FEDERAL OLD-AGE AND SURVIVORS INSURANCE

In developing information pertaining to claims for Federal oldage and survivors insurance, it has been found that some employers do not understand that wages may include other items than cash, Dewey Reed, manager of the Amarillo, Texas Social Security Board office, said today.

"In instances where an employer hires a person and agrees to pay him a certain amount of cash per day, week, or month, plus his board and lodging, then, these two last items are considered wages and are taxable under the law."


