Farm Safety Week Set For July 24-30

County Judge W. W. Thetford has officially proclaimed July 24-30, 1966 as Farm Safety Week in Coke County, according to Ben A. Boykin,

president of the county Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is coordinating activities for the special farm safety campaign.

President Johnson and Governor Connally have previously designated that week on national and state levels as a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce disabling injuries and death.

The county farm leader said that the accidental death rate for farm residents has increased since 1961. "Your efforts are vital if this trend is to be reversed, and needless suffering and losses substantially reduced," Boykin continued. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in America today.

In his official proclamation, County Judge Thetford said: "All the citizens of Coke County are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities.

Bargain Special On Enterprise Going Strong

The Enterprise's annual subscription sale has moved into full swing the past week. The front desk girl has been busy keeping up with the subscriptions which have come in.

However, quite a few persons who usually take advantage of the 50 cents saving on a yearly subscription have not yet been by the office.

The bargain rate will remain in effect through July 30, which means that only about 10 days are left.

During the bargain period, all subscriptions are reduced 50 cents, making orders for papers in Coke and adjoining counties cost \$2.50, while those anywhere else in the

country are reduced from \$3.50 to the special price of \$3.00.

Orders for subscriptions may be brought by the office in Bronte or mailed to P. O. Drawer O. Persons living in outlying communities may subscribe through their local representative. Publisher Ben Oglesby urged everyone to take advantage of the special price. He said, "I would like to see everyone get The Enterprise for at least a year at this price. Another recent hike in the price of newsprint and other rising costs may force us to increase the regular price of the paper, but everyone who is paid up will not be required to pay the increase until his subscription expires."

The Enterprise July subscription special was begun in 1948 and has proved more popular each year, during the 18 years it has been run.

New Lions Club Charter Banquet Set for Tuesday

Bronte's new Night Lions Club will have a Charter Night Banquet Tuesday, July 26, at 7:30 p.m. The affair will be held in the school lunchroom with a program to follow in the auditorium.

A large delegation of visiting Lions from a wide area of West Texas is expected to swell the attendance to more than 150 persons, according to Royce Fancher, president of the new club.

Past District Governor George Thomason of Sweetwater will present the charter to the president, and Past District Governor Carl Hyde of Midland will be the principal speaker of the evening.

Wayne Dunnam is chairman in charge of the entire Charter Night program.

Cecil Cox, Church of Christ minister, will give the invocation, and the Rev. Austin Masterson, will pronounce the benediction. Misses Janet Lee and Bennie Carol Oglesby will sing.

The new Lions Club was organized late in May and meets twice each month, on first and third Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. at Coalson's Red Barn Cafe. Coalson will cater the charter night banquet.

New Lake Talked At Meeting Thurs.

The possibilities of building a lake between Bronte and the Colorado River were discussed at a meeting last Thursday night in the city hall. Present were city officials, officers and directors of the Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District, and officials of the Farmers Home Administration.

FHA officials expressed their willingness to assist in any way possible to secure financing for the project.

City and WCID officials agreed that they would wait until FHA has time to work out the best manner of approach in securing government help, and then proceed to determine the feasibility of locating a dam in the area.

At present they are waiting on FHA's report.

A number of interested citizens were also present for the meeting.

Leading the discussion were Mayor Royce Lee and WCID Chairman D. K. Glenn.

"As a member of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, we want you to have a first hand preview of our program of work," he said. The program is entitled "Growth Potential for West Texas."

Mayor Lee presented the program Tuesday to members of the Robert Lee Board of Community Development.

Glenn Sims In Germany, Writes Letters About Country, People

As reflected by letters home, Tommy Glenn Sims is having an interesting and educational summer as he works in Germany. He is with a group of Baylor students who are working during their three months vacation from studies.

Four boys from Baylor, including Sims, are living in Aschau, Kraiburg, and are the only Americans there. He says their rent is \$12.50 per month, with breakfast included and "you can't beat that." The town is 50 miles from Austria, 40 miles east of Munich and 150 miles from Switzerland.

They are working at a Nitro chemical plant located in the Bavarian forest. The plant started production in 1939 under the Hitler leadership and was located in the forest so it could not be seen from

the air. The complex is made up of several plants which produce cellulose.

Sims is paid 3 marks and 15 pfennig an hour which is equivalent to 80c per hour in American money. They have a 42½ hour work week. He says the pay is adequate for their expenses. There are 800 people employed at the plant and work clothes are furnished.

Sims says the people in Germany are very friendly and that the scenery is beautiful. There are lots of small cars, no large ones, and a common sight is to see men and women of all ages, many over 65, riding bikes. He says there is a population boom and baby carriages are to be seen everywhere. He and the many other students there find themselves hampered by the

language barrier. Students from all over the world are working in Germany this summer.

The students take advantage of their spare time to tour points of interest. Sims' group visited a tennis match in Erding, N.E. of Munich, and saw the one time tennis champion of West Germany play. A Dr. Pechl, the scientist at McGregor near Waco, who secured their jobs for them, took them to the tennis matches and also to a festival in Munich. During the festival there is a reunion of the Czechoslovakian people who were taken over during World War II. Once each year they are allowed to come to Germany for this and there are a great many family reunions etc during the time they

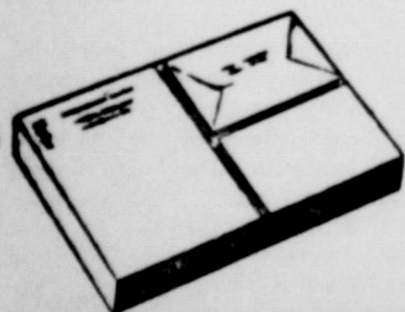

WHEREAS farm and ranch accidents reap a grim harvest of approximately 150 fatalities and thousands more suffer painful disabling injuries each year in Texas, plus the great economic loss, causes profound physical and psychological damage suffered by members of farm families that are in-

voiced; and
WHEREAS the President of the United States and the Governor of Texas have proclaimed the week of July 24-30, 1966, as FARM SAFETY WEEK;

Whereas during this special week, a statewide farm accident prevention education program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Safety Association, 4-H Clubs, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of

Texas and the Coke County Farm Bureau with the theme "Safety Is Victory Over Accidents;" and

WHEREAS such a campaign can do much to call to the attention of our rural citizens the need for observing safety practices which would reduce the tragic toll inflicted by accidents:

NOW, THEREFORE, I W. W. Thetford, County Judge of Coke County, do hereby designate the week of July 24-30, 1966, as FARM SAFETY WEEK in Coke County and urge all farm and ranch families to become more safety conscious and help reduce deaths and injuries caused by accidents.

Sunset to Run Bus Aug. 7 to Houston

County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

Next week is National Farm Safety Week. This would be a good time for everyone concerned with agriculture to become more safety conscious.

Agriculture leads the nation in total work deaths. More than 8,000 farm family members die in home, highway and farm work mishaps each year. Nearly 750,000 farm connected people suffer disabling injuries each year.

Only two industries, mining and construction, exceed farming in the number of work deaths. The total number of deaths among farm families is 64.1 per 100,000 people.

The above facts make farm safety a necessary consideration. As has been often said, most accidents do not just happen, they are caused.

The number of screwworm cases Texas sustained jumped during the last reporting week. A total of 26 cases were reported. Of equal concern is the fact that the 26 cases came from 14 different counties. The spread in area from which the cases came is pretty broad. Fortunately, most of the mases are still confined to the lower portion of the State. The case closest to us, being reported, came from Bander County.

Even though our area is dry, we still need to be alert for possible cases.

We would again like to mention that refunds of Federal gasoline taxes will not be made as in the past. Any tax claims you may have since July 1, 1965, you must claim as credit when you file your next income tax return.

The Texas Department of Agriculture now has available for general distribution the weekly "Texas Livestock Market News." If anyone would like their name placed on the mailing list they should write Texas Department of Agriculture, John Reagan Building, Drawer BB, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711. Or if you prefer, let us know and we will send in your name. The publication gives you a pretty concise picture of the market situation for the previous week plus other information.
