Good Crowd Out For Annual Meet Of Game Assn.

A good sized crowd was present Saturday night when the annual meeting and barbecue of Coke County Game Management Association was held at the Bronte County Park.

The association, which fosters a program for proper game management and harvesting in the county, has 76 members signed up for this year.

The barbecue was prepared by Pat Johnson, and other food preparation work and serving was done by Aubrey Denman, Bronte park caretaker, and officers and directors of the association.

Following the supper, a program was given by representatives of the Park and Wildlife Department. Henry Burkett, regional director of San Angelo, spoke to the group, and Jack Parsons, also with the San Angelo office, talked on the antlerless deer permits program. He said that 400 permits were issued here last year and approximately 155 animals were harvested. He also stated that the department has completed data for determining the extent of this year's program, but the information has not been studied sufficiently to announce definite plans. It will be available before opening of deer season.

A film on the white winged dove was shown.

New officers were elected to serve during the coming year. The new president is Willis W. Smith; vice president, Preston Davis; secretary-treasurer, Melvin Childress. Directors are Earl Lindsey for precinct 1; Bob White, precinct 2; Dave King, precinct 3; LeDrew Arrott, precinct 4.

Next meeting of the game management association will be held at the Robert Lee County Park. Date will be announced later.

The Bronte Shorthorns, junior high football team, kept their perfect season record intact last Thursday night when they defeated Trent 32-16. The Shorthorns sewed up their half of the district with the win and will meet the winner of the north zone on Nov. 4 to decide the District 8-B championship.

The Shorthorns have one more game to play in south zone competition, but they could lose it and still maintain their championship of this zone. They will meet Robert Lee tonight (Thursday) at Robert Lee. They also have another game on their schedule, Oct. 28, when they host Hermleigh.

Quarterback Keith McCutchen drew first blood in the Trent game when he covered 43 yards on a

rollout play. James Vaughn tried a run on the conversion play but the Trent lads bucked up and threw him short. Score was 6-0.

It looked as though the Bronte boys would make another touchdown after Wesley Ash ran 70 yards from the Bronte 10 to Trent's 20, but Dickerson of Trent intercepted a pass and thwarted the Shorthorns' efforts. The half ended 6-0.

Bronte kicked off to start the second period, but Trent had to punt after 3 carries. Ash took Frazier's punt and almost got loose to go all the way. He was brought down on the Trent 29. Tommy Grace moved the ball up the middle to the 12, and then McCutchen tossed a pass to Ash for the counter. A McCutchen to Ash pass was

good for PAT and the score was 14-0.

Ash kicked off and Trent tried 3 times but wound up with a 4th and 11 situation. Vaughn took the punt and ran down the left side of the field for 60 yards and another TD. Conversion pass try failed and the score was 20-0.

After taking the kickoff, Trent was unable to move and had to punt. Once again the football went to Vaughn, who eluded the Trent defense and went in for another touchdown. Again the conversion try was no good, but Bronte had a comfortable 26-0 lead.

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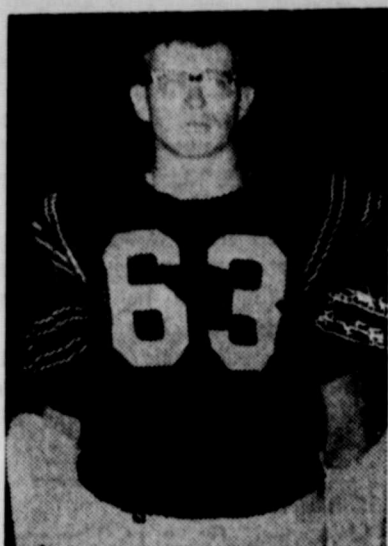

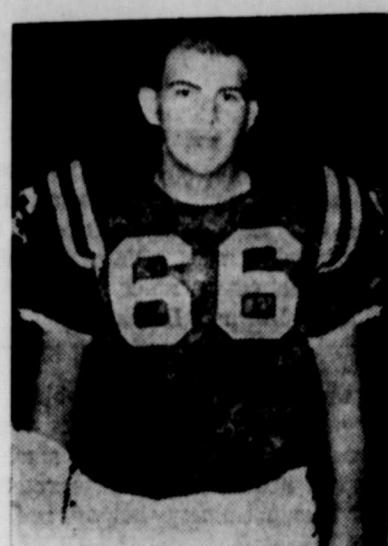
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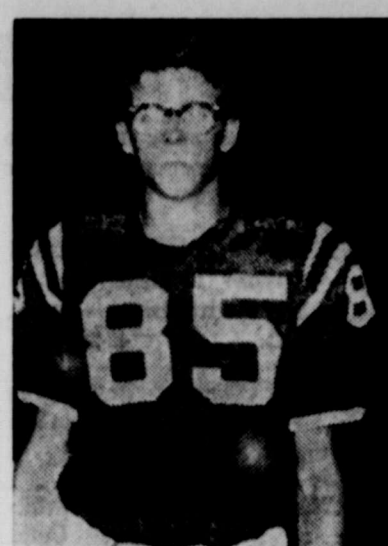
