Longhorns, Eagles Meet Thurs. In Bi-District Tilt

Thursday is the day for the big game of the year in Bronte. The District 8-B champions, the Bronte Longhorns, will meet the Chillicothe Eagles, champions of District 7-B. Game time is 2 p.m. at Stephenson Field. General admission tickets will be \$1.25 and 75 cents.

An advance ticket sale for the bi-district games has been in progress since last Thursday when 200 reserve section tickets were put on sale for \$1.75 each at Hurlin Lee's service station. They went in a hurry and approximately 100 more are now ready for those who wish to buy them and be assured of having a seat at the game.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said if any of the reserve section tickets are left they may be put on sale at the ticket office about 1 p.m. Thursday. However, he pointed out that the choice seats closest to the 50 yard line will be used by those who bought tickets early.

The Chillicothe Eagles are planning to bring 200 to 300 fans with

them. Supt. Barbee asked The Enterprise to point out again in this week's paper that Bronte residents should extend the visitors every possible courtesy while they are in Bronte. "Having the bi-district game in Bronte is an important event in our school and our town, and I hope every citizen of the Bronte area will go out of his way to welcome our guests," the superintendent said.

Mayor Royce Lee also extended a welcome to the visitors. He said: "We want to make the people from Chillicothe know we are glad to have them. They will carry home a good or bad impression of our town, depending on the way we treat them."

The Longhorns will go into the bi-district playoff with a little better record than the Eagles. In season play, the Longhorns have scored 281 points to their opponents' 109. The Eagles have made 144 while their opponents have chalked up 132. The records are more even in district play, but the Longhorns still have the edge. In District 8-B games, they have scored 194 to their opponents' 37. District 7-B contests have given the Eagles 120 points while their opponents have made 51.

Head Coach David Spears and Assistant Coach Monte Pannell will be ramrodding the Eagle team, and the Bronte Longhorns will play under the direction of Head Coach Cecil Toliver and Assistant Coach James Raughton.

Officials for the game will be Bryan Kenner and Richard Christopher of the Wichita Falls Officials Association, and Willard Justiss and Archie Hunter of the Sweetwater Association.

This year's district win is the first for the Eagles in 10 years. Last district win for the Longhorns was in 1961. Both teams will be working hard to advance to the regional playoff which will be next on the docket for the winner.

Longhorns Down Steers, 20-15 To Keep Perfect District Record

The Bronte Longhorns didn't give away any of the secrets of their success last Friday night when they slipped by the Robert Lee Steers, 20-15, in the last game of their regular 1965 schedule. The over anxious Longhorns suffered penalties totaling 82 yards. Doug McCutchen just about stole the show for the Bronte offense, as he made all three touchdowns. The lone successful conversion was a pass from David Glenn to Royce Lee.

First Quarter

Larry Corley got things underway with his kickoff which went to Robert Wink. Wink fumbled the ball but managed to recover. He carried once for no gain, then Sam Williams made a yard. The Steers quick kicked on 3rd down and Williams' punt rolled dead on the Longhorn 35.

Tad Richards went for 4, then Glenn on a keeper play went 8 to the 47 for a 1st. McCutchen then went 33 yards to the Steer 20 for a 1st down. T. Richards made 4, then lost a yard. On 3rd down McCutchen went the remaining 17 yards around the left side for the first touchdown of the evening. Extra point kick was blocked by Carl Bloodworth and the score was 6-0.

Corley's kick was received by Wink handed off to Ray Don Roe. Roe was downed on the 31. First play of the series netted no yards, then Williams made 4. A 3rd down pass from Williams to Wink was good for a 1st on the Bronte 42.

The Steers, on the next series, were faced with a 3rd and 12 situation, and Wink tossed a pass, but Larry Corley intercepted it. However, the joy was short lived, as the play was called back and Bronte was penalized 5 for offsidings. Another pass play went incomplete, so Williams punted. Once again the play was called back and Bronte was penalized 15 for roughing the kicker. This gave the Steers a 1st on the Bronte 30. Williams made 5, then it was wiped out by a penalty, making it 2nd and 10. On the 3rd play, McCutchen intercepted a Steer pass. He just about got loose, but was finally downed on the Steer 30 yard line. Glenn kept and gained 3, then T. Richards lost 4. The 3rd down play called for a right end run by McCutchen, and he went all the way for Bronte's second touchdown. Glenn tossed a pass to Lee, who was standing all alone on the left side of the end zone. Score was 14-0.

Larry Corley kicked to Wink, who ran into trouble and was downed on his own 10. Wink then made 4 and Williams added another 2. A 3rd down fumble was recovered by Lee on the 5 to give Bronte what appeared to be another perfect scoring position. However, the Longhorns returned the favor and turned loose of the football. Buddy Vosburg covered it on the 7 for the Steers.

Second Quarter

Gary Parker and Roe both made 6 to give Robert Lee a 1st down on the 19. Wink tried to pass but was smothered and lost 8 yards. He then regained part of it with an 11 yard pass to Williams. The Steers then lost 15 yards, making it 4th and 22, which the Robert Lee boys considered a kicking situation. Williams got off the punt which rolled dead on the 34 yard line.

Glenn tossed an 11 yard pass to Lee for a 1st. McCutchen picked up 7, then Bronte was penalized 15 yards. McCutchen caught a pass for a couple of yards and Bronte was penalized 5 for delay of the game, making it 4th and 19. The Longhorns decided they should punt. Lee's kick was a beauty, but it didn't stand, as the Steers were penalized 15 for roughing the kicker. The local lads decided against the kick and Glenn tossed the ball

to Doak Snead, who went to the 7 yard line before he was pulled in.

The Steers defenders got bull-headed and the Longhorns lost on 3 successive tries. Faced with a 4th and 21, the Longhorns decided to let McCutchen try a field goal. A bad snap of center ended that idea very quickly and the Steers took over on their 35. Parker made 5 and Bronte was penalized 15 for a personal foul, to give the Steers a 1st on the Longhorn 45. Bronte then drew a 5 yarder for offsidings. Parker went to the 30 for a 1st, then Wink moved it up to the 25, where the Steers had a 4th and 5. A pass to Gaylon Pitcock was good for a 1st on the 14. Parker and Roe made 4 each, then Williams went to the 4 for a 1st and goal. The Steers lost back to the 8 on 2 plays, then an incomplete pass made it 4th and goal on the 8. Another pass try to Pitcock was good and the Steers were on the scoreboard. Williams ran the conversion and the score was 14-8.

Drexel Skipworth kicked off and the Longhorns got off two plays before the end of the half.

Third Quarter

Williams kicked to McCutchen, who went up the middle to the 43 yard line. The Longhorns bogged down and had to punt. Lee got off the longest kick of the night, and the only one for the Longhorns which was not called back. The pigskin spiraled through the air for a total of 56 yards, to give the visitors the ball on their 17 yard line.

Williams carried twice to the 23 and a 1st. Roe then made 7 and the Steers tossed an incomplete pass. Parker made almost 3, but it measured short to bring up 4th. The Steers decided to run for it, but again they came up short and Bronte took over on the 37 yard line. McCutchen made 13 yards on two carries for a 1st on the 24. He then went around the right side of the line for Bronte's third TD. The extra point try failed. Score: 20-8.

Larry Corley's kick went to Wink who got out to the 34. The Steers then began a march down the field which carried them 66 yards and to pay dirt. Ten plays and one Bronte penalty carried them to the 5 yard line and added 3 more 1st downs to their record for the night. Wink made 1 of the needed yards, then Bronte was penalized 2 to make it 2nd and 2. Wink carried again around the right side to cross the double stripe. Williams kicked the extra point, and the scoreboard read, 20-15.

Skipworth kicked to McCutchen who was downed on the 34. McCutchen made a yard, and a 15 yard personal foul penalty against the Steers gave the Longhorns a 1st at midfield. Tad Richards made 9 yards on the final play of the quarter.

Fourth Quarter

With a 2nd and 1 on the Steer 41, Glenn threw the ball to Lee who was stopped on the 38 for another 1st. The Steers and Longhorns both received penalties. Then a pass

from Glenn to T. Richards was completed for 18 yards and a 1st on the 20. McCutchen then went for 12 and a 1st and goal on the 8. A loss of a yard and a 3 yard gain on a pass to T. Richards made it 3rd and goal on the 6. The Steers then ganged up on McCutchen and threw him for a 5 yard loss to bring up 4th and 11. Once again the Longhorns got set up for a field goal try. A fumble cost him the ball on the 17.

Parker made 3, Roe added 2 and Williams went for 6 and a 1st on the 28. The Steers couldn't move on the next series, and Williams kicked to the Bronte 38.

T. Richards made 2 and McCutchen moved to the 45. Then Bronte was penalized 5, but McCutchen made it up when he went to the 49 for a 1st. T. Richards carried twice for 9 yards, then a fumble cost the Longhorns the ball on the Robert Lee 38.

An incomplete pass was followed by a 9 yard run by Wink. Another incomplete pass made it 4th and 1 for the Steers. The visitors wanted

desperately to make the 1st, so they ran the play, but it came up short and Bronte took over on the Bronte 49 yard line.

McCutchen went for 10 and a 1st on the Steer 41. The local lads could see by the clock that they could run out the time on the new series of downs, so Glenn took his time calling signals and fell on the ball as soon as he got the snap. However, the Longhorns were awarded their final penalty of the night during this series, a 5 yarder for delaying the game. Final score: 20-15.
