Two Elections Here During Next Week

Trustee Election Slated Saturday

Four candidates are seeking two places on the Bronte School board of trustees in balloting which will be held Saturday. Two places, Bronte City Hall and Green's Store at Tennyson have been designated as the polling places.

On the ballot are A. E. Bell Jr., Clyde Lee, Matthew Caperton and Wayne Arrott. Bell is the only candidate presently serving on the board.

Mrs. W. T. Green will serve as election judge for the Tennyson box and Mrs. Otis Smith for the Bronte box. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Resident qualified voters who reside within the bounds of the school district are eligible to vote.

County Trustees

Two candidates are seeking the position of county trustee at large. D. K. Glenn of Bronte and W. D. McAdams are running for this place. Noah Pruitt Sr. and C. E. Arrott are running unopposed for county trustee from precincts 2 and 4, respectively.

Robert Lee School district voters will elect three trustees and Silver will elect two, on the same day. An election is also being held the same day in precincts 1 and 3 to name two directors for West Coke County Hospital in Robert Lee.

Jaycees to Have Mexican Supper

A Mexican supper will be held next Tuesday night in Bronte School lunchroom for Jaycees, prospective members and their wives. The supper will be the high point of a membership drive which has been underway for the past several days.

The supper will be prepared by women of the Latin American community in Bronte, "which assures us that we will have good and genuine Mexican food," said Benny Corley, who is in charge of the supper.

In addition to the supper, several entertainment numbers will be presented.

Corley said that any man of this community who is interested in becoming a member of the Jaycees is invited to attend the supper. Jaycee rules state that regular members must be under 35 years of age, and that persons over 35 will be associate members. "We want both kinds," Corley said. "Please don't stay away because you are over 35."

He added that the local chapter will give everybody, regardless of age, a chance to serve in carrying out projects sponsored by the Jaycees.

"We could do a lot more for the community," Corley added, "if we had more members, and that's exactly what we're trying to get."

The supper will be served at 7 p.m.

Mayor Lee urged that all qualified voters of the city vote in the election, and the selection of council members is very important.

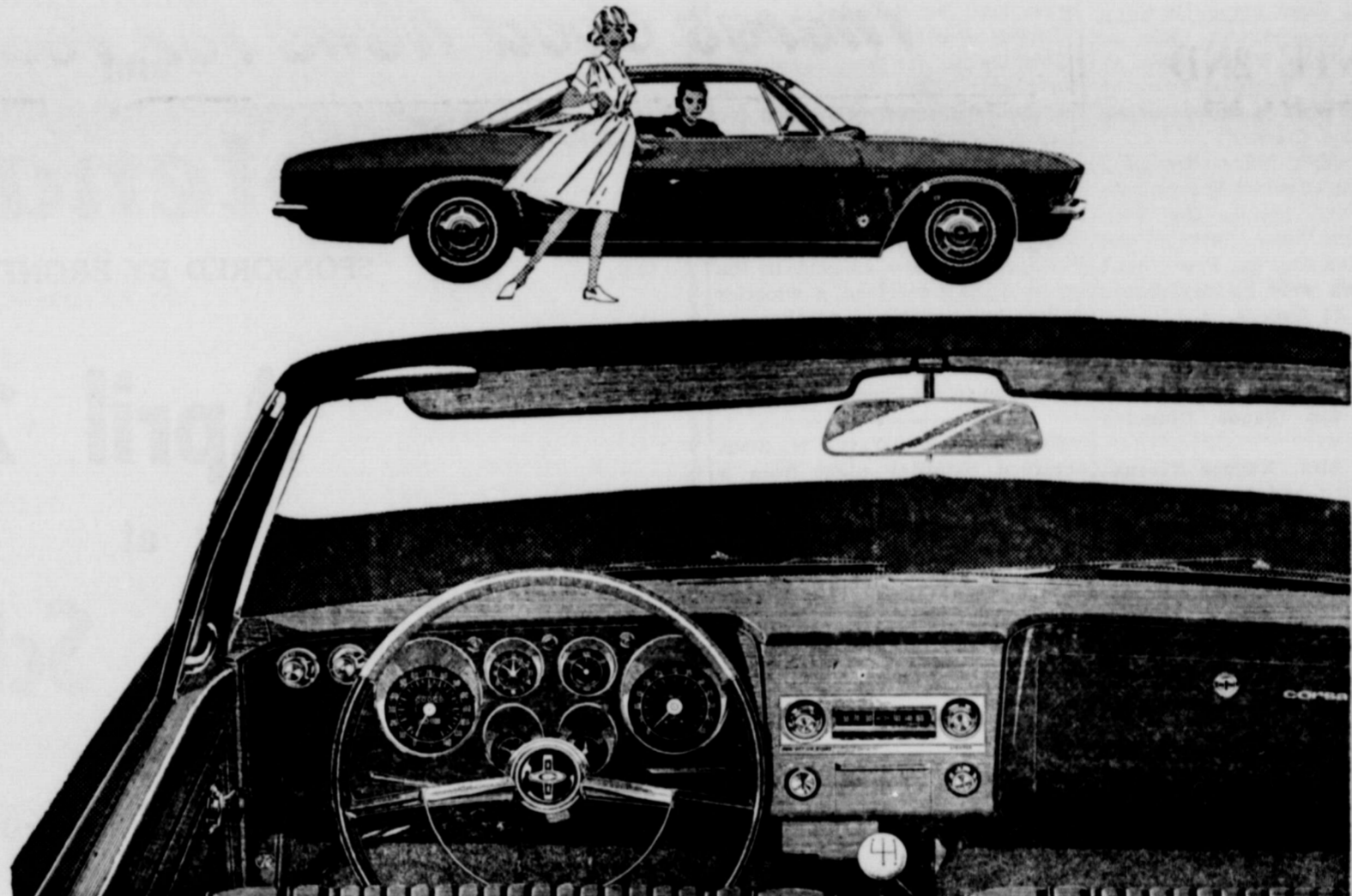



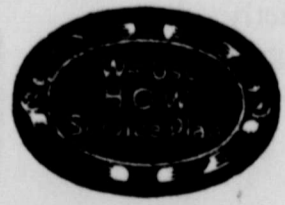
