Russell Brown Back in States After Year's Duty in Vietnam

"A year in Vietnam will change a lot of your ways of looking at things," said Russell Brown this week in an interview with the Enterprise. He arrived in the United States Dec. 8 after a year in the Southeast Asian country, where this country is committed to all out war to keep it from falling into the hands of the Communists.

Brown said duty in the Viet Cong infested country "will make a guy grow up" and "really makes you appreciate the things you've left at home."

He was more than a little critical of the demonstrations against American policy and the activities of American troops in Vietnam and almost said an ugly word when discussing draft card burners.

Brown landed at Saigon Dec. 15, 1964. A signal supply and parts specialist, he was assigned to duty there for five months and then was given a TDY assignment which took him from one end of the long, narrow country to the other. During this six weeks period, he ranged as

far south as Soc Trang and as far north as Da Nang. Brown was doing inspectional duty during this time. His next base was at Nha Trang, where he was stationed for four months, and then he went back to Saigon for the remainder of his time.

Brown is currently on 45 day leave and is visiting with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Brown, and other relatives in this area. He is a 1963 graduate of Bronte High School and went into the Army about 22 months ago. When his leave is over, he will report for duty at

Ft. Sill, Okla. He has 14 more months in his three year hitch in the service.

The Bronte soldier said Vietnam is working alive with U. S. servicemen, but when he first arrived in the country, only about 40,000 were in the country. More than 200,000

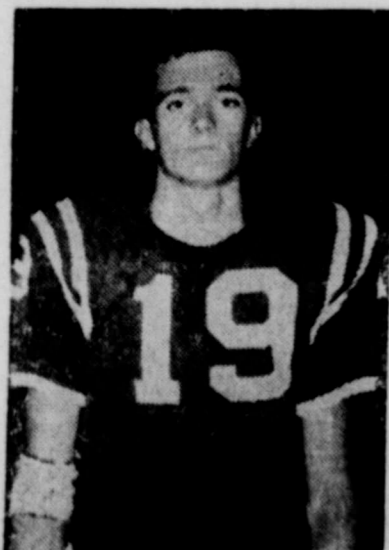

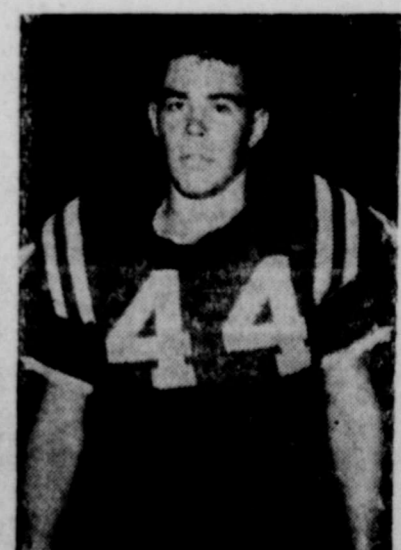

Fancy Rolls Add Flare to Meals

You can add a festive touch to your holiday meals by baking dinner rolls in fancy shapes. They are not as hard to make as you might think. You can make fan-tan, cloverleaf, crescent and parkerhouse rolls from one basic sweet dough recipe.

For fan-tan rolls, roll or pat the dough into a rectangle about 1/4-inch thick. Brush the top with melted fat, and cut the dough into strips one-inch wide. Place five to eight strips one on top of another. Cut into pieces about 1 1/2 inches long. Place each short pile on end in greased muffin cups.

Cloverleaf rolls are also baked in a muffin pan. Divide the dough into small balls. Dip each ball in melted butter or other fat. Place fat side up, in greased cups of muffin pans. Three of the balls should only half fill the cup in your muffin tin.

To make crescent rolls, roll or pat the dough into circles about 10-inches in diameter and 1/4-inch thick. Cut the dough into 12 pie-shaped pieces and brush with fat. Begin at the outer edge and roll the dough to the point and press together. Curve the rolled dough slightly to form a crescent and place it, pointed side underneath, on a greased baking sheet.

Popular parkerhouse rolls are made by rolling or patting the dough about 1/2-inch thick. Brush the top with soft butter or other fat and cut the dough with a biscuit cutter. Fold each circle over, fat side in, to form a half circle. Press the outer edges together firmly and place on a greased baking sheet.

New Features for Appliances

There are many new features on modern appliances that will make a housewife's duties easier.

Easy cleaning is the new emphasis on kitchen ranges. Features include removable oven liners; intense heat self-cleaning ovens; and oven doors, top heating elements, cooking surfaces and rack supports that lift-off. Other features are programmed cooking, no turn broilers and meat probes built into the range. Frost free refrigerators are fast becoming standard appliances. Some manufacturers have the frost free models in about half of their total line. The automatic ice maker is gaining in popularity. Other features include seven-day meat keepers, and adjustable shelves.

With the advent of new textiles, especially the delicate synthetics, washing machine manufacturers have had to cope with the requirements for laundering a wide variety of textiles. One way to solve this problem is to have programmed push button controls preset by the manufacturer so that the housewife can select separate laundering cycles appropriate for the articles to be washed.

The newest washing machine feature is the introduction of solid-state controls, an "infinite" choice of speed settings on the washer to assure the homemaker that the agitate and spin speeds can handle the most delicate fabrics. The newest models with these features will be 16 pound capacity and will probably sell for \$230-\$350.

Storing Pecans: Pecans-in-the-shell keep well at room temperature up to 8 months; in the refrigerator 36 months. Shelled pecans keep best when kept cool — up to 9 months in the refrigerator. Vacuum cans should be placed in the refrigerator once opened. Plastic bags of pecans stay fresh longer, if, after opening, they are resealed with tape, or a twisted wire band, then placed in the refrigerator.

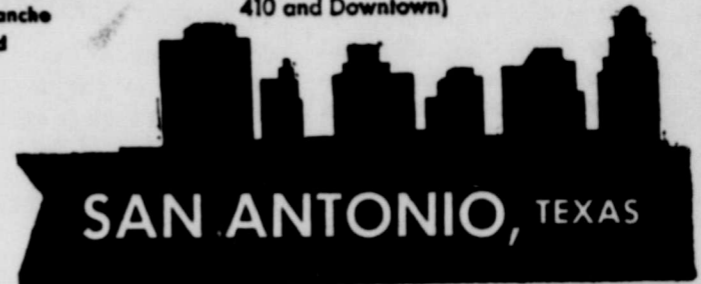

County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

We received a supply of 1966 Farmers Tax Guides a few days ago. If you would like a copy, give us a ring or drop by the office.

The County Stock Show is just around the corner — 25 days away. The 1966 edition should be another grand one. We expect 260-270 head of livestock to be entered by more than 70 4-H and FFA members. January 10 is the day — mark it on your calendar.

Screwworm numbers are up again slightly. Texas had 25 cases in the last reporting week. A good cold spell would help stem the tide. None of the cases were found in this area.

General economic outlook is good for 1966. Taking all factors into consideration, the year ahead should be one of vigorous and generally well balanced economic growth, says Extension Economist John G. McHaney. Major factors include increases in total employment, consumer incomes, private

investments in new plants and equipment and larger purchases of goods and services by government — local, state and federal.

What is the best time of the year to prune trees? This depends on the reason for pruning.

Deadwood can be removed from trees anytime without injuring them. Spring pruning, however, is recommended when doing correctional pruning, since the wounds heal faster than at other times of the year.

If your objective is to increase fruit and bloom set, prune before the blossoms form in midsummer. If, the other hand, you want to decrease the number of blossoms, prune before they bloom after the blossoms have set.

Authorities state that pruning trees during early fall tends to reduce plant hardiness and, in general, is not a good practice. Evergreens should not be sheared in late summer or fall as the cut ends will not heal over until spring.

Dead branches can be removed now.

We have copies of a very good publication on pruning — "Modern Pruning Methods" for anyone who would like more information.

are presently serving, and he said the miles and miles of tents in some areas is unbelievable.

He said that the cooperation between U. S. and Australian troops is excellent and that they get along well together.

Brown said Vietnam is a beautiful country, with much lush tropical vegetation. Most of it, however, is dirty and ill-kept, he said, and current battles which destroy much property and many lives only add to the misery and filth. He pointed out that downtown Saigon, as well as a few other cities, are very modern and well cared for.

On being asked if such things as snakes were a hazard, he said that they are seldom seen, except in captivity where they are offered for sale. Cobras and giant snakes abound in the country, he said, but the natives keep them under control and they give servicemen little trouble.

Brown said he was never actually in combat, but added that everyone in a U.S. uniform is in danger from the Viet Cong, who infiltrate the country from the north. He said that thousands of communist troops are coming into the country from North Vietnam and Red China. Most of them infiltrate down along the western border and also through Laos and Cambodia.

The young soldier said one of

the most pleasant experiences he had was running into Don Andrews, also of Bronte, a couple of weeks ago, shortly after Andrews arrived there. Andrews is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Andrews of Bronte. Brown said Andrews is in the 39th Signal Battalion, just as he was.
