Vega Downs Longhorns, 27-22 In Regional Finals

Bronte Longhorns wound up their 1966 football season last Friday night at Brownfield when they lost the regional championship contest to the Vega Longhorns by a score of 27-22.

The contest, played in Brownfield's Cub Stadium in temperatures around the freezing mark or below, looked like a Bronte victory all the way until early in the fourth quarter when the Vega bunch made 13 points in a 50-second span, to go into a lead which the Bronte lads were unable to overtake.

The score was an even 7-7 at the end of the first quarter, then the Longhorns went ahead 22-14 at the half, no scores were made in the third period, then the Vega lads scored twice in the fourth period to make the score 27-22.

The Vega team had a solid wall of defense and kept the Bronte team from making too much gain through the middle. This, plus Ronnie Pingel's and Johnny Halliburton's offensive tactics proved too much for the Longhorns of Bronte.

First Half

Lee Cranmer kicked off to get the ball game underway. It went to Charles Masterson who was downed on the 33. Failing to make their needed 10 the Bronte boys called for a punt by Davis Corley on 4th down. It was good for 49 yards and stopped on the Vega 25. The boys from up north could not make their first either and had to punt on 4th down. The ball went to Doug McCutchen and he followed his blockers, ran over a few, and got loose for the first counter of the ball game. McCutchen then kicked an EP, to make the scoreboard read 7-0.

The kickoff went to Pingel, who was pulled in on the 31 by Wayne Carlton. Perry Kirkland made 3 yards, and a pass interference call against Bronte moved the ball to the 42 for a 1st. An incomplete pass and two carries netting 5 yards brought up 4th and 5. The punt went to Masterson on a fair at the 19. Masterson went for 3, Glenn kept for 2, then on another

keeper added 6 for a 1st on the 30. Glenn and Masterson lacked only a couple of feet making a 1st in three carries, but the Bronte lads decided to punt. Corley was pretty well hemmed up when he booted the ball and it went high and short coming down on the Vega 41.

Brown and Pingel made 3 yards on two tries, then Quarterback John Halliburton did a neat job of hiding the ball and waltzed through the Bronte defenders before he was discovered and went for a touchdown. Cranmer kicked the EP to make the score 7-7.

The kickoff went to Randy Barber and he was downed on his 34. McCutchen made 4 yards to end the quarter. The next play of the contest saw Vega recover a Bronte fumble on Bronte's 37. The Vega Longhorns were able to make only 7 yards in 4 downs and the ball went over on the 30.

After picking up 5 yards in three tries, a punt was necessary, and Corley kicked out on the 19. It was called back, however, and

Bronte was penalized 5 yards. The next kick went to the Vega 8 yard line where Pingel took it and dashed all the way back to the Bronte 39 yard line. Brown picked up 3, then a fumble was recovered on the 39 by Wayne Carlton.

An incomplete pass was tossed, then McCutchen went for 5. The next play was a big gainer, with Glenn throwing a pass to McCutchen, who went to the Vega 17 for a 1st down. The third play of the news series of downs was another pass to McCutchen who went around the left side of the Vega line for another Bronte touchdown. Some good blocking by the Bronte boys made it possible for McCutchen to go in standing up. He then went around the left side for 2 extras. Score 15-7.

The kickoff went to Donnie Allred and he went down on the 34. After losing a yard on the 1st down, Halliburton kept the ball on another of his well concealed plays and went for a Vega TD. Cranmer's kick was good, and the score was

16-14.

McCutchen took the kickoff and made a nice return to his 40. A 3rd down pass to Corley was good for a 1st on the Vega 22. The next series of downs saw Pingel intercept a Bronte pass, and after one carry on the ground the Vega Longhorns tried a pass, which was intercepted by Wayne Carlton, Bronte lineman, who went for his first touchdown of the season. McCutchen's kick for extra point went between the uprights, and the score was 22-14. Little time remained until the half, and, after taking McCutchen's kickoff, the Vega lads had a 4th and 2 on their own 33 when time ran out.

Second Half

McCutchen kicked off to start the second half. It went deep to Kirkland who was downed on the 23. The Vega team had to punt to Bronte after three downs. The local Horns took over on their 45, and were off to what looked like good prospects for another TD. Master-

We will be working day and night to make it. Equipment is coming in by boat."

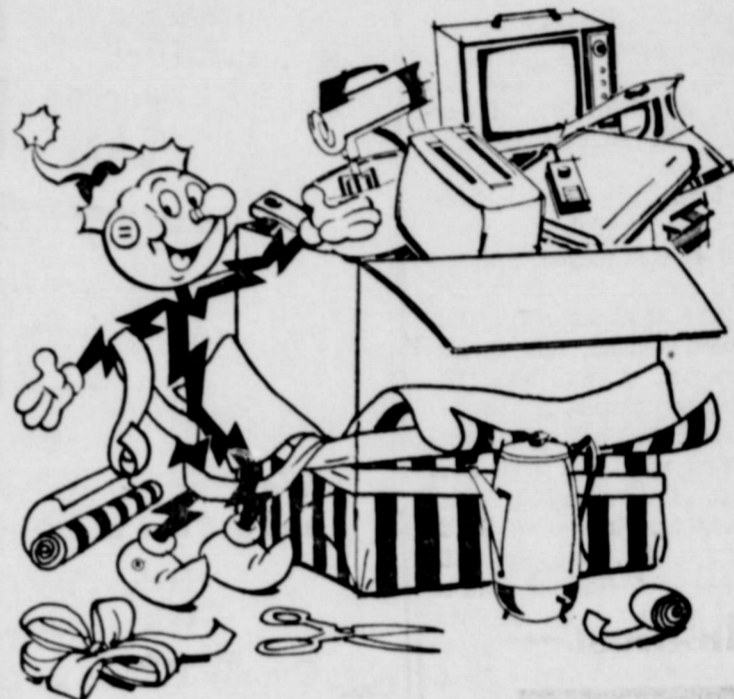

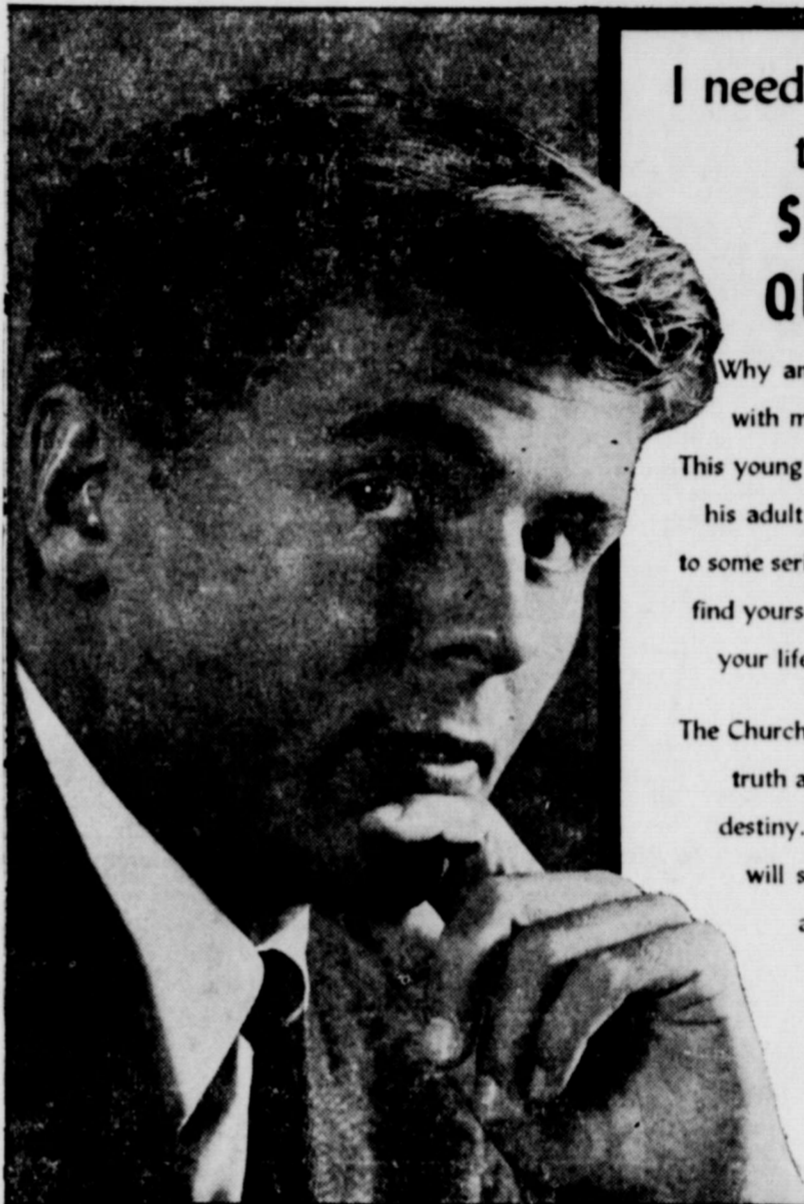

sn, Glenn and McCutchen made 14 yards and a 1st on the 41. Then McCutchen carried twice for almost 10, to the 31. Masterson went for 5 more yards for a 1st one the 26: But that was it. Vega recovered a fumble on the next play and took over. The Panhandle boys made one 1st down but failed to negotiate the next one and punted. It was a beauty and gave Bronte the ball on their 11. McCutchen made 2, Victor Brock added 7; then McCutchen went 3 more yards for a 1st on the 23. Faced with a 4th and 13 on the next series of downs, Corley punted to the Vega 43.

The Vega boys were in scoring position, with only 57 yards between them and the double stripe. They negotiated the distance in ten plays, with the big one a pass from Haliburton to David Wheeler down to the 2 yard line. Pingel went over the middle in a dive for the counter. Corley and Keith Morris tackled Haliburton short of the goal line on the PAT.

Cranmer kicked off to Barbee who was tackled on the 33. The 3rd down of the series was the backbreaker for Bronte, as Pingel intercepted a pass with a clear field between him and the Bronte goal line. Cranmer kicked the extras and the score stood 27-22 in favor of Vega.

McCutchen made a fine return of the kickoff and was downed on the 50. With a 15 yard penalty tacked on to the return, it looked good for Bronte as they had a 1st and 10 on the Vega 35.

The optimism was short lived, however, and Kirkland intercepted a 4th down pass on his own 10. On the 3rd down of the series, it looked as though Haliburton was off to another touchdown, but McCutchen caught him close to the Bronte 20 yard line and pulled him down. The long run was for nothing however, as a flag was thrown back at the line of scrimmage, and Vega was penalized 5 for offsides. Vega had to punt, and it went to Glenn who was downed on the 38.
