Hurley Tells Plans for Coke March of Dimes

The March of Dimes in Coke County will be getting underway in the next few days, according to Elmer Hurley, Bronte pharmacist, who is chairman of the drive.

Hurley said he would send out mailing pieces on the drive this week, and urged that everyone who receives one to make a liberal contribution to the campaign.

Since its major victory over the polio scourge a few years ago, the March of Dimes is concerning itself mostly with prevention of birth defects. Most of the money raised in the 1965 drive will be used for research and treatment of children who suffer

from defects with which they were born.

Hurley said that Supt. Dorman Thomas has agreed to head the drive in Robert Lee and Mrs.

Award Presented Collins Sayner For Soil Conservation

W. R. Carlton of San Angelo, representative of Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, presented the Goodyear award for outstanding Soil Conservation work to Collins Sayner of Tennyson Tuesday afternoon at the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

A plaque presented at the meeting cited Mr. Sayner for outstanding work in soil conservation, which has included brush control on his pasture, resting of pasture by using crop land for temporary grazing.

From a number of men named as outstanding, a few are selected to visit the Goodyear farms, at Lichfield, Arizona, and spend several days at Goodyear expense to view soil work that has been done on these farms.

Directors of Coke County Soil Conservation District planned their work for 1965, in this meeting. They are D. K. Glenn, chairman, J. W. Service, M. C. Hendry, Joe Rawlings, and W. E. Burns.

Polly Holland will be in charge of the Mothers March there. Supt. Guy Wheeler will be in charge of the drive at Silver.

Mrs. Elroy Butler has been named to head the Mothers March in the Bronte area. Time of the march will be announced in next week's Enterprise. Mrs. LeDrew Arrott will serve as treasurer for the drive.

Hurley announced that a basketball game between Bronte and Blackwell Lions will be played later this month to benefit the March of Dimes.

Hurley pointed out that March of Dimes funds still support polio treatment centers and arthritis research and treatment clinics, as well as centers for study and treatment of birth defects.

In announcing that the March of Dimes will concentrate on birth defects, Hurley said that one out of every ten families in this country are affected. "A child born to a life limited by a physical or mental defect is born 250,000 times a year — 700 times a day — every other minute," Hurley said.

He added, "The victory over polio proved that an aroused public working with science can conquer disease. With the support of everyone in this country, we can conquer the terrible calamity of every child born with a birth defect. Please give generously when you receive your mailer, or when you are called upon."

Hearing On RL Dam Continuing

A hearing on a request to grant a permit to build a huge dam and reservoir on the Colorado River near Robert Lee continued this week in Austin, after adjourning during the Christmas holidays.

The permit is being sought by the Colorado Municipal Water District which supplies water to a number of West Texas cities. The district already has a permit to build a dam in Mitchell County, but is seeking to have the site moved near Robert Lee and to have the size of the lake increased.

A host of objections to the proposed site have been heard at the Austin hearing. Principal objectors are the Lower Colorado River Authority, various groups from the Highland Lakes area and a group from Mitchell County.

After a long session Tuesday, the hearing was scheduled to continue at 10:30 Wednesday morning.

County Livestock Show To Be Held Monday in RL

The 1965 Coke County Livestock Show will be held at the show-barn in Robert Lee on Monday, Jan. 11, with a record number of entries and exhibitors competing for prizes and honors.

A total of 81 FFA and 4-H exhibitors from over the county will exhibit 270 head of selected sheep, swine and cattle. Approximately 220 ribbons and other awards and \$600 in prize money will be awarded winners. Entries expected are 10 steers, 3 heifers, 52 breeding sheep, 48 market swine, 12 breeding swine and 145 fat lambs.

Judging the big 1965 show will be the Truitt Vines, teacher of vocational agriculture at Big Spring, and Louis Bridges, vocational agriculture teacher at Eden. Vines will judge the fat lamb, swine and cattle shows. Bridges will judge the breeding sheep shows.

Don Fields, Robert Lee, and Wayne Arrott, Bronte, will select showmanship winners. Garland Davis, Robert Lee high school principal, will serve as secretary

of the show. James Wells, Stock Show association president from Bronte, will be announcer and Ed Cumbie, district Farm Bureau field man from Bronte, will serve as auctioneer.

Association directors will serve as superintendents of the show and will coordinate events. They are: James Wells, J. B. Arrott, D. K. Glenn, LeDrew Arrott, C. E. McGuire, A. Z. Denman and J. B. Morrow, all of Bronte; T. E. Pitcock and Nolan Pentecost of Sanco; and Lindy Devoll, Bert Blaylock, J. W. Service, Jr., L. E. Wink, Glenn Waldrop and B. A. Boykin, all of Robert Lee.

The show will follow a tight schedule beginning with the breeding swine at 8:30 a.m. Market hogs will show at 9 a.m., fat lambs at 10 a.m., breeding sheep at 1 p.m. and steers and heifers at 2 p.m.

The auction sale will be held at 3 p.m. Approximately 75 fat lambs and market swine are expected to sell — another record.

afternoon between 1 and 4 p.m. Barbecue lunches and refreshments will be available at the community center. The public is invited to see the fine exhibits and view various events of the show.

AD-LIB-BEN

We are grateful for the fine response which has been forthcoming from many sources concerning this column of last week.

We certainly didn't expect everyone to agree with us, but we sincerely believe the three projects mentioned are absolutely necessary for the well being, and maybe even the survival of our town.

One point on which we were called, and which perhaps was not clear was where we stated that the paving bond issue is about paid out and this money could be used to finance a community building. The impression may have been that this tax could continue to be collected and applied to payment on a community building. We didn't mean it that way, but meant that the levy for the paving bond would not be needed much longer, and the money could be used for this other project, provided a new bond issue was voted.

We have since been informed that \$30,000 is on deposit, left over from the park bond issue of several years ago. County officials said half of this money could be made available as a start toward a community building, if the people want to use it for that purpose. The other half belongs to the Robert Lee Park and would not be available for use here.

Commissioner Howard Brock told us this week that Precinct 2 is in first class financial condition. With only one full payment this year, and a partial payment next year on the paving bonds, the precinct is practically debt-free, Brock said. He also mentioned that he has no outstanding machinery warrants.

So, with the financial situation as it is, we are in position to do just about anything we want to do. Public improvements of this kind are up to the people, and must have approval of a majority before they can become realities.

Abilene, No. 1 Edna Butner, in 394-1A-H&TC, Coke County Gray sand discovery, three miles northeast of Bronte, 2 1/2 miles east of the Rawlings multipay field and 2 1/4 miles northeast of the Bronte multipay field, swabbed 19 barrels of new oil and 12 barrels of load water in six hours from the Gray.

Recovery was through perforations between 5,095-103 feet after the hole filled with salt water while shut in overnight. Earlier, it swabbed dry after the section was washed with 250 gallons of mud acid. Operator then acidized with 5,000 gallons, and it again swabbed dry.

Home Demonstration Club women are getting ready to serve barbecue lunches and have appetizing concessions for Stock Show visitors Monday.

Club members heading the committee are Mmes. Glenn Waldrop, J. C. Boatright, J. B. Arrott, Billy Joe Luckett, C. E. Arrott, Floyd Harmon and Lowell Roane.

J. O. Rudd is in charge of the barbecue. Beef, goat and mutton will be barbecued and served with beans, potato salad, carrot salad, onions, pickles, pie and coffee or tea.

Sandwiches, hot dogs, pop corn balls, cup cakes, doughnuts, coffee, chocolate and cold drinks will be sold.

The concession stand at the stock barn will be open Sunday afternoon and Monday.

Pills belong in bottles. Definitely not on your sweaters.

Yet, the fiber ends of some modern fabrics tend to roll into tiny hard balls — or pills — that stick tight to the fabric. This pilling increases during wearing and laundering because the balls catch other surfaces, particularly of the same fabric, to form more pills.

You can reduce pilling by turning the garment inside out when you wash it. For further protection, place the "pilly" item in a mesh bag for laundering.

If your garment already has pills, the job is more difficult. You have to remove them one by one. Pull the cloth firmly over a curved surface (so the pills stand up and away from the fabric), then cut them off carefully with a scissors or razor blade.

It's possible for homemakers to remove stains from laminated fabrics without harm to the backing. Researchers do not recommend the use of chlorine bleach as it may yellow the foam.

Four laminated fabrics were tested — chambray, corduroy, knit and twill. All cleaned satisfactorily by home stain removal methods.

As might be expected, the stains were more easily removed when treated immediately. But it was no more difficult to remove a stain that had stayed in the fabric a month than one that had been there only a day or a week.

The stains tested were — coffee, orange drink, chocolate syrup, corn oil, hot melted shortening and mustard. Corn oil proved the most difficult to remove.
