A "Learn to Swim" program will begin Monday at the Bronte County Park, as a cooperative effort of the park, Bronte Lions Club, and the Jaycee Chapter. No charge will be made students.

## Funeral Services Held Tuesday for T. G. Stinebaugh

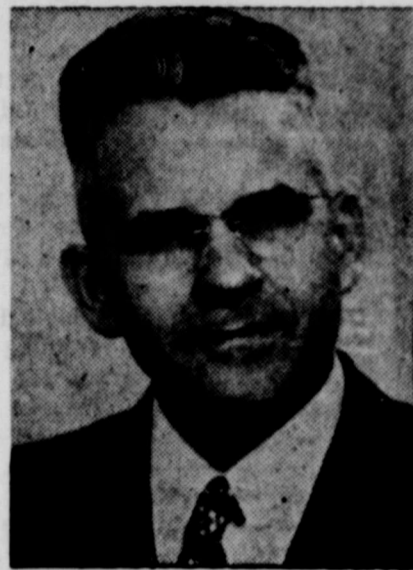

Mr. Stinebaugh, who was a retired farmer and stockman, died at 11:15 a.m. Sunday, June 13, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. E. McGuire, after a long illness.

Mr. Stinebaugh was born Sept. 15, 1880, in Collin County. He came to San Angelo in 1889, and moved to Coke County in 1913. He and Miss Olive Martin were married Sept. 16, 1915, in San Angelo. ## Work Program for Youth Is Approved By Dallas Office

Word was received Wednesday morning that approval of a work program for Coke County youths, as a part of the Economic Opportunity Act, has been approved by the regional office in Dallas and has been forwarded to Washington for approval there.

Bob Jameson, who is in charge of the program at Robert Lee, said he expects to secure final approval in time to get the jobs set up and underway by June 28. He said the latest word from the regional office is that Coke County's program should be set up under one supervisor for the entire county.

Jameson also said that the going wage for young people who work under the program has been increased from \$1.00 to \$1.25 per hour.

## Kiker New Member Of Water Dist. Board; Glenn New President

A new member and new officers were elected to serve on the board of directors of Coke County Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District at a meeting held June 3.

Norman R. Kiker was elected to fill the unexpired term of the late F. S. Higginbotham. His term of office will extend to January 1966.

At the same meeting D. K. Glenn, who has been vice president of the board, was elevated to the position of president, former-

ly held by Mr. Higginbotham. Royce Fancher was elected vice president in place of Glenn.

J. A. Percifull, who has been secretary-treasurer of the board since its inception, resigned that position and Kiker was elected to fill the vacancy. Kiker has been serving as clerk for the district since it was organized.

The board elected Glenn as contracting officer for the district and Kiker was named alternate contracting officer.

In other business transactions the board voted:

To have the books audited, and employed Harold Simpson of Austin to do the job.

To set the tax rate of the district for 1965 at 10 cents per \$100 valuation.

To hire the dams of the district sprayed for weeds. This work has been completed.

In addition to the men mentioned above, Preston Davis is a member of the five-man board. This board is the governing body in control of the water district which constructed the recently completed dams on the Kickapoo Creeks in this area. It also is in charge of maintaining the structures.

## Fishing Set for Weekend At Oak Creek Lake

A fishing tournament, sponsored by the Permian Bass Club of Odessa, will be held this weekend at Oak Creek Lake. Headquarters for the tourney will be on the north side of the lake at Oak Creek Boat Docks. June 19 and 20 are dates which have been set.

Cash prizes, trophies and merchandise prizes will be awarded to winners. Black bass will be the fish that tournament entrants are after, as other types of fish will not be considered in awarding the prizes.

### Tournament rules:

1. All contestants must be a member in good standing of a sportsman club.

2. Entry fees of \$5.00 per day must be paid in and headquarters

notified before starting to fish.

3. All prizes awarded on individual basis, fish one or two to a boat—wading or tube fishing permissible.

4. Fishermen can fish one or two days upon payment of proper entrance fees. Starting time is daylight and weighing in by 2 p.m. at headquarters.

5. The size of fish determined by weight. Fish must be 10 inches or over.

6. Minors will receive merchandise in lieu of money.

7. All state and county and federal laws must be obeyed. All decisions of contest judges will be final.

8. All fish must be caught by casting with artificial lures. (No

trolling or live bait). Black bass only.

Prizes will include: first prize, large bass, 30% of entry fees each day; second prize, large bass, 15% of entry fees each day. First prize, big individual string, 25% of entry fees each day; second prize, big individual string, 10% of entry fees each day.

Trophies will be given for the largest bass of the tournament and for the largest individual string.

Merchandise prizes will be given each day after the cash prizes and trophies have been awarded.

H. W. McClurg, 600 W. County Road, Odessa, is chairman of the tournament.

**County Agents News Column**

The Coke County 4-H Soil Judging team missed first place by ten points in the recent State Contest. C. L. Sparks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Sparks missed being high individual of the contest by a mere five points.

The Coke County team, composed of Sparks, Lynsey White, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy White, and Doyle Robertson, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Robertson, all of Robert Lee, placed third. Briscoe County was first with 1520 points, Bell County second with 1515 points and Coke third with 1510 points.

The high individual, from Bell County, had a score of 560 points, C. L. scored 555 points. This is an exceptionally high score for soil evaluation.

Coke County Program Building Committee, assisted by Agricultural agencies in the county and cooperating with C. E. Arrott and Dow Chemical Co., established a white brush control plot on Arrott's ranch at Juniper last year. The plot, strictly a test, was partially successful the first year. We are hopeful that a second application can be made this week.

The original test included five plots totaling 143 acres that were treated by aerial application of various levels of MCPA and 2, 4, 5-T.

The plot, where MCPA was applied at the rate of 1.25 pounds per acre appeared to show the best results. This year, the entire 143 acres will be sprayed with

MCPA at the rate of 1½ pounds per acre if all goes well. We, like the chemical companies, are hopeful that an economical control for white brush can be found.

A team of cotton insect surveyors, working for the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., and in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is now making weekly checks for cotton insects in Coke County. The two man team is scheduled to check four fields in Coke County every Friday morning. They will be checking at Frank Percifull's, Fred McCabe Jr.'s (Roe place), C. E. Arrott's (Ash place) and Pat Johnson's on the Hickman place.

The survey team will check fields in seven counties in this area each week. They hope to help keep us abreast of the cotton insect situation.

**H D Agent's News Dept.**

The use of onion in the preparation of daily menus has become so common that in many homes it is considered a staple to have on hand at all times.

Onions have been known and grown as food from the beginning of recorded history. Historians say that onions were brought to the Western World by early explorers.

Dry onions are available all year, with the supply fairly even each month. Supplies are heaviest, however, from March until the end of June. Green onions are

on the market all year, but are most abundant in spring and summer.

Here are some guidelines to use in selecting dry onions for quality: Choose those that are bright and clean, firm and solid, of uniform shape, and that have dry skins that crackle. To retain quality, store in a cool, dry place.

Onions bruise easily, so handle with care. Avoid buying in excessive amounts to prevent sprouting problems.

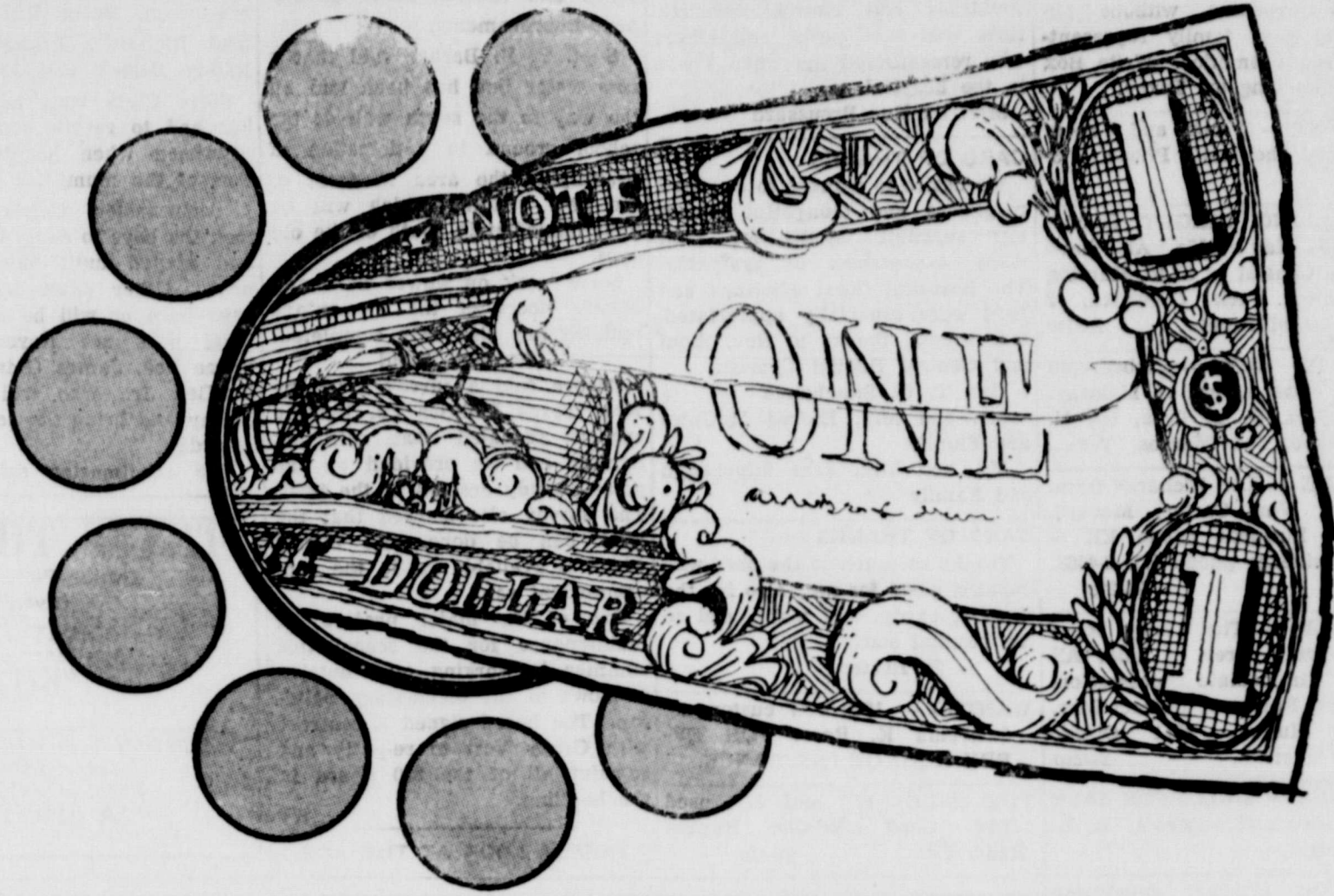
