Longhorns in State Tourney

Public Schools Week To Be Observed Here

Annual observance of Public Schools Week, March 7-11, will be highlighted in Bronte with a joint banquet of Bronte Masonic Lodge and Bronte Lions Club. The affair will be at 7 p.m. in the school lunchroom. Following the banquet, those attending will move to the auditorium for a program, with persons attending a PTA meeting.

9 Out for Trustee For Bronte School

Names of nine candidates have been filed for the three trustee jobs which will become vacant next month. This count was announced Wednesday morning from the office of Judge W. W. Thetford.

Six candidates had filed when last week's Enterprise went to press, and the three new candidates are Joe Rawlings, Charles C. Lee and Bill G. Thomas. Candidates announced last week were Horace Taylor, James Wells, Marvin Landers, G. L. Latimer, M. D. (Dolan) Mackey and Eddie G. Collins. Taylor, Wells and Rawlings are presently serving as trustees.

Balloting for the school election will be held Saturday, April 2. Voting places will be set up at Bronte city hall and at Green's Store in Tennyson.

Trustees whose terms do not expire this year include Conda O. Richards, A. E. Bell Jr. and Wayne Arrott.

A reported 397 persons were present last Sunday in the five churches in Bronte.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said that everyone is invited to visit the school during the week. He called attention to the fact that the local school will have only a four day week, however, since Friday, March 11, is a school holiday. Classes will be dismissed in order for teachers to attend a convention of Texas State Teachers Association in San Angelo.

Sheriff Melvin Childress will be the speaker for the Tuesday night program. The program will take the place of a regular PTA program, Barbee said. Entertainment will be provided by Tony Olivas, Doak Snead and Steve Williams, Janet Lee, Bennie Carol Oglesby and Suzanne Pruitt; George Latimer and Jerry Mulnix. The public is invited to attend the program.

The Lions and Masons have been leaders in promotion of Public Schools Week in Bronte since the observance was begun some 16 years ago. They have sponsored the joint banquet for several years. A committee of Masons working on the project is made up of Leonard Fletcher, Jesse Parker and Royce Fancher.

Band to Attend District Festival

The Bronte Longhorn Band will participate in a Band Festival Saturday at Sweetwater. Band Director Russell Fuller will take his band to Sweetwater without some of its members, who have made arrangements to attend the basketball tournament in Austin this weekend.

Four Names Filed For City Offices

Names of three incumbents and one name new to city politics have been filed by petition for places on the ballots to be used in a city election scheduled for April 5.

Petitioned to run again are Mayor Royce Lee and Aldermen Martin Lee and Billy Joe Luckett. The new man who was petitioned to seek a place on the ticket is Kenneth (Buddy) Reed.

Candidates have until Saturday, March 5, to file their names.

Elmer Hurley, the other alderman whose term expires this year, said he did not wish to seek reelection.

Two holdover members of the council are Norman R. Kiker and Horace Grigg.

Water Rates Talk Set for March 10

Mayor Royce Lee announced this week that a hearing which was set some time ago to discuss Bronte water rates has been postponed until Thursday, March 10.

A meeting of the city council will be held following the hearing. The mayor said the public is invited and encouraged to attend the hearing on water rates.

The city council came up with a proposal some time ago to increase water prices here. Members wanted to hold the hearing, however, and determine how the public feels about it before the new rates are finally approved.

The hearing will be at 6:30 p.m., followed by the council meeting.

The Bronte Longhorn basketball team is in Austin today (Thursday) to participate in the state basketball tournament on the campus of the University of Texas. Their first game is at 10:10 a.m. today with last year's class B state champions from Snook. The Longhorns are planning on making a weekend of the outing, since the finals will not be played until Saturday.

This basketball club is the first in the history of Bronte High School to take a regional championship and advance to the state playoffs. They attained this honor when they participated in the Region VI tournament last weekend at Big Spring, and defeated, successively, Westbrook, Anthony and Sands. (See story in this issue.)

The Longhorns, along with Coaches James Raughton and Cecil Tolver and Supt. C. B. Barbee, left Bronte Wednesday at 7:30 a.m. They planned to arrive in Austin in plenty of time to take advantage of a workout time in Gregory Gymnasium on the university campus. Boys making the trip were Tad Richards, Royce Lee, Larry Corley, seniors; Wayne Carlton and Gary Don Allen, juniors; Doug

McCutchen, Davis Corley, Charles Masterson, David Glenn, Robert Gallaway and manager Don Hageman, all sophomores.

The Bronte roster, for the most part is made up of boys who got a late start on their basketball this year, since they played football until almost the middle of December. They had two post-season games, after most schools had completed their 1965 season. One was with Chillicothe, which the Longhorns won to take the bi-district championship, and the other was the game with Groom for the regional championship, which the Longhorns lost. The Bronte boys will be the only Class B team in state competition from a school which plays football.

With the late start, the basketballers lost a few tilts at the beginning of the season, but by the time they got into district play, they had developed into a pretty solid outfit. They lost only one district game, and won four in regional competition. The season record may be found on page two in a double page congratulations ad paid for by boosters of the Longhorns.

Snook A Tough One

The Longhorns first competition is Snook, last year's Class B state champion. The East Texas team has a 49-0 record for this season and has won 76 games in a row. Calvin Gerke seems to be the big gun on the Snook team. He's a 6'5" basket hitter with a 60 percent hitting average. The other lads on the Bluejay team are under 6 feet tall, however, and Bronte will have a little overall advantage on height.

Starting for the Longhorns will be Royce Lee, Larry Corley, Tad Richards, Davis Corley and Doug McCutchen. Snook starters include Gerke, Milton Skrabnek, Larry Kovar, Ervin See and Tommy Junek. Coach Raughton said the Long-

Prolong Life of Washable Garments
 Need longer life for your washable garments? The following tips on how to wash and dry garments can do much for your garments.

Sort garments as to color, type of fabric, and the way in which they are made.

Don't overload your washing machine.

Don't damage or weaken fabric by excessive twisting or wringing.

Use the type of washing product suitable to the garments being washed, and use the amount recommended on the package.

Avoid adding bleach directly on the garments. Always dilute the bleach water according to the directions on the container.

Place small, lightweight items in mesh bags to keep them from being twisted or damaged during washing.

Use the correct water temperature for the type of fabric you are washing, and select the correct length of time for the washing cycle.

Allow the clothes to be thoroughly rinsed.

Don't overload the dryer.

Select the correct drying time and temperature for the fabrics you are drying.

Find Reasons for Unhappy Child

As a parent, you realize that childhood is not a time of unbroken happiness. Children will be miserable at times. They will cry,

whine, and pout with good reason. When your child is always unhappy, it is time to be concerned. The "reasons" may seem small by your adult standards. However, these causes can undermine the youth's feelings of adequacy. You need to take some steps to determine the causes of a child's unhappiness.

First, you might search for possible physical causes. Does the child have enough rest? Does he have an infection of any kind?

Then you will want to listen and watch when he plays with others. Are other children making him feel inadequate by the things they say and do? Is a particularly uncomplimentary nickname reserved for him?

Check to see his standing in the games and sports he plays. The rating a child has with his peers is especially important in the school years. If he is never welcomed on the team, he can be lonely and miserable. Perhaps all he needs is a few practice sessions to develop some skill. Then he will be accepted and feel equal to the demands of life.

Talk to his teachers. Often they can recognize causes of unhappiness which you may not be able to locate. Your family doctor should be consulted also, if you are not able to pinpoint his problem, and help him improve the situation.

Robert Lee, Silver Vote Consolidation

(From Robert Lee Observer)

The consolidation election held last Saturday at Robert Lee and Silver carried, declared County Judge W. W. Thetford this week after the commissioners court canvassed the votes. Robert Lee went for the merger of the two schools by better than 100-1, while the proposition barely squeaked through at the Silver polling place.

Two sets of ballot boxes were set up in both voting places, one for voters who had paid a poll tax and one set for those who had not. Votes on the proposition were kept separate and tally sheets showed the following counts:

At Silver

	For	Against

No Poll Tax	12	11

At Robert Lee

	For	Against
Poll Tax	311	3
No Poll Tax	2	0

These figures indicate that the proposition carried either way the votes are tabulated. At Silver, it carried by three votes, 65-62, among the poll tax holders; if the no-poll-tax voters are counted, it carried by two votes, 74-72. At Robert Lee, the poll tax holders gave it a majority of 311-3, while, if the other votes are counted, it will have carried, 313-3.

The tabulation released by election judges Saturday night following closing of the polls came out the same as the count by commissioners Monday.

Three Longhorns broke the 20 mark in this game, with Lee getting 23, Richards 21 and Carlton 20. L. Corley tossed in 10 more, while McCutchen, D. Corley and David Glenn all made 3. Gary Don Allen added 2 and Robert Galloway's 1 moved the total to 86.

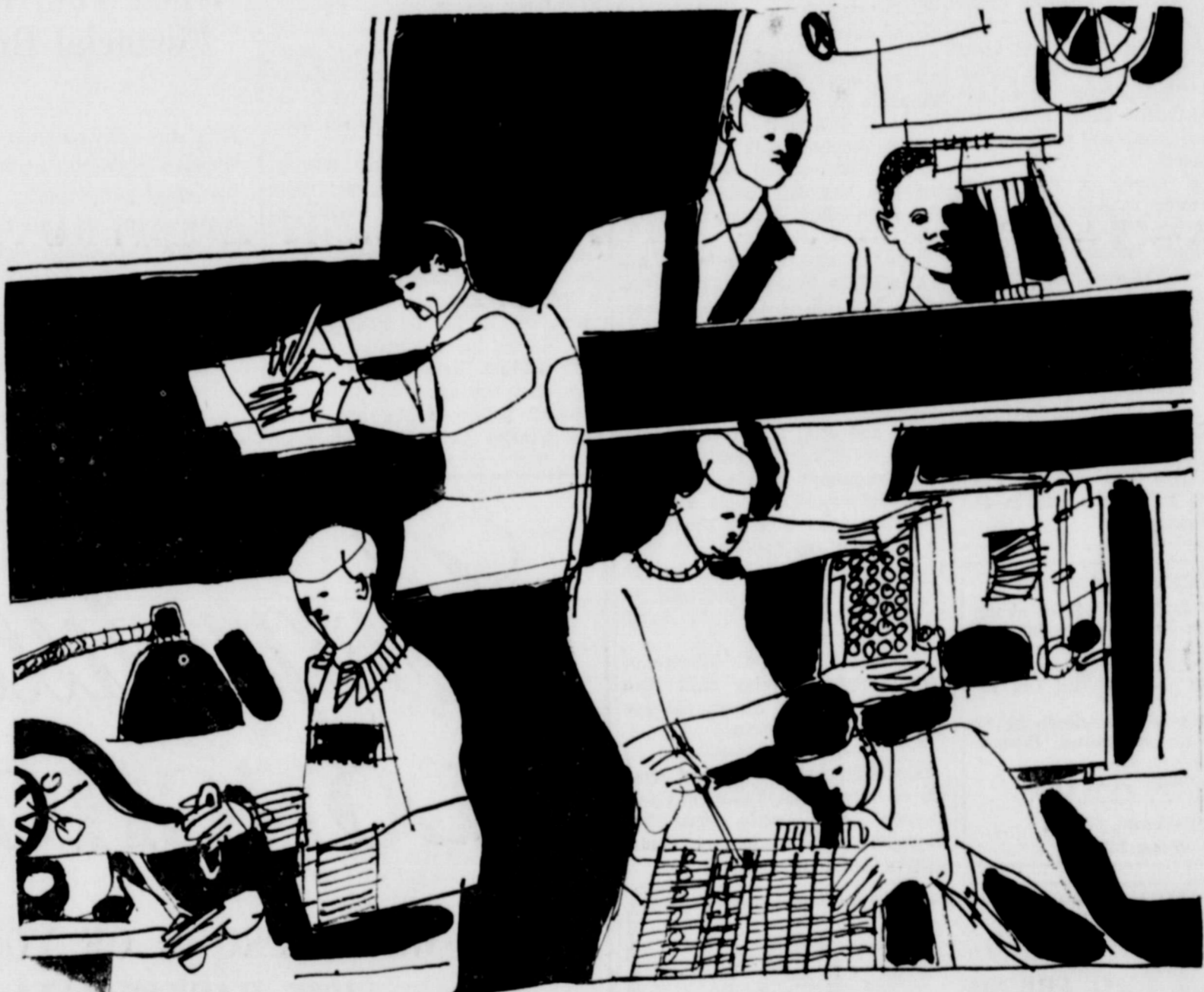
