## Board Calls Bond Vote

Bronte School Board, in a meeting last Wednesday night, called a \$325,000 bond election for May 22. The election was called after a petition, signed by 38 persons, was circulated and presented to the board.

The matter of calling the bond election to finance new high school facilities has been under discussion in the community for many months, and interest became rather acute last year when a public meeting was held to discuss consolidation of the high school with some other school in this area.

During and following that meeting public opinion was high for constructing whatever facilities necessary to maintain and improve the high school program.

If the bond issue is passed, it will provide money for demolishing the three story building which was constructed in 1922. Present plans also call for leaving the

newer part of the high school, including the gymnasium, the present homemaking department and the study hall and library. Part of the bond money would be used for a complete remodeling of this section of the building.

If approved by voters, the biggest part of the bond money will be used to construct new classrooms, offices, a gymnasium and other necessary facilities on the site of the present three story

Bronte School board of trustees has called a meeting for Friday night shortly after 8 o'clock for the purpose of explaining and answering questions about the proposed school bond election and other matters pertinent to the construction job.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said it is extremely important that every school patron and interested friend of the school attend the meeting. He said that board members, administrative officials and the school's financial advisor, Gordon Charlton, will be on hand to explain the bond issue and answer any questions anyone has to ask.

building. Absentee voting on the bond issue began Tuesday morning in the office of Supt. C. B. Barbee. His office will be open each day through May 18 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. for those who will not be able to get to the polls on election day.

Two polling places will be open on election day, at Bronte city hall and at the W. T. Green store in Tennyson. Mrs. Otis Smith will be judge of the Bronte box, with Mrs. Marvin Corley and Mrs. Dwain Pruitt serving as clerks. Mrs. Tom Green will serve as judge at Tennyson and Mrs. Robert Brown will be clerk. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

### 18 Year Retirement

Supt. C. B. Barbee explained this week that the school board had decided on an 18 year retirement plan, with a 15 year option, for the new bond issue, if adopted. He said this plan would involve a slight overlapping of the final payment on the 1954 bond issue (used to finance the elementary school) and the first payment of the new issue. However, the amount of money needed to take care of this situation will be small, the superintendent said. Approximately \$5,500 will pay the difference in the first year's payment on the new bonds and the amount the school will have on hand from its present bond fund surplus.

The surplus will amount to approximately \$26,000 and \$18,400 will be needed to make the final payment on the 1954 issue, leaving almost \$8,000 to be applied on the first year's payment on the new bonds, which will amount to \$13,500. Barbee pointed out that a raise of 6 or 7 cents will take care of the additional money needed for one year. After that time the levy for bond retirement may be returned to its average level of the last 10 or 12 years of 34 cents to 40 cents per \$100 valuation. The bond retirement levy has run as high as 40 cents per \$100 during some years since the elementary school was built, Barbee said.

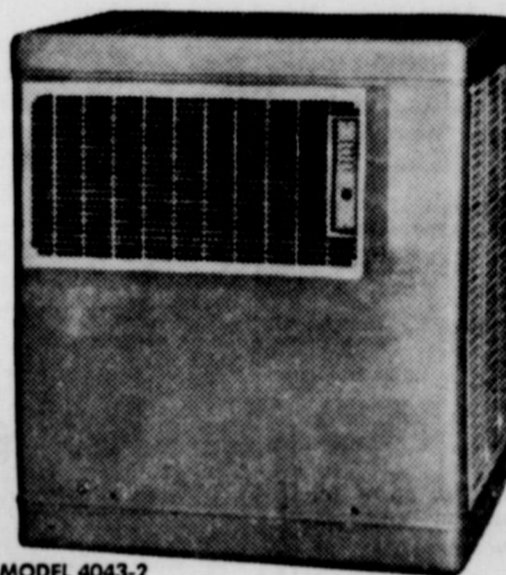

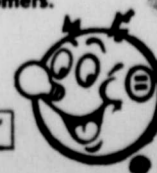

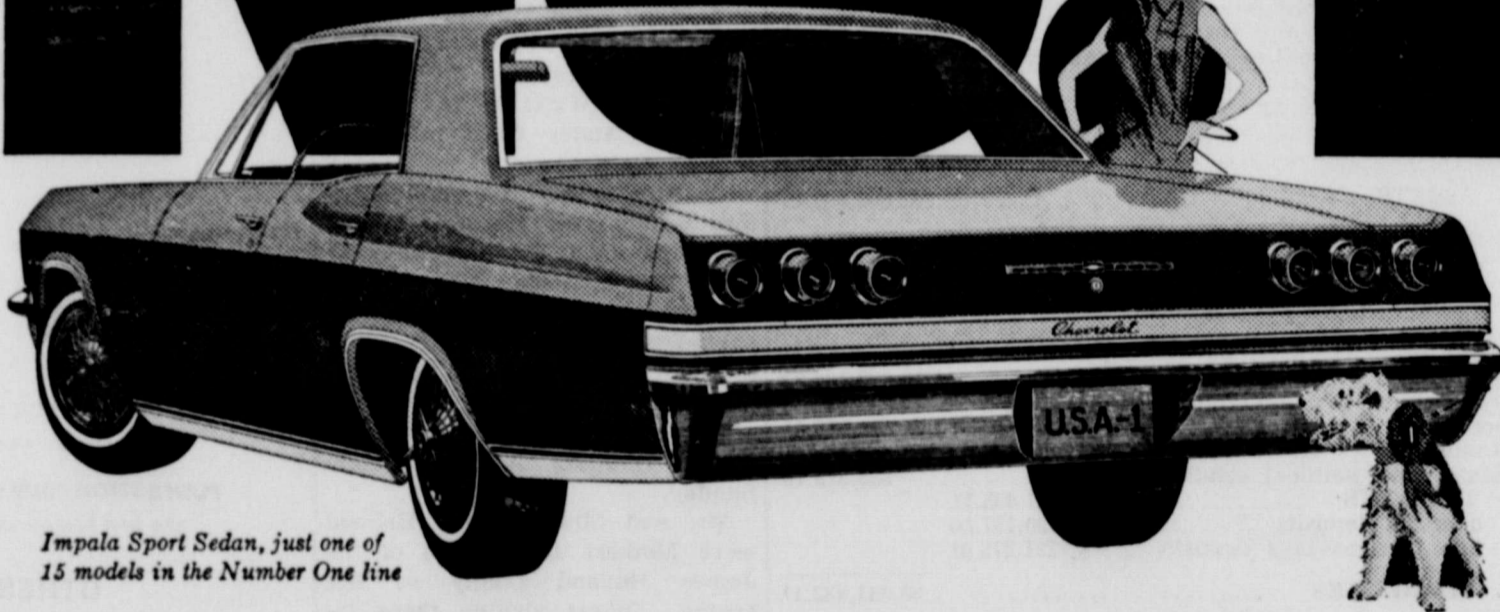

tration have spent many hours working on this proposal," the superintendent said. "We think we have come up with the most workable plan for this school district, and one which will adequately take care of our needs in the foreseeable future, and one which the board feels the district can afford."

Barbee also noted that "the only gain for anybody in the proposed program is for the students, who will, we believe, be able to do better work by having the improvements available for their use. The only aim of the board and the administration is to provide the best possible complete program for your children and mine, at a reasonable price."

Floor plans and other architectural details have not reached the final stages of planning, but at present it looks as though the proposed new facilities will consist of:

An underground section which will contain study hall, library, book room, commercial studies classroom and workroom, language classroom, teachers workroom, one other classroom yet to be assigned, and janitor's closet. This part of the structure will be 60 by 90 feet and would be available for school and community use as a shelter area.

An above-ground section on the science classroom and lab facilities,

storage rooms, principal's office, clerk's office and rest rooms.

A new gym would be located directly behind the above-ground classroom section with a basketball court 50 by 94 feet, and seating facilities for 664 persons.

The old gym would be retained for use as a girls' or junior high unit and bleachers removed and space converted into an exercise room.

The homemaking department, which would remain where it is now, and the corridors leading to the gym would be incorporated into that department.

The present study hall-library area which would be converted into a band and music department.

A new shop for the vocational agriculture department details for which are yet to be worked out.
