernon Lammers and Garland Spencer said they will keep their grocery departments as well as their stations open.

Independence Day is a legal holiday and the U. S. Post Office and First National Bank are authorized to close for the day. The city hall in Bronte will also be closed.

Golf Tournament To Open Five New Holes at Course

Official opening of Bronte's new nine hole golf course will take place Saturday, July 4, when five new greens built this past spring will be opened for use of local golfers. The five new greens, along with the four which have been in use for some time will make up the nine hole course.

A tournament will mark opening of the five new holes, and all golfers who will be here on the July 4 holiday are urged to compete for prizes which will be offered. Deadline for entering the tourney is today (Thursday), Entry fee is \$1.00.

John Boyles, tournament director for Coke County Golf Association, said that he will be available to take entries as late as Thursday night. His phone number is 473-4881. Boyles said no entries will be taken Saturday.

Either threesome or foursome teams will be set up for the tournament and low ball total for each team will determine winners. Prizes will be given for first, second, third and possibly fourth places.

School students will not be eligible to enter the tourney, as rules of play conflict with Inter-scholastic League regulations. A separate tournament will be set up for young golfers, Boyles said, if enough indicate they would like to play. No entry fee will be charged for them.

Boyles emphasized that it is imperative for all persons who wish to enter the tourney to contact him immediately, as some time is required to set up playing rosters and schedules.

Placing of golfers on teams will depend on scores which have been turned in to George Latimer, handicap chairman of the association. Those who have not turned in scores will be placed as handicap and tournament directors feel will be most fair for everybody, Boyles said.

The tournament director added that he hopes to have teams placed by sometime Friday, in order for all entrants to know with whom they will play.

Burial was in Mule Creek cemetery near Tennyson, with Masonic rites being conducted by Bronte Masonic Lodge.

Mr. Webb died in his sleep about 10:30 p.m. Friday at his home at 138 River Oak St. in San Angelo.

Born in Coryell County Aug. 14, 1903, Mr. Webb was married Jan. 3, 1927 to Miss Lanoro Scoggins in Sherwood.

For many years he lived with his family on a ranch south of Tennyson. He was a member and later chairman of Coke County Soil Conservation District. Upon his retirement from active work with the conservation district, he was presented a plaque of appreciation for the work he had done to promote soil and water conservation in Coke County.

Mr. Webb was a 32nd degree Mason and a charter member of the Suez Shrine Temple.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, Joel Webb of Nolan, C. N. Webb Jr. of Bronte, and Roderick Webb of Rotan; one brother, Charles C. Webb of Odessa; one sister, Mrs. Henry B. Hughes of Mishawaka, Ind.; and four grandchildren.

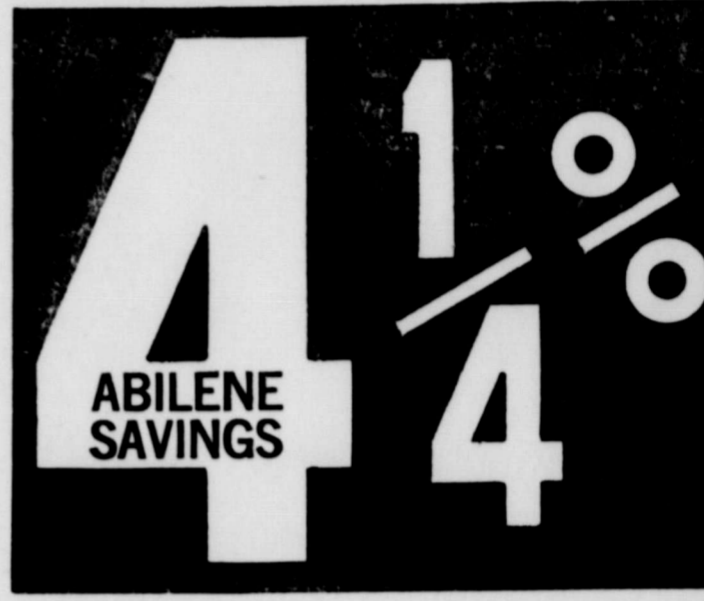

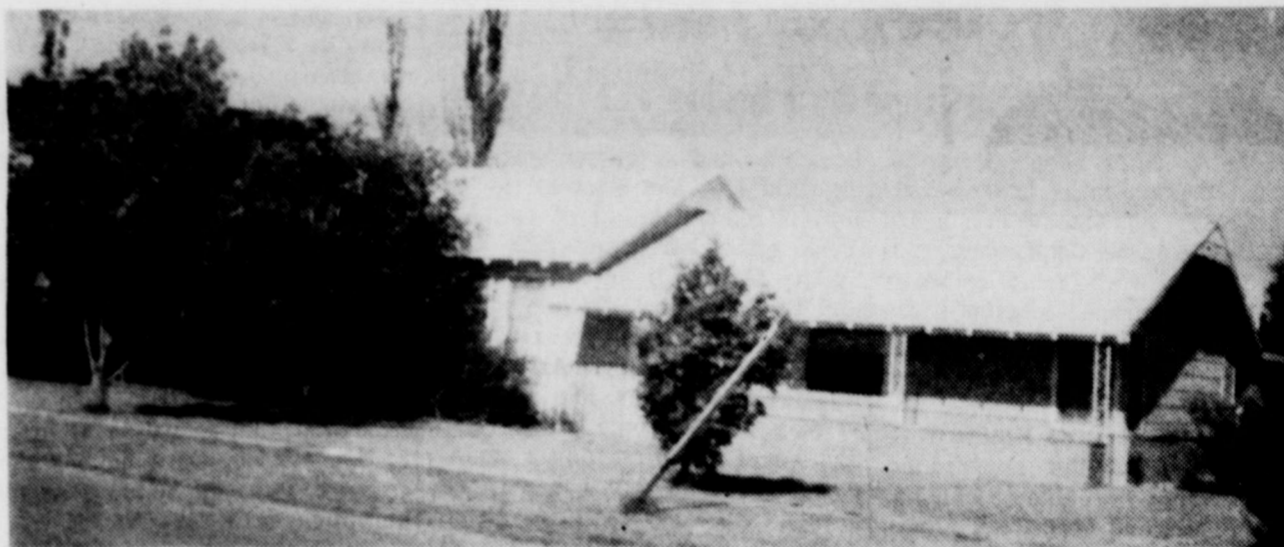

Although food is generally the largest single expense in a family budget, consumers can generally reduce the amount they spend by observing a few careful buying rules.

Here are suggestions that might help you:

Check weekly specials in food store advertisements, and prepare a grocery list before you shop.

Compare costs of buying foods in the various forms—fresh, fro-

zen, or canned—or the weight of the package to determine best yields for the money. In order to make an intelligent choice among brands of the same product, test different ones to see which one gives the greatest quality and number of servings for the money.

Shop carefully for low-cost foods within each major food group.

Use grades in making your purchases of food.

Take advantage of seasonal abundances. These foods will be at their peak of quality, and sometimes will be offered at lower prices.

Limit perishable food purchases to amounts that can be used while they are in top quality.

Prevent food waste by proper storage and by cooking methods that conserve nutrients.

Increase skills in cookery.

Consider family likes and dislikes when food shopping. Thrifty food buys pay off only if your family eats and enjoys the foods, the specialist reminds. Families in Coke County who are interested in more information on food budgets and meal planning are invited to call on me for further help.

REFRIGERATE EGGS—An egg is a high quality protein food. During summer months use eggs in a variety of ways to speed up meal preparation. Remember, the flavor and food value of white and brown eggs are the same. Now that warm weather is here, be especially careful about refrigeration. Buy eggs stored in a refrigerated case and transfer them as quickly as possible to your refrigerator. The grade shown on the carton indicates the quality.
