Deadline Nears for Poll Tax Payments

County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs said this week that payments on 1965 poll taxes in Coke County are lagging. Jan. 31 is the deadline for paying the tax, Jacobs said.

Barbee's Contract Extended 1 Year By School Board

The three year contract of Supt. C. B. Barbee was extended one year at a meeting of Bronte School trustees last Thursday night. President of the Board Joe Rawlings said in making announcement of the extension that the action of the board merely adds another year to Barbee's contract and makes it effective for three more years.

The Bronte school head came here in 1959 from Tomball.

In other action at the meeting, the board authorized the president to sign a certificate of compliance which states that Bronte Independent School District is fully complying with the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

Barbee said the board had considerable discussion on the school's building needs and some progress was made toward working out preliminary plans for a new high school building. The superintendent noted that much work will be necessary "before any noticeable progress can be made on this project."

Even though a U.S. Constitutional Amendment abolishing the poll tax in national elections has gone into effect, it has no bearing on balloting on issues of a local nature.

This year is what is known as an "off" year, because there will be no national, state, county or precinct elections to elect public officials at those levels. However, we do know there will be elections to name city officials and school trustees.

And there is always the possibility of bond elections for county, city and school improvements. Such a thing as a school consolidation election could be called.

Since repeal of the poll tax to vote in national elections last year, there may be some confusion about whether the tax needs to be paid. However, Jacobs pointed out a person must have a poll tax receipt to be eligible to vote in any state, county, precinct, school or city election in Texas.

Jacobs said he will send a deputy to Bronte one day before the deadline, probably Friday, Jan. 29. A more definite announcement will be printed in next week's Enterprise.

Cost of a poll tax is \$1.75.

\$252 Reported for March of Dimes

A total of \$252.29 has been raised in Bronte for Coke County March of Dimes, said County Chairman Elmer Hurley. Of this amount, \$157.29 was collected during the Mothers March and the other \$95 was mailed or handed to Hurley.

Bronte women who made the Mothers March were Mrs. Elroy Butler, chairman, and Mmes. Kenneth Reed, Cecil Toliver, J. B. Arrott, Eddie Alexander, Benny Corley and Billy Joe Luckett.

Hurley said he is deeply grateful to these women for the work they did, and to everyone who contributed.

He said a number of mailers have not been returned, and asked that they be returned as soon as possible.

Hurley also announced that Mrs. Conda Richards volunteered to work the Fort Chadbourn area for the MOD. No report was available at press time on the amount she raised.

Hurley said he is hopeful this year's contributions will exceed the total for 1964. "We are expecting a sizeable contribution from the golf tournament between Robert Lee and Bronte and we are also planning a benefit basketball game between Bronte and Blackwell Lions Clubs."

The March of Dimes this year is stressing research on and treatment of birth defects. Thousands of children are born every year either physically or mentally defective and the National Foundation hopes to make giant strides with March of Dimes donations toward conquering this tragedy.

Council Passes Motion to Cutoff Delinquent Users

Bronte city council in its regular January meeting passed a motion which will crack down on delinquent water customers. The motion, which passed unanimously, provides for the water superintendent to cut off water of any customer who is behind as much as 30 days with his water bill.

The motion stated further that in order to have the water turned back on, the customer's bill must be paid in full, plus a \$2 reconnect charge.

Mayor Royce Lee said members of the council were reluctant to pass the motion, but they all felt an obligation to citizens of Bronte to operate the water system efficiently. In order to operate the water system as we feel people of Bronte want it operated, the mayor said, "we must have it on a sound financial footing."

Lee pointed out that the city water system is in no financial trouble, "and we want to keep it that way." Some extraordinary expense has been incurred,

Two Completions Announced for Bronte Area

Daily potential has been announced on two recent completions in the Bronte area.

Karl Hoblitzelle No. 1 B. F. Bridges, a Cross Cut Sand discovery located four miles southeast of town, was finished for a potential of 66.06 barrels of 43 gravity oil, plus 65 per cent water.

Suggested name for the discovery is Bronte, Southeast (Cross Cut) Field.

Top of the pay was listed at 4,420 feet. The 4½ inch casing is set at 4,419, and the hole is bottomed at 4,422 feet. It is pumping from open hole treated with 1500 gallons of acid.

Humble No. 44-B D. K. Glenn, originally drilled to the Palo Pinto at a depth of 4,360 feet, was deepened to 5,390 feet in the Cambrian and completed. Daily potential was 213 barrels of 53 gravity oil. Flow was through a 12-64 inch choke with 400 pounds of casing pressure and 180 pounds of tubing pressure. Gas-oil ratio was 147-1.

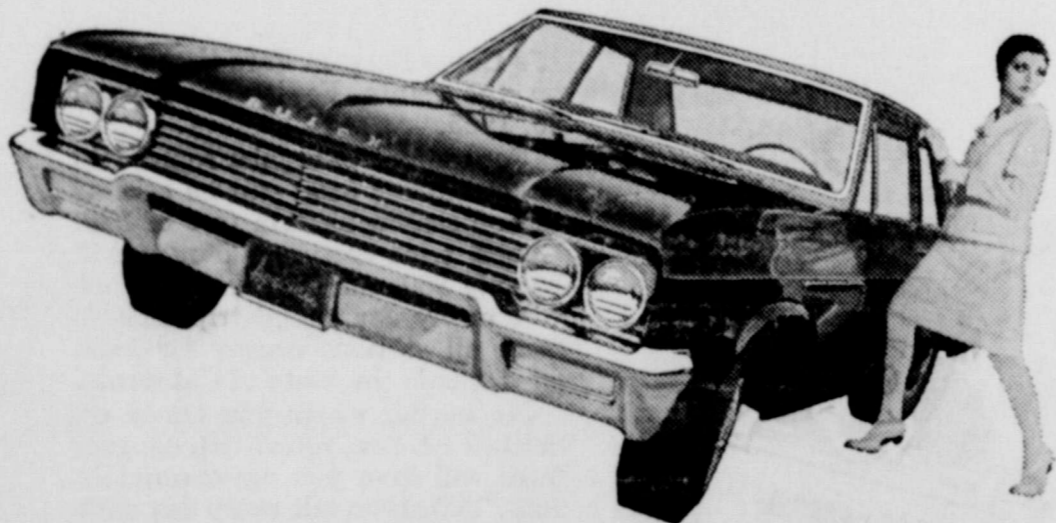
