## Bronte, Bangs Tangle Friday

### Cumbies Plan Trip To Europe

Waco — (Spl) — Mr. and Mrs. Edward Cumbie plan to be in the group for the Texas Farm Bureau Market Builder Tour of Europe Sept. 15-29. Eighty-five Texas farmers, ranchers and their wives are scheduled to make the trip through seven countries. This group is more than doubled in size as compared to the number making the first Farm Bureau tour in the spring of 1965, according to Walter Meyer of Waco, Farm Bureau director of trade development.

Meyer said Texans making the tour have both general and immediate cash interests in locating and expanding export markets for Texas beef and vegetable commodities. The group will represent every major agricultural area in the state and most of the major products grown and produced on Texas farms and ranches. Particular interest will be directed toward markets for beef, cotton and grain.

To locate the marketing areas to eventually import and move Texas agricultural commodities, the tour members will visit with farm groups and visit farming operations in England, Holland, Belgium, Luxembourg, Germany, Switzerland and France. A close look will be given to three of the world's most famous markets — Smithfield meat market and Covent Garden produce market in London, and the Grossmarkt in Frankfurt, Germany. Emphasis will also be placed upon European regulations pertaining to the importation of foreign products.

Tour members will learn of European commerce, government and agriculture through visits to the Farm Bureau Trade Development Corporation in Rotterdam, the European common market in Brussels and United States embassies. Highlight of the tour is expected to occur in Wiesbaden, Germany where a market development program will be held featuring top marketing people. The day will wind up with a Texas style cookout at a Rhine River castle.

Farm Bureau's first Market Builder tour led to the development of an export market in West Germany for fresh, chilled Texas beef. A market was found and a series of successful shipments paved the way for a more extensive and ag-

gressive program. Planning for export programs for Texas vegetable and citrus commodities also resulted from that first tour.

Meyer termed the trip a "working tour" first and a "sight seeing tour" second. There will be plenty of time available for a look at some of Europe's greatest tourist attractions. Included are guided tours of all major cities visited as well as scenic trips through rural areas. In London, Paris, Brussels and other cities there will be opportunities to shop and view main points of historical and cultural interest.

The entire group will depart from Dallas aboard a Pan American World Airways jet on Thursday afternoon, Sept. 15, fly to Chicago, then to London. The tour will conclude in Paris and the Texans will return to the United States Sept. 29.

Tickets will be issued for the home games during regular season when seats are reserved. They will be good for the five games during the regular season, but not for post-season games, should any be played at Stephenson Field.

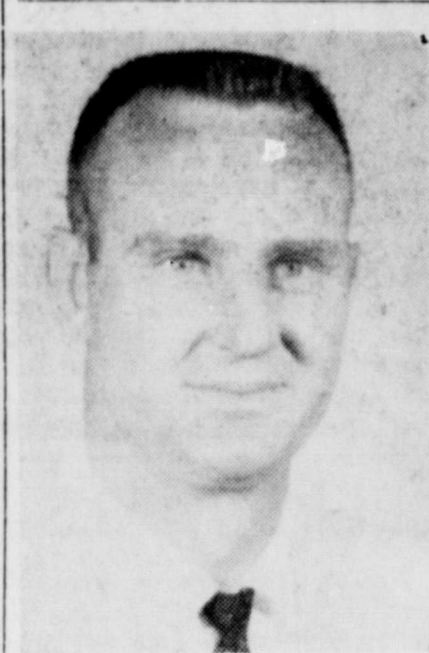
Reservations may be made at the superintendent's office or at the gate Friday night.

**Fabric Care Tips**

With many new fabrics on the market housewives often are confused about how to care for them.

Here are some answers to commonly-asked questions about shirt materials:

1. Should the new Durable Press sport shirts be drip-dried? They don't have to be. Let them go through the whole wash-rinse-spin cycle and put them on hangers to dry. Though they won't look as good as when dryer-dried, hanging on many fabrics gives about as good results as drip-drying. And you won't have to stop the washer before the final spin to remove the shirt.

2. Are madras shirts machine washable? Usually madras shirts can be machine-laundered, but be sure to wash them separately. Genuine madras will bleed — they're supposed to. Some fabrics, however, are woven to look like real madras, but are dyed with colorfast dyes that will go through machine-laundering with no color change. You will usually find an assurance of colorfastness on hangtags accompanying these shirts.

3. Is there any way to freshen

dingy-looking shirts? Sometimes putting shirts through a hot-water, full-cycle wash will do the trick even though your normal washing procedure calls for a gentler approach. But wash whites only with whites. Some fibers, especially nylon, pick up color from garments that normally don't bleed. Yellowed or grayed shirts can often be whitened with a bleach or with a color remover.

4. How can you remove wrinkles from tricot fabrics? High temperatures (above 160 degrees F.) in either washer or dryer are what really sets wrinkles into polyester or nylon tricot fabrics. When you machine-laundered such fabrics, use a short wash cycle on warm water setting, and dry at lowest temperature setting on the dryer.

**Better Breakfast Month**

Did you eat breakfast this morning?

About half the people in this country rush off to work, school or play with an inadequate breakfast, according to a recent survey.

Breakfast is the most "sustaining" meal of the day, for you have had nothing to eat since going to sleep and you need food to sustain your energy at its best working level during the morning.

When you skip breakfast, you are working on less than the required nutrients, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Breakfast is our most neglected meal. You may spend hours planning for a sparkling lunch or a delicious dinner, but how much time do you spend planning for a good breakfast?

Studies show that children are more likely to do well at school and at play when they start the day with a good breakfast. For instance, lassitude and slow learning in the classroom, as well as tremors and slow decision making, are associated with low blood sugar levels — which could be due to an inadequate breakfast.

Since September is National Better Breakfast Month — as well as Back-to-School Month—set this goal for your daily breakfast — to provide a fourth to a third of the day's calories and protein for each member of your family, child or adult.

For those who insist on skipping the first meal of the day, try something different — such as a milk shake, some fruit, a cantaloupe wedge — even a hamburger for the teenage set.

A good breakfast menu includes some fruit or juice, egg, ham or other meat, cereal, toast or rolls, butter or fortified margarine and milk.

Dieters too, had better think twice before skipping breakfast. An adequate breakfast actually can be an aid to weight control, since it discourages between-meal snacks as well as overeating at other meals.

USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service suggest the September plentiful foods list shopping for your "better breakfast." It includes such tasty breakfast items as grapes, pears and peanut butter.

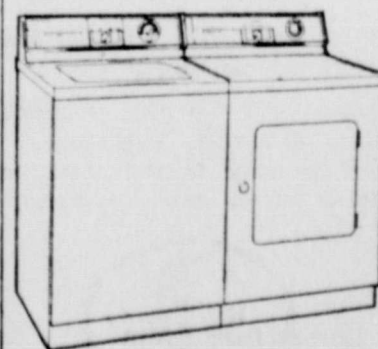
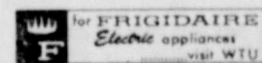

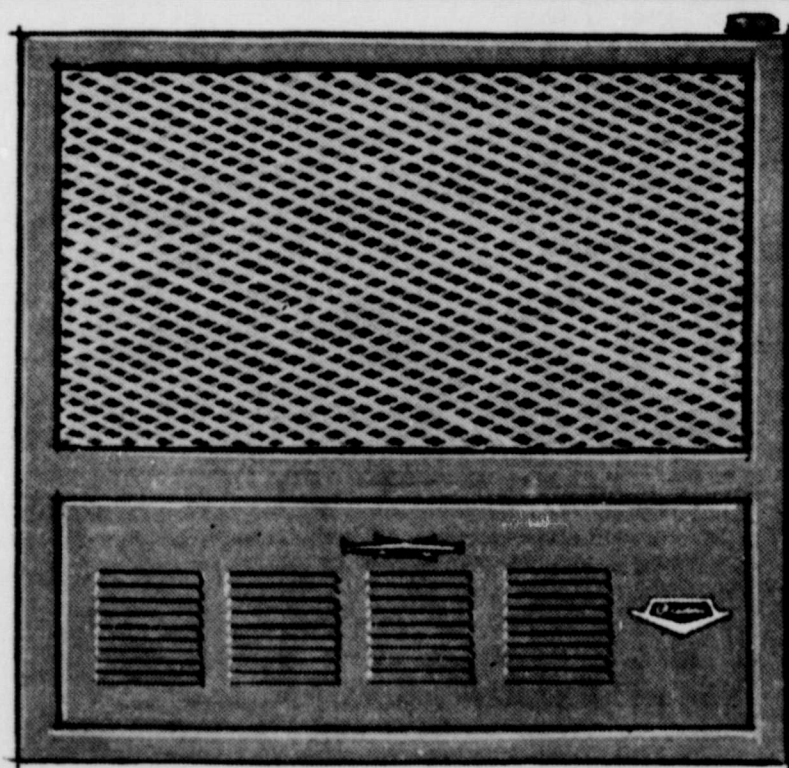

Directors of the hospital district and hospital personnel have set up the open house in order for everyone to inspect the new building and facilities which have recently been completed.

Also, in connection with the open house and reception, five new vocational nurses will be honored. They have recently completed their course of instruction and are now ready to take their state examining examination which will license them to practice their profession. Another story in this week's Observer tells of their graduation exercises.

Mrs. Truman Hines, administrator of the hospital, said that everyone is invited to attend the open house, and take a tour of the new building and inspect the new equipment.

Only the new part of the structure is now being used for a hospital. The old structure, which was built in 1950 as a county hospital, has been renovated and remodeled and turned into a nursing home.

#### BDK Was Contractor

BDK Construction Co. of San Angelo was the prime contractor for construction of the new hospital. The firm won the contract after submitting a bid of \$214,370. Bids were opened April 27, 1965. Chakos and Zentner of San Angelo were architects.

The project was financed with a \$110,000 bond issue voted in April 1964 and a federal grant of \$117,000.

Included the construction job were 20 patient rooms, operating room, emergency room, doctors and nurses lounges, administrative offices, nursery, labor room, visitors lobby, laboratory facilities and central supply.

In addition to these new facilities the contract called for complete remodeling and renovating the old part of the hospital, including new equipment for the kitchen and dining room.
