The attempt to recover apparent drowning victim Edward C. Mann, 37, of Abilene from the chilled waters of Oak Creek Lake continued Wednesday at press time. A helicopter from Dyess AFB, Abilene, had joined the search Wednesday morning.

Mann, a field representative of the Abilene Reporter-News, shot a duck and was retrieving it Monday evening when wind capsized his kayak on the lake about 5:30 p.m.

Night rescue operations were hampered by wind-whipped whitecaps on the lake and the search was called off at 9:30 p.m. and resumed at dawn Tuesday. The kayak was recovered at the lake Monday night. Williams Funeral Home of Bronte, the San Angelo Emergency Corps, Abilene Emergency Service and volunteers and lawmen from a wide area joined in the search. Depth of the water where Mann was missing was estimated at 12-13 feet.

The father of three sons, Steve, Brad and Tim, and choir director at First Christian Church in Abilene, Mann was a graduate of Central Missouri State College, Warrensburg, Mo. He was a veteran of the Air Force and was stationed at Goodfellow AFB for some time. He joined the Reporter-News in 1961. Mrs. Mann is the former Fern Stanford of San Angelo.

## Ensign Boecking To Serve Aboard Cruiser St. Paul

Ensign Charles Thomas Boecking left Bronte last weekend enroute to his assignment aboard the USS St. Paul, a heavy cruiser with the U. S. Navy Pacific Fleet.

Ensign Boecking was graduated recently from a 16 weeks course at the Officers Candidate School in Newport, R. I. During the four-month indoctrination course, he was paced through a curriculum of physical conditioning, shipboard organization, military customs and courtesies, and many aspects of at-sea navigation.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Boecking of Bronte, the new Navy officer is a graduate of the Bronte High School and Texas Technological College at Lubbock.

Mrs. Boecking told The Enterprise this week that a telephone call from their son indicated that the USS St. Paul will put out to sea Friday. The cruiser is a flagship and will take part in a fleet exercise.

She said the St. Paul is 670 feet long and has a complement of 1700 enlisted men and 71 commissioned officers.

## Coke Livestock Show Will Be Held Monday

The 1967 Coke County Livestock Show will be held at the show barn in Robert Lee next Monday, Jan. 9, with more than 70 4-H and FFA members competing for the honors and prizes. Twenty-eight classes of sheep, cattle and swine will be shown with 200 ribbons, banners and trophies going to the winners. Also at stake are the prize monies and the places in the auction sale that follows the showings.

About 210 head of selected livestock will be exhibited. The stock will be in place at the show barn Sunday afternoon in preparation for the show on Monday. Louis Bridges, vocational agriculture teacher at Eden, will be present Sunday afternoon to sift and classify the lamb entries.

Judges for this years show are Frank Brownfield and Duery Men-

zies. Brownfield, vocational agriculture teacher at Blackwell, will judge all swine classes, while Menzies, county agent of Concho County, will judge the sheep and cattle classes.

The show will start Monday morning at 8:30 a.m. with the placing of the breeding swine classes. The judging will proceed through the day as follows: Market swine classes, 9 a.m.; lamb classes, 10 a.m.; breeding sheep classes, 1 p.m.; cattle classes, 2 p.m.; the auction sale at 3 p.m.

The public is invited to attend the show and view the animals being exhibited. The County Home Demonstration Clubs will have refreshments and will be serving lunches at the County Recreation building near the stock show barns.

## All Aliens Must Report in January

District Director J. W. Holland of the Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that the annual alien address report program usually causes a sharp rise in the number of applications for naturalization.

The law requires all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, to report their addresses each January. Throughout the United States almost thirty percent more applications are received during the months of January, February and March than are received during other months. Holland attributes this sudden rise to the Alien Address Report Program.

Aliens not required to make this report are diplomats and those per-

sons accredited to certain international organizations.

Forms for making the reports will be available to aliens at all Post Offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January. Holland indicated that aliens desiring information concerning naturalization or similar matters should obtain the Offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service where personnel trained in these fields will be available to answer inquiries.



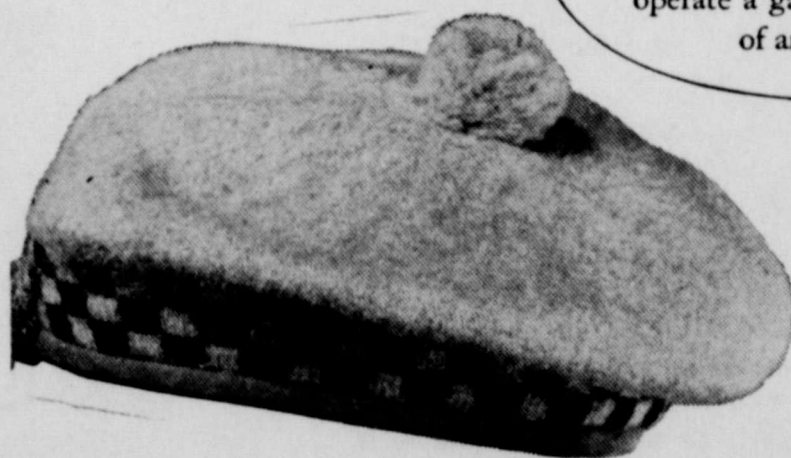
