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TICKET SALE STARTS TODAY

Bronte and Chillicothe Meet Thanksgiving Day

Thanksgiving Day will be a big day in Bronte. In addition to the usual feasting and family gatherings, the school and city will host a bi-district football game at 2 p.m.

The Bronte Longhorns, champions of District 8-B, will play the Chillicothe Eagles, champions of District 7-B. Negotiations to have the game at Bronte were completed last Friday night after the Trent football game. Supt. C. B. Barbee and Coach James Raughton were

fortunate enough to win the coin toss and bring the bi-district contest to Bronte.

Tickets for the big game will be divided into three groups: reserve section, adult general admission and student general admission. Reserve section tickets will cost \$1.75, while general admission tickets will be \$1.25 and 75 cents. There will be no refund on tickets not used.

Reserve section tickets will go on sale today (Thursday) at 8 a.m. at Hurlin Lee's Service Station.

Each purchaser will be limited to ten tickets. School officials announced that the number of reserve tickets will be limited and urged those who wish to purchase them to do so as soon as possible.

There will be no reserved seats in the section. However, a seat will be available for every ticket sold in the section. The reserve section will start at the 50 yard line and fan out on both sides to include as many seats as necessary. The remainder of the bleachers will be available to purchasers of general admission tickets.

General admission tickets will be sold only at the gate prior to the game.

The reserve section tickets went on sale Wednesday to members of the football squad. However, it was announced that players who did not buy their tickets yesterday will have to secure them at the service station, along with the general public.

Barbee pointed out that the reserve section tickets are stub type, and the entire ticket must be presented at the gate and the stub must be presented in the stands in order to obtain a seat in the section.

Bronte restaurants are expecting a big crowd before the game, and it is expected that all of them will be open to take care of the visitors from Chillicothe, as well as local business. City Cafe, Cactus Cafe, Bronte Cafe, McShans Snack Bar have definitely announced they will be open. The owner of Coalson's Red Barn was not available Wednesday morning, but it is presumed he will also be open.

Supt. Barbee commented this week that "this as a big thing for Bronte, and we want to be good hosts to our visitors from Chillicothe. I want to urge everyone in the Bronte Community to show these folks every consideration and courtesy while they are guests in our town."

Mayor Royce Lee also stated his satisfaction at having the bi-district game in Bronte. "As mayor, I want to extend a hearty West Texas welcome to the people of Chillicothe," he said.

Bronte to Meet Steers Friday

In spite of having the district championship sewed up, the Bronte Longhorns still face a formidable foe Friday night when the Robert Lee Steers invade Stephenson Field. The game will decide the unofficial but much sought after "Coke County Champions" title.

Bronte will go into the game with a 4-0-0 district record, while the Steers have won two, tied one, and lost one. Season records show

the Steers with a 3-5-1 tally while the Longhorns boast a 7-2-0 for the nine games played so far.

Usual pre-game rivalry between Robert Lee and Bronte has been running rampant this week. Robert Lee's school bell showed up Tuesday morning on the sidewalk in front of Bronte High School and unknown persons prematurely set fire Tuesday night to Bronte's pile of scrap wood which was to be used Thursday night for a bon fire.

New Bronte-Robert Lee Road Okayed By Hiway Commission

The Texas Highway Commission has approved reconstruction of Highway 158 between Robert Lee and Bronte. Announcement of the okay on the project came in a news release Wednesday morning.

The information stated that the 1967-68 Consolidated Highway Program will include purchase of right of way and reconstruction of Highway 158 from Robert Lee, east to Bronte, a distance of 11.9 miles.

Some talk on widening and straightening the highway has been

heard the past several months, and, apparently the work will be part of the 1967-68 construction program. Traffic on Highway 158 between Bronte and Robert Lee is pretty heavy and some lengthy no-passing zones sometimes make travel slow.

Some other smaller projects for Coke County included in the program were announced as follows:

U. S. Highway 277 — Place asphalt seal coat on shoulders from Bronte to Tom Green County line,

a distance of 13.4 miles.

State Highway 208 — Widen two bridges and approaches from 2.5 miles north of Tom Green County line, north, a distance of 1 mile.

State Highway 208 — Reconstruct highway from 4.2 miles south of Robert Lee, south, a distance of 1.1 miles.

Farm to Market Road 2333—Place asphalt seal coat from U. S. 277 to Runnels County line, a distance of 3.1 miles.

Action Starts on Enlarging UCRA

Action was started all over again Monday on the proposition of enlarging the Upper Colorado River Authority to include at least seven more West Texas counties along with its present members, Tom Green and Coke counties.

A meeting was held in San Angelo and representatives from five West Texas water authorities agreed to try to get a bill rewritten to enlarge the district and to secure local sponsors for construction of a dam at the confluence of the Colorado and Concho rivers (known as the Stacy site), and in Menard County on the San Saba River.

Gerald C. Allen of Robert Lee, UCRA president, was named chairman of a committee, representing all interested counties, to work for passage of the enlargement bill.

Representatives from Mills and Lampasas counties were also present at the meeting and expressed interest of their counties in joining the proposed enlarged UCRA.

A bill to include the seven other counties in the water authority was passed by the last legislature, but the bill was vetoed by Governor John Connally because he objected to certain parts of the bill concerning police powers and water pollution.

Counties involved in the first bill included the two present member counties and Menard, Schleicher, Concho, Coleman, Runnels, Irion and Sterling counties.

The group agreed that they would request the City of San Angelo to act as sponsors for the Stacy Dam. Members of the Menard County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 agreed to serve as sponsors for the Menard dam.

Mr. Lewis was born Dec. 5, 1878, in Mansfield, La. He was married to Lexie James, Nov. 7, 1914, at Calallen. They lived in Ballinger for some time and moved from there to Robert Lee in 1935.

Immediately after arriving in Robert Lee, Mr. Lewis established a business, handling milk, ice and produce. He served as tax assessor-collector for the Robert Lee Independent School District 11 years, with his wife as office assistant. They retired in July 1961.

Mr. Lewis was a member of the Christian Church.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Robert Lee Postmaster Hugh S. Lewis Jr.; a daughter, Mrs. Cecil (Frances) Kemp of Bronte; one sister, Mrs. Maggie Creswell of Leaday; four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Another son, Edward (Eddie) Lewis, was lost in action during World War II when his plane overshoot the runway and landed in the water near Wake Island off the coast of New Guinea.

County Agents News Column

Home is still the favorite place to be. I recently had the privilege of making a trip that took me into Western Pennsylvania. I thoroughly enjoyed the tour. The scenery was nice, the weather was good for traveling and we saw some very good farming and stock country, particularly in the cornbelt. Despite this, the open semi-arid spaces of our area looked very pleasing on our return home. The smog, crowded conditions and different atmosphere would be difficult for me to become adjusted to.

The Coke County cotton harvest is well underway now. The yield to date indicate we are having a better than average year. Some yields have been very good. All this after a spring that looked rather unpromising. We were dry and late getting any cotton started. But, the moisture that came later, plus the light damage by insects, changed our prospects. Though not a bumper crop, the yields to date are much better than were expected in the spring.

We have more and more interest in fertilizer or plant foods as time passes. This is good. We hope the trend will continue. Not all Coke County soils need fertilizing nor will the added yields be large every year. But, plant foods will help improve net returns on many Coke County farms or ranches. They particularly should be helpful on the older, sandy fields. Also, under grazing crops in the spring when moisture is available.

No one can tell exactly how much plant food is exactly the right amount for a given field or crop. The best method known at the present to determine the needs of a field is a soil test. A number of operators have had their soils tested this year. We hope more will do so in the future. During the winter, the off season, is a good time to have the testing done. Then you can be ready when the warm season comes. If you need some instructions on taking a sample or a carton to mail a sample in, let us know. We have a supply of both. The testing costs \$2.00. This could be a very cheap investment.

The Coke County Fat Stock Show will be held at the showbarn in Robert Lee on January 10, 1966. We should have another big county show with 75 or more 4-H and FFA members participating.

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Longhorns Down Trent; Take 8-B Crown

The Bronte Longhorns sewed up the championship of District 8-B last Friday night when they defeated the Trent Gorillas, 39-8. The win gave the Longhorns four wins in district play and seven straight victories for the season.

Four of Bronte's touchdowns were made by Douglas McCutchen, and one was made on a David Glenn to Royce Lee pass play.

First Quarter

Danny Kiser was the Gorilla who got things started with the opening kickoff. It went to Tad Richards who was downed on his 29 yard line. Richards made 4 yards on the first play of the game from scrimmage, but it was nullified when Bronte took a five yard penalty against their hosts. With a 1st and 5 on the 34. McCutchen took the handoff from Glenn, got some good blocking and went up the right side for 69 yards and the first touchdown of the evening. T. Richards ran the PAT to make the score 8-0.

Larry Corley was in his usual good kicking form Friday night and got quite a few opportunities to slam his toe against the ball. His kick was taken by Larry Bagley, who worked his way to the 29 before Davis Corley brought him to the ground. The Gorillas made 7 yards in 3 tries, so Bagley punted a long high kick to the Longhorn 29 where the Bronte boys took over.

McCutchen and T. Richards carried the ball to the Gorilla 35 in 4 plays, making two 1st downs and 36 yards. Richards then made 3 and Trent drew a 5 yard penalty. Glenn carried for 4 and a 1st on the 23. The next series of downs didn't go so well for the Longhorns as they lost 12 yards back to the 35, where the Gorillas took over.

L. Corley, Glenn and Lee were the principal tacklers who held the Gorillas to a gain of 1 yard on 3 plays. They had to punt, but Bagley got a high snap from center and was slow in recovering the ball and getting his kick away. The kick was blocked and rolled to the Trent 6 where Bronte took over.

McCutchen made a yard, Glenn made 3 and Trent was penalized to the 1. From there McCutchen went over the right side for the second Longhorn counter of the night. McCutchen kicked the extra point and the score was 15-0.

L. Corley kicked to Eddie Mitchell, who was downed by T. Richards on the 19. Elton Payne picked up 7 on the first play. Then on the second, the Longhorns all missed Deris Hutchinson who went 75 yards for Trent's lone touchdown of the evening. It was a beautiful play, and when the extra points made through the middle by Payne were added on, the scoreboard was still top heavy for Bronte with its 15-8 reading.

To make the situation a little more binding, a Longhorn fumble following the kickoff was recovered by Trent on the Longhorn 26. Bagley made 3 over right tackle, then Lee came in to throw Hutcheson for a 3 yard loss to make it 3rd and 10. Larry Hellums picked up 5 and it looked as though a pass was the only way around the Longhorn line. The ball was thrown, but it went incomplete, and the Longhorns had staved off another real Gorilla threat.

Second Quarter

Taking off from the 21, T. Richards went 27 yards to the 48 for a 1st down. Doak Snead made 7, and McCutchen went for 13 more for a 1st on the 32. Richards made 8, then a fumble cost the Longhorns the ball on the 27.

The Bronte line held for no gain then Payne got loose for 8. He then moved to the 45, but a penalty moved the ball back and the Gorillas had a 3rd and 7. Another no-gainer made it 4th and 7 and the Gorillas had to kick. Victor Brock shot through the Gorilla line and blocked the punt for the Longhorns and they took over on the Trent 25 yard line.

T. Richards made 3 yards, Glenn tossed an incomplete pass, and then he connected with Royce Lee who covered the distance to the double stripe for the 3rd Longhorn touchdown. The same Glenn to Lee pass combination was good for 2 extras, and the Longhorns led 23-8.

Larry Corley's kick went to Hutcheson and Gary Allen took him on the 25. A pass looked good but Glenn jarred it loose before it was completely secure.
