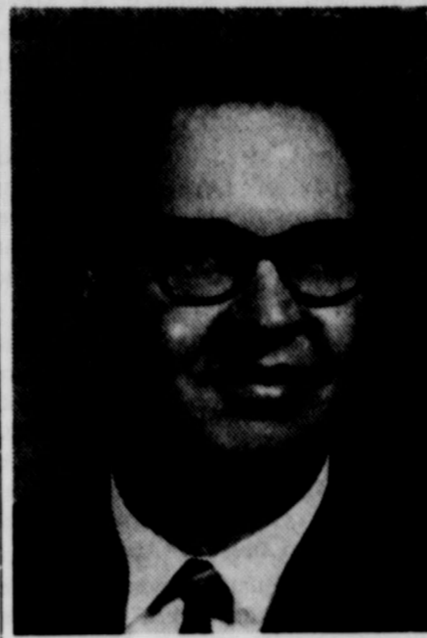

Bronte's Teen Age baseball club cinched a tie Tuesday night in league play when they defeated the lads at Lawn, 28-1. With only two games left in league competition, the Bronte lads have a perfect 8-0 record and are making plans to make it 10-0 and compete in the regional contest which will be held at Abilene.

David Glenn went all the way on the mound for Bronte in the

game with Lawn. He gave up one hit and struck out 11 of 15 batters. Davis Corley did the catching.

Manager Cecil Toliver told The Enterprise Wednesday morning that his players ran in 16 runs in the first inning before their hosts could take out the necessary three batters.

Doug McCutchen was the outstanding batter of the evening, hitting a home run which brought three runs across home plate.

Davis Corley did right well, also, with two doubles and two singles, and David Glenn chalked up a perfect night at bat with three walks and one hit. Keith McCutchen got on safely a couple of times, and single hitters were Rickey Wheat, Steve Williams and Monico Flores.

In a game played here July 3 with Winters, the Bronte lads won by a score of 14-3. Doug McCutchen was the winning pitcher. Jim Bob Arrott pitched the first two innings. Corley also caught this game.

The two remaining games include a contest with Wingate, here, July 10, and one with the Mets at Winters on July 12.

Coach Toliver said he can see no reason why his team shouldn't continue its winning streak and represent the league in the regional tournament.

Bloody Battle to Be Waged Friday Night

Agonized screams of the battle victims in the forthcoming ball game between Bronte Lions and Jaycees will be heard one day earlier than was originally planned, according to an announcement made this week by Lion President Elmer Hurley.

The grudge game, being played in an effort to work out by semi-peaceful means, some of the enmity which has been building up among members of the two service clubs, will be played Friday night, June 9, instead of Saturday night.

Ball fans, as well as those who like a good old fashioned brawl, are expected to come from far and near to witness the fracas. Some name calling and comments by both sides about the other club have been building up to a high

pitch, and peace officers are hopeful the game can be played without too much disturbance to the citizens of Bronte.

Royce Lee, manager of the Lion team, has stated in no uncertain terms that his team is built around men with solid experience on the ball diamond. He was critical of the Jaycees a couple of weeks ago when he said, "We'll be able to take them all right, but it will have to be in the field, because it's a cinch we won't be able to fan them out if their bat is half as big as their mouth."

Not to be outdone, Jaycee Manager Hurlin Lee told the Enterprise this week: "Speaking of big mouths, all us Jaycees look like we'd been eating green persimmons when you compare us with those big mouthed Lions. You know that a Lion in his natural

state can swallow a mighty big mouthful, and I want it on record that I said these Bronte Lions are no exception."

In a secret meeting of the Lions at 3 a.m. one day last week, Lion Lee discussed strategy with his teammates, and a plan for defeating the Jaycees was worked out. Lee said all this work will have to be done over, however, because "we later found out that our ranks had been infiltrated by sneaky spies from the Jaycees." He added, "That just shows how far Hurlin Lee will go to find out our plans. If he was any kind of a manager, he wouldn't have to stoop to such low tactics."

Jaycee Lee last week accused the Lions of deserting their own team to join up with the Jaycees. "You know some things (and you know what) will leave a sinking

ship, and these guys do have enough sense to know the Lions baseball team is on the verge of going under," the Jaycee manager said. He added, "Royce thinks those old men in the Lions Club will be able to put up a fight against us, but you know, it wouldn't surprise me if we have to play one inning a night until they holler they've had enough. I just don't believe they've got a man that can last more than one inning. I can just see those Lions out in the field chasing those homers and other long hits we're going to make. Of course I'm going to let them have two men in the field for each position but I sure hope some of them don't get run over when our men are running around the bases."

Lion Lee announced a couple of weeks ago that some new blood

has been injected into the Lions Club roster. He said "of course baseball never entered our minds when we accepted them as members of the Lions club, but if some of these fellows want to play, I may put them in some of the less active positions." The new members, he said, include Pistol Hood and Lynn White of Robert Lee, Robbie Cook and Larry Patton of Blackwell, and Ronnie Lee, Jim Morrow, Tad Richards, Jimmy Wells and Royce Lee of Bronte. Lion Lee bit off the end of a fresh cigar and acted as if he had complete confidence in his ball club.

Saving for Children's Education?

Seems to me there's been an unusual amount of discussion recently about college educations. Not only the rising costs, but the lack of facilities to meet the needs of increasing numbers of youngsters who want to go.

Some time ago the Treasury Department printed a leaflet on how to save for a college education through regular purchase of United States Savings Bonds. A main point was that the federal income tax due on the interest that accumulates can be reduced—or even wiped out entirely in most cases—by having the bonds issued in the child's name. Then a special income tax return is filed for the child, reporting the first year's interest as income. Since the interest will be well under \$900 in most cases, the tax liability will be satisfied without paying anything.

Now another question has come up. Can the parent's old bonds be transferred to the child, and accomplish the same thing? The answer is "yes," it can be done, but the parents must pay tax on accumulated interest up to that point; and the child is responsible from then on.

And, remember. Save all tax returns as proof of intention.

Meats for the Outdoor Grill

Outdoor meat cookery need not be limited to the expensive cuts of meat. With the barbecue season at hand, it's time to take inventory and consider all of the meat choices.

High quality chuck, ground beef, and round are all good cooked on the grill. The chuck and round are improved by a tenderizer.

This renewal of interest in tender steaks for outdoor cooking comes when the supply of steaks begins to get short. Some beef prices are up slightly because fewer beef animals are being marketed.

This is also the time of year when pork prices usually rise. Add to this the fact that the pig population is down, and the natural result is that pork prices also are on a slight rise.

Indications are that plenty of chicken will continue to be available. Cut up fryers or halves are delicious broiled over charcoal and basted occasionally with butter or barbecue sauce.

My favorite sauce for chickens is as follows:

½ cup butter, oleo, or 1 cup oil
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
Black pepper, red pepper, salt and paprika to taste.

Scant cup vinegar
Heat vinegar, add butter, oleo or oil and seasonings. Put into pint jar and shake to mix well. This recipe makes enough sauce for four fryers.

Baste chicken 3 or 4 times on each side while browning. Cook until leg bone turns easily and chicken is brown to desired degree.

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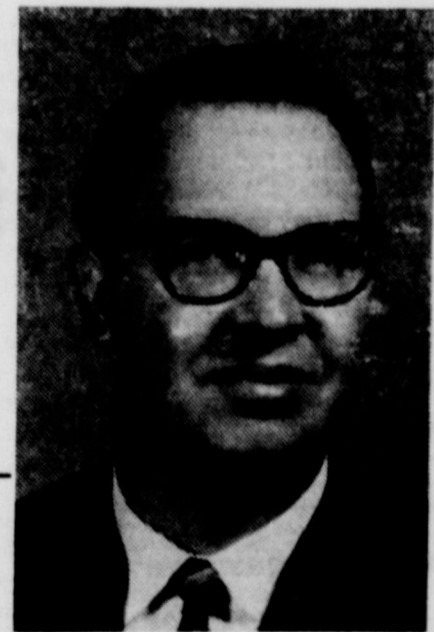
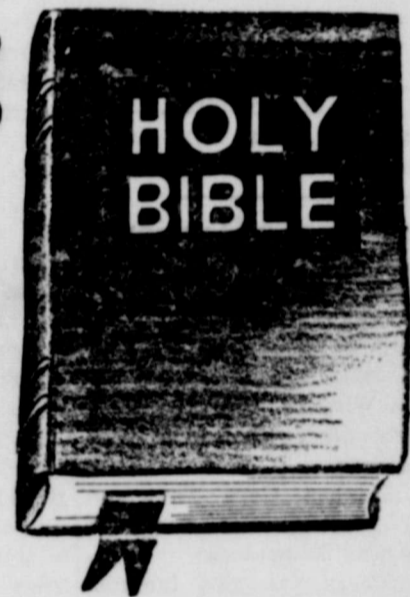

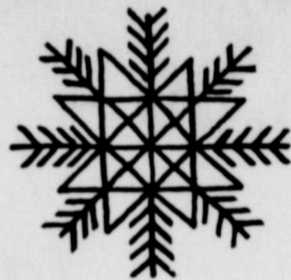
