Bronte Takes Second In Dist. Literary Meet

In spite of taking more first places than any other school of District 67-B, Bronte High School students came up in second place at last Saturday's literary meet in Sterling City. Robert Lee accumulated a total of 120½ points to edge the local students' 119½ by one point.

Bronte Elementary School students also finished in second place with 39 points. Sterling City was first with 46, and Robert Lee took third place with 34 5/6.

If the total for both elementary and high school had been totaled and counted as one entry, Bronte would have taken first place by more than three points.

District Track Meet At Big Spring Sat.

Bronte High School's track team continues to work out in preparation for the district track meet, which will be held Saturday at Howard County Junior College in Big Spring. Cecil Toliver and James Raughton coach the teams. Spectators are encouraged to follow the team to Big Spring Saturday. A list of entries was run in last week's Enterprise.

ARROTT, BELL NEW TRUSTEES

Wayne Arrott and A. E. Bell Jr. were the two ticket leaders in last Saturday's election to name two trustees for Bronte Independent School District. They were elected from a field of four candidates.

The voting went as follows: Arrott 109, Bell 103, Clyde Lee 86 and Matthew Caperton 73. Voting places were set up at Bronte city hall and at Tennyson. Mrs. Otis Smith was judge for the Bronte box and Mrs. W. T. Green for Tennyson.

Holdover members of the Bronte board are Joe Rawlings, Conda Richards, J. B. Morrow, Horace Taylor and James Wells.

D. K. Glenn defeated W. D. McAdams of Robert Lee for county trustees at large, receiving 242 votes to McAdams' 149. In precinct 2 Noah Pruitt Sr. received 153, and in precinct 4, C. E. Arrott had 27. They were both unopposed to the county board.

Other placings and points for the remaining elementary schools entered were: 4. Water Valley, 25 points; 5. Fairview, 13½; 6. Forsan, 12½ and Garden City, 5. Other high school placings: 4. Forsan, 26½; Water Valley, 30; Garden City, 22.

Bronte took five first places in the high school division and three in elementary.

Lee and Fancher Investigate Poverty Program

Mayor Royce Lee and City Councilman Royce Fancher were in Austin Tuesday, when they met with Bob Allen, who is fieldman for the entire state with the Governor's Office of Economic Growth. The local men talked with Allen concerning availability of a program in Bronte and Coke County for low income citizens, a local unit of President Johnson's anti-poverty program.

Lee reported that Allen explained the program to them in some detail and told them he would be in Sweetwater Tuesday night, April 13, to conduct a meeting for the purpose of explaining details of the program to all interested persons.

The mayor said he is hopeful that a large delegation of Bronte and Coke County citizens will attend the meeting. Any person who is interested is welcome to

Cleanup Drive Set April 12-17

The cooperation of all citizens of Bronte is asked during the Cleanup Drive which starts Monday. At press time Wednesday, the campaign was being planned under the co-sponsorship of the city council, Jaycees and Bronte

Lions Club. Mayor Royce Lee said that other local organizations are more than welcome to assist, however.

Chairmen for different areas of the city have been named and block captains appointed to as-

sist in making the campaign a success.

Mayor Lee said he wanted to emphasize that the cleanup is not a city government project. "It is a community project, and is going to require complete cooperation from everyone if it is as successful as we hope it will be."

Volunteers who have pickups, entirely, and each individual is asked to clean up around his premises and pile all trash and debris in a spot designated by the block captain.

Volunteer who have pickups, trucks or other hauling equipment are especially needed, Lee said.

"We hope this cleanup campaign will give our town a completely new face," the mayor said, "and if citizens of Bronte will cooperate 100 per cent, it will be a success."

Water Pressure Goes Up As Standpipe Is Tied to Mains

Bronte residents noticed a considerable increase in water pressure Tuesday night after the valve was turned which released water from the new standpipe into water mains.

The new standpipe is part of a water systems improvement program started last September when the city accepted a bid from R. S. Beall & Son of Abilene for \$73,811.60.

The improvements were financed with a non-interest bearing loan from the Upper Colorado River Authority.

In addition to the new water tower, a sizeable amount of small main was replaced with eight and six inch lines. These three items were the main expense of the project. Less expensive items included ten new fire plugs, new electric control system, which

completely automates the water system, and various miscellaneous items.

The water system improvements were undertaken by the city with a two-fold purpose in mind: to improve water service to customers and to bring the water system up to state requirements in order to make the city eligible for a reduction in fire insurance rates.

Mayor Royce Lee and Councilman Royce Fancher were in Austin Tuesday and reported to the Fire Insurance Commission that the work has been completed.

The mayor said as a result of their report, the commission will send a survey team to Bronte in the near future to pass on the improvements. Following the survey, Bronte will be eligible for a minimum of 24 cents reduction in its key insurance rate. The reduction should go into effect as soon as necessary processing can be done by the commission.

First Baptist Plan Revival Next Week

A revival meeting will be held next week at First Baptist Church in Bronte. Serving as evangelist will be the pastor, the Rev. Harry K. Morris. Jerry Don Holcombe will be song leader.

Preaching services will begin at 7 a.m. Monday through Friday and each night, including Saturday at 7:30 p.m.

Coffee, cocoa and doughnuts will be served at 6:45 each morning, before services begin.

Mr. Morris said that everyone in the area has an invitation to attend the services. He said "We are hopeful that these special services will benefit all those who attend, and everyone certainly has a warm welcome awaiting him."

Band Going to Abilene Friday For UIL Contest

Bronte Longhorn Band will participate in an Interscholastic League playing contest Friday at Abilene. Approximately 37 members of the band will attend, said Director R. H. Hornbeck.

Eight members of the band attended a meet in Brownwood during the latter part of March.

The band will leave Bronte at 8 a.m., and buses will run 15 minutes early in order for all the students to be ready for departure. The band is scheduled to return to Bronte before school is dismissed.

Kiker and Grigg New Members of Local City Council

Norman R. Kiker and Horace Grigg were put on the Bronte City Council by a light turnout of voters in an election Tuesday. They will replace Royce Fancher and C. E. Bruton on the city's governing board.

Kiker led the ticket with 73 votes, while Grigg received 61. A third candidate, Manuel Reyes, received 37 votes. A total of 86 votes were cast.

Mayor Royce Lee said Wednesday that the council will meet at 6:30 p.m. Thursday to canvass election results.

In addition to the mayor, other members of the council are Martin Lee, Elmer Hurley and Billy Joe Luckett.
