## PTA to Sponsor Immunization Program for School Youngsters

Bronte Parent-Teachers voted Tuesday night to again sponsor an immunization program as they have the past several years. Small pox vaccine and the first of the three-in-one shots, for diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, will be given free at the school Thursday, March 18, starting at 12:30 p.m. Mrs. R. N. Bagwell, R.N., from Harris Clinic, will administer the shots and she will be assisted in the book work and other duties by the PTA executive committee. Immunizations will be given to pre-school children and students up to 12 years of age.

## Youngblood Is Against Enlargement of UCRA

(Editor's Note: The story below was published in the San Angelo Standard-Times several days ago and refers to the proposed increase in size of the Upper Colorado River Authority. Youngblood is opposed to the enlargement and tells why below.)

L. T. Youngblood, board member and former chairman of the Upper Colorado River Authority, said Monday he doubts the wisdom of creating an Upper Colorado Authority with 10 counties as members.

He thinks, in fact, that the proposed new district comprising Coke, Tom Green, McCulloch, Menard, Schleicher, Concho, Irion, Coleman, Sterling and Runnels counties would be unwieldy in action because of limitations requiring votes in each county for ap-

proval of any program requiring ad valorem taxes.

Youngblood, Bronte banker, said: "I have worked 30 years for the Upper Colorado River Authority as now constituted serving Coke and Tom Green counties, and I would hate to see the work of the authority dissipated.

"In fact I would resent another authority bearing the same name, taking over our assets, with authority to spend UCRA money at its discretion. It would be something like a big school district taking over another. The former trustees would have no say about it. In similar fashion all the work already done by the UCRA as presently constituted could be dissipated."

Youngblood said he thinks the

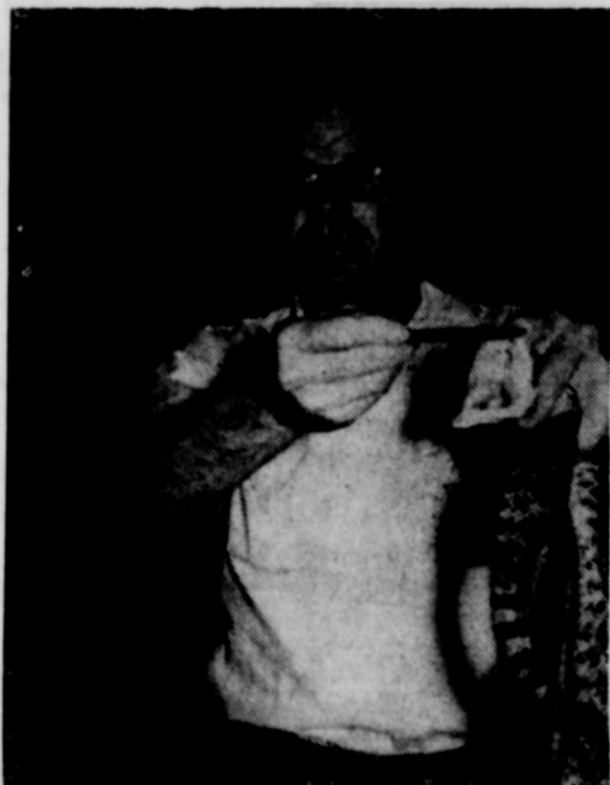

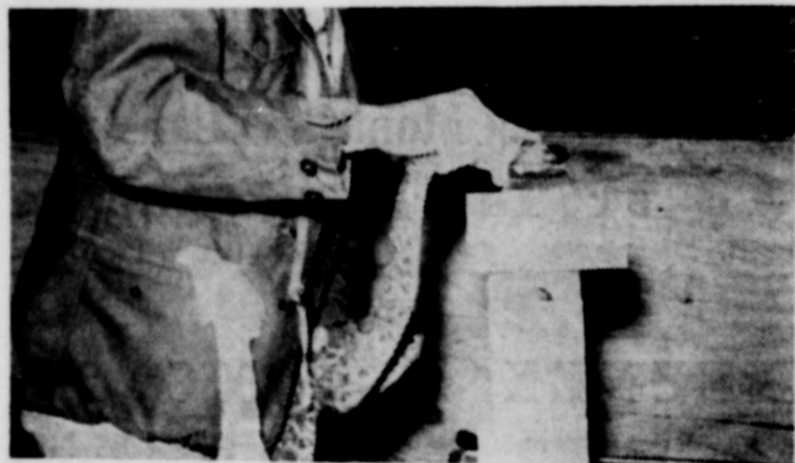

## Coke Retail Firms Have 15 Per Cent Increase Since '58

Coke County's 51 retail establishments had \$4.4 million in sales in 1963, an increase of 15 percent from 1958, the U. S. Bureau of the Census has just reported after tabulating data gathered from all firms in the 1963 census of business. The last previous business census conducted by the census bureau, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, was in 1958.

Retail trade in the county meant jobs, exclusive of proprietors, for 97 men and women and a yearly payroll of \$268,000.

In volume of business the county's food stores had sales of \$833,000, a decrease of four percent from 1958. In other retail business, the county's restaurants and cafes, had sales of \$135,000, and service stations had sales of \$609,000.

For the state as a whole, the census bureau reported \$96.406 retail establishments with sales of \$12715.4 million, up 18 percent from 1958.

Census reports to be issued during the next few months will give state and county figures on wholesale and service trades, manufacturing and mineral industries.

Figures on number of establishments and sales volume for major types of retail establishments in each county are provided in the printed report: 1963 Census of Business, Retail Trade, Texas, are available at \$1.00 from Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C., 20402, and at U.S. Department of Commerce field offices.



## HD Agent's News Dept.

Here's an inside tip for shoe shoppers. Consider new spring shoes with a leather lining—for comfort and long-lasting fashion.

Leather linings are making a comeback in shoe fashions this spring.

The "breathing" leather lining keeps feet dry and cool and the leather lining guards the foot from chafing and the irritation of burning feet. The leather lining adds body to the shoe without weight — in the pump, spectator and slingback designs. The lining helps the shoe hold its shape longer.

In many spring fashions of pumps, spectators and town walking shoes, the leather lining is actually two pieces. The forward section is smooth and dainty, and the back is napped for a no-slip hold on the foot. This design gives the wearer the feel of luxury and sure-footed walk.

Imaginative shoe designers are using leather linings to help set off the beauty of their shoes this spring. Many shoes have colored or tinted leather linings to match or contrast with the shoe upper leather color. In others, a smooth leather is used to set off a suede leather or brushed leather upper.

### Figuring Wall Paper Needs

Do you need help in figuring the amount of wall paper needed to paper a room? If so, this information can be of help to you.

A single roll of wallpaper covers thirty-six square feet, and a double roll, seventy-two.

Figure the area of each wall — the height times the width — and add these together. Subtract the area of each window and door opening. Multiply by 1.1 — to take care of waste and matching.

You now have the area to be covered. So divide this by 72 or 36, depending on which size roll you wish to buy — single or double.

### Read Labels To Prolong Fabrics

Piece-good departments are a maze of colors, designs and textures that tempt the home sewer into starting her spring and summer wardrobe.

With the endless array of fabrics on the market today, it is often difficult for the home seamstress to know what she's buying by looking and feeling.

Too often, the color, texture and pattern to be used influence the selection of the fabric — yet the home sewer also should take into consideration how the finished garment is to be cared for.

Information concerning the care of the fabric usually is tucked deep into the bolt of material, where buyers do not always see it. And, of course, this information always stays at the store.

A lot of time and work goes into making an outfit. To keep it looking chic, the garment must have proper care. So read the labels to know the characteristics of the fabrics being bought. Label-reading is just as important when selecting fabrics for home sewing as it is when choosing ready-made apparel.

After reading the fabric labels, write down special instructions for future reference.

### Does the Percolator Perk?

Place a thimble over the cap on the tube of the percolator while pouring in dry coffee. It will prevent grounds from taking the perk out of the percolator.

proposal to build the Stacy Dam will rouse those served by the Lower Colorado River Authority to greater opposition because of fears that the 1,800,000 acre-foot capacity proposed would rob LCRA of water to which it feels it now has a prior claim. Because of this opposition he doubts such a dam will ever get approval.

A dam proposed several years ago by Colorado River Municipal Water District in Mitchell County drew no opposition either from UCRA or LCRA. Protest arose only when CRMWD proposed moving the site of the dam to the vicinity of Robert Lee with a capacity of 488,000 acre-feet. Youngblood thinks that any dam with larger capacity nearer the LCRA territory would draw far greater opposition.

Youngblood said he doubts that any county in the proposed district, even Tom Green, would vote ad valorem taxes to pay for the Stacy Dam estimated now to cost \$47 million. With the local interests required to pay one half the cost, that would test the natural resistance of the taxpayers to saddle themselves with a long-time payout, making the dam cost twice as much counting interest charges, he said.

Having spent 30 years with the UCRA, Youngblood said he feels that the work of the men who have labored long and hard for its accomplishments is deserving of better reward than a measure of oblivion.

He cites accomplishments of UCRA in the construction of the North Concho Dam, now the supply reservoir for San Angelo's

water needs, and the water systems at Bronte, Robert Lee, Christoval and Carlsbad. The need for these has been shown clearly, and he asks now, "What would have happened had the UCRA not been on the job? He answers his own question. "No other water would have been available for human consumption."

Said Youngblood: "No member or officer ever tried to make any money by reason of his office. No more than \$100 per month was paid to any officer of the UCRA, and that was limited to the chairman and secretary."

He credited about two dozen men involved in creation and service to the UCRA.

"Now when the prospects come to destroy, liquidate and absolve the UCRA and surrender all our efforts and authority to 12 men that we do not even know, to spend our money at their will and discretion, with money already paid by the citizens of Tom Green and Coke counties, it would leave only the name of the present UCRA.

It has cash, assets and bills receivable of approximately \$1.4 million. That would slip out of our hands, and who can say that

the interests of those who paid it in would be preserved as now guaranteed?

"I have spent my best years in the service of the UCRA without reward other than to do my job and serve the district to the best of my ability.

"It is my belief now that no permit will ever be granted to construct a dam at Stacy. The LCRA will be too much in opposition."
