### January Time for Voter Registration

January is the month to get taxes paid, if property owners want to avoid penalties. It is also the month to obtain voter registration certificates, according to County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs.

State and county, as well as city and school taxes all become delinquent Feb. 1 and redemption of such property causes extra expense, Jacobs said.

He urged that everyone who is eligible to vote in 1967 to secure a registration certificate during this month. This requirement applies to everyone between 21 and 60 years of age.

Prospective voters must either go by Jacobs' office and get their certificates, or write in for applications, which must be filled out, signed and returned to the office.

Jacobs emphasized that any young people who will become 21 during 1967 must secure their certificates during January. He added that a certificate cannot be sent for, except that a person can secure one for a husband or wife or for a child who will become 21 during this year.

### New Clothing Development

The changing whims of feminine fashion, which periodically drive men to distraction and ladies to the stores, are dramatically illustrated by the current trend to a higher hemline.

The major problem revealed by the elevated hemlines is the dark band at the top of ladies' hose. This band is about six inches long and provides a strong support to fasten undergarments to hosiery.

It was never meant to be seen or displayed. Yet, to the consternation of many, short skirts are disclosing this band in wider and wider expanses. Distressed by this increasing exposure, hosiery manufacturers are now offering short-skirted ladies four possible solutions to their problem:





## Farmers Home Administration Loan Policy Liberalized by Agriculture Dept.

Alton R. Pyburn, County Supervisor, Farmers Home Administration, located at the Courthouse in Robert Lee, recently received the following information concerning Economic Opportunity Loans.

An amendment to Title III of the Economic Opportunity Act signed Nov. 8 by President Johnson will provide additional and much needed resources for hard-pressed, low-income rural people desiring to improve their farm income or start small businesses.

"This important Economic Opportunity Act amendment from \$2,500 to \$3,500 the maximum war-on-poverty loans that the USDA Farmers Home Administration can make to individual farmers or other rural residents at the bottom of the economic ladder," Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman said. "This amendment also authorizes additional credit to borrowers so long as their total outstanding indebtedness for an economic opportunity loan does not exceed \$3,500."

Secretary Freeman explained that since this OEC rural loan program started in Jan., 1965, the Farmers Home Administration through June 30 extended credit totaling \$46 million to over 28,000 families throughout the United States, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

These Economic Opportunity borrowers are operating more than 350 different kinds of non-agricultural enterprises — in addition to farming — as a result of credit extended through this program. Loans average \$1700.

"In some cases the cost of obtaining land, buildings and equipment for small rural-based businesses has been a barrier to developing a reasonably sound loan under the previous \$2,500 limit," Sec. Freeman explained. "The authorization which permits the making of larger loans to borrowers will permit the acquisition and development of more adequate resources along with providing a more feasible base for accomplishment by the low-income rural family."

This amendment will also make it possible for some rural borrowers to expand their operation in cases where needed capital is not available from conventional credit sources.

County Supervisor Pyburn stated applications for this loan may be obtained at the local office on Thursday from 1 p.m. until 3:30 p.m. or by writing to the office at 207 East Broadway in Sweetwater.

## Cars Must Have Stickers By April 15

Austin — Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reminded Texas motorists today that most vehicles have not yet been inspected for their 1967 vehicle inspection sticker.

"The inspection period is two-thirds over and only about one-third of the vehicles have been inspected," said Garrison. "This means that during the 14 weeks remaining before the April 15 deadline for inspections, more than twice as many persons each week must have their car inspected to avoid long lines forming at the end of the period."

In urging motorists to have their vehicles inspected at an early date, Garrison pointed out that official inspection stations are easily identified by the standard sign displayed at or near the service entrance of the garage.

He advised that inspection stations are being urged to request permission to inspect any vehicle brought into the garage for repairs or regular service.

"In this way," Garrison pointed out, "time will be saved for the motorist as well as for the inspection station."

"And if you have not had your vehicle inspected, take it to one of the 5,500 authorized inspection stations for a 'check-up' and start the new year off right with a safe vehicle."
