## R.L. Services for Marvin Simpson

Funeral services were held Wednesday morning at Robert Lee Methodist Church for Marvin Simpson, 68. Mr. Simpson, a well known breeder of high quality Angus cattle, died Monday in West Coke Hospital.

He became ill on June 26, when he suffered a stroke while working on his ranch north of Robert Lee. He was hospitalized at that time and never regained consciousness.

Marvin Bailey Simpson was born May 15, 1896, in Parker County, the son of the late Rev. W. K. Simpson and Mrs. Simpson, the former Cora Bellenger. A pioneer Methodist Circuit Rider, Rev. Simpson served Robert Lee, Bronte, Sanco, and Hayrick Methodist churches, until his retirement here, due to poor health.

A leader in livestock feeding in this area and founder of the Black Gold Angus herd of registered cattle, he was widely known among stockmen of West Texas.

He was married to Mildred Rawlings of Bronte Dec. 25, 1933. They lived on their ranch about three miles north of Robert Lee on the Colorado City highway.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Marvin A. and William M. Simpson, both of Robert Lee; a daughter, Miss Carolyn Simpson, a teacher in Tucson, Ariz.; two brothers, M. K. (Mark) Simpson of Norman, Okla. and W. M. (Will) Simpson of El Paso; three sisters, Mrs. W. E. (Daisy) Hunt of Powder Spring, Ga. and Mrs. Cortez (Lena) Russell and Mrs. W. B. (Ruth) Clift, both of Robert Lee; and three grandchildren.

## R-Lee, Bronte Tied for First In Cen-Tex Play

Bronte's Senior League baseball team lost a game Saturday night to Robert Lee, 5-3, giving the visiting team a tie for league first place.

The local made up for it Monday night, however, when they defeated Winters, 11-6.

In the contest with Robert Lee, Larry Damborsky went all the way on the mound for the visi-

tors, chalking up 12 strikeouts and allowing only four walks. Manuel Reyes started for Bronte, giving up three walks and having seven strikeouts. Robbie Cook relieved Reyes in the pitcher's box and struck out six, but allowed no walks.

Robert Lee was credited with six hits to Bronte's three.

In the game with Winters, Simpson and Colburn pitched for the visitors, while Virden took care of that job for Bronte. The two Winters lads allowed Bronte nine hits, while Virden let Winters have four.

Simpson had five strikeouts and three walks, while Colburn was credited with six each. Virden had 14 strikeouts and six walks.

Next contest for Bronte will be Saturday night at Coleman. If Bronte wins, there will be a playoff with Robert Lee to decide the Cen-Tex League championship. Although the teams are presently tied, Robert Lee is ahead in percentage points with seven wins and three losses to Bronte's six wins and three losses.

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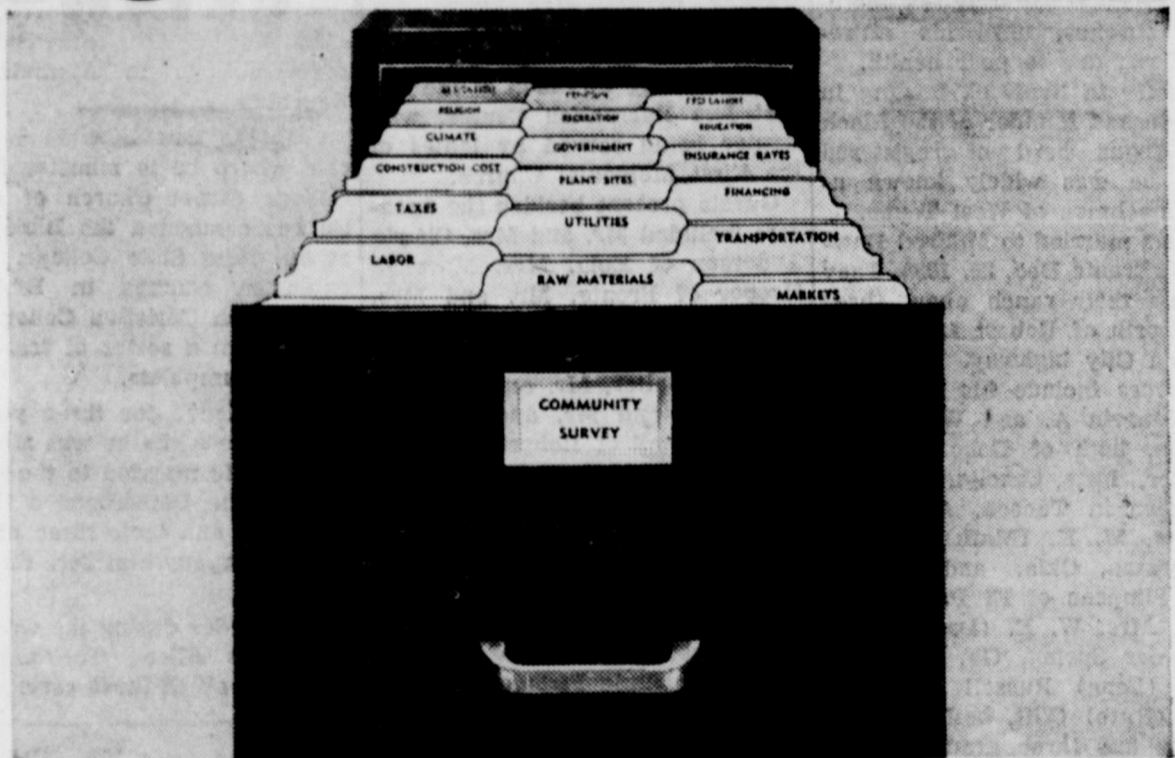

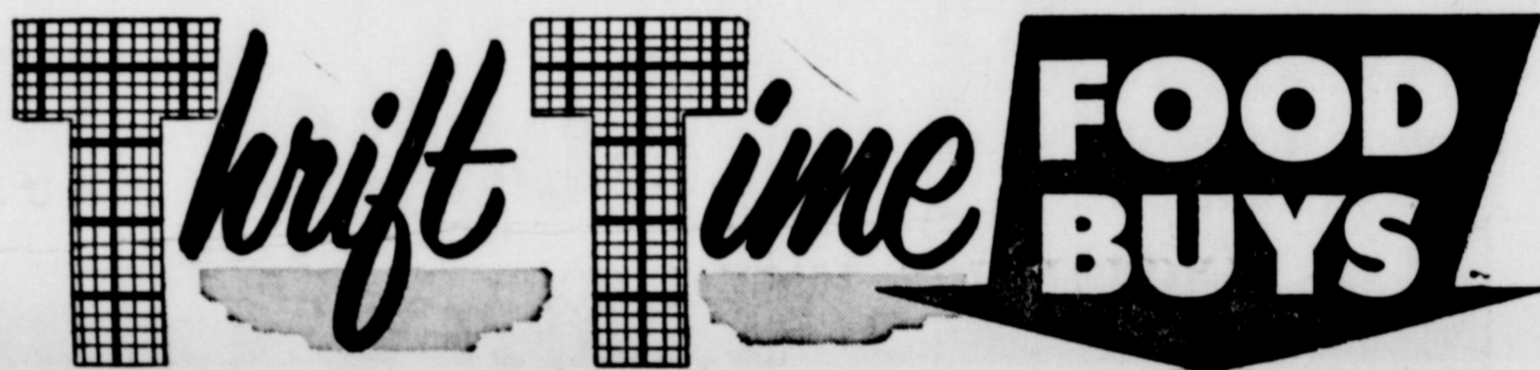
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
