Three tracts, aggregating over 1,-800 acres, have been acquired for the new lake near Robert Lee.

O. H. Ivie, general manager of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, said that purchase agreements have been signed by the district and three land owners, and that negotiations are underway on at least two others.

While the land under agreement is about one-tenth of that which will be needed for the entire project, it is approximately half of that required for the damsite. So far as possible, the district is attempting to get the land in the dam area

The CRMWD has reached agreement within appraised figures, the general manager said.

As rapidly as other appraisals and surveys are put in the land committee's hands, negotiations will be started, Ivie added. However, there will be a limit to what can be purchased until revenue bonds for the project are issued.

So far, the district has been making the purchases out of advances from the improvement and extension fund.

If progress continues at the present rate, CRWMD may still hold its time table of a mid-year letting of the huge project to impound a lake of 488,000 acre feet.
