Bids Requested On New Road

A notice to bidders is being published in the Robert Lee Observer calling for bids on 9.462 miles of paving for Farm Road 2662, which will connect U. S. Highway 277 and State Highway 208. The new road will run east and west through ranch land and connect with existing highways south of Robert Lee and Bronte.

Most of the construction will be in Precinct 4, with the west end of the road lying in Precinct 1. Right of way has been secured and fenced, and is ready for construction to begin.

Farm Road 2662 will leave U. S. Highway 277 six and one-half miles south of Bronte and connect with Highway 208 seven and one-half miles south of Robert Lee.

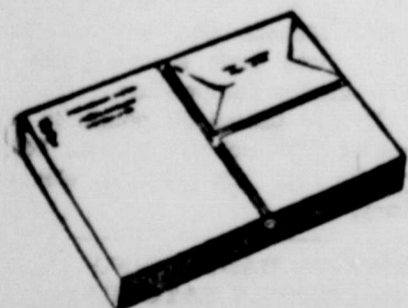

\$666 Savings Bonds Sold Here

G. C. Allen, Chairman of the Coke County Savings Bonds Committee announced today that February sales of United States Savings Bonds in Coke County totaled \$666. During the first two months of 1967 sales in Coke County totaled \$1,879 which is five per cent of the 1967 goal of \$40,000.

During the first two months of 1967 Savings Bond sales in Texas totaled \$29,451,247 which is 16 per cent of the state's goal of \$181.3 million and a 15.2 per cent increase over sales during the same period of 1966.

Nationally, the sale of Savings Bonds during February totaled \$426 million and were 23 per cent higher than a year ago, and the highest for any February in seven years. The January-February total was \$917 million, 12 per cent over sales for the first two months of 1966 and the highest January-February sales since 1963.

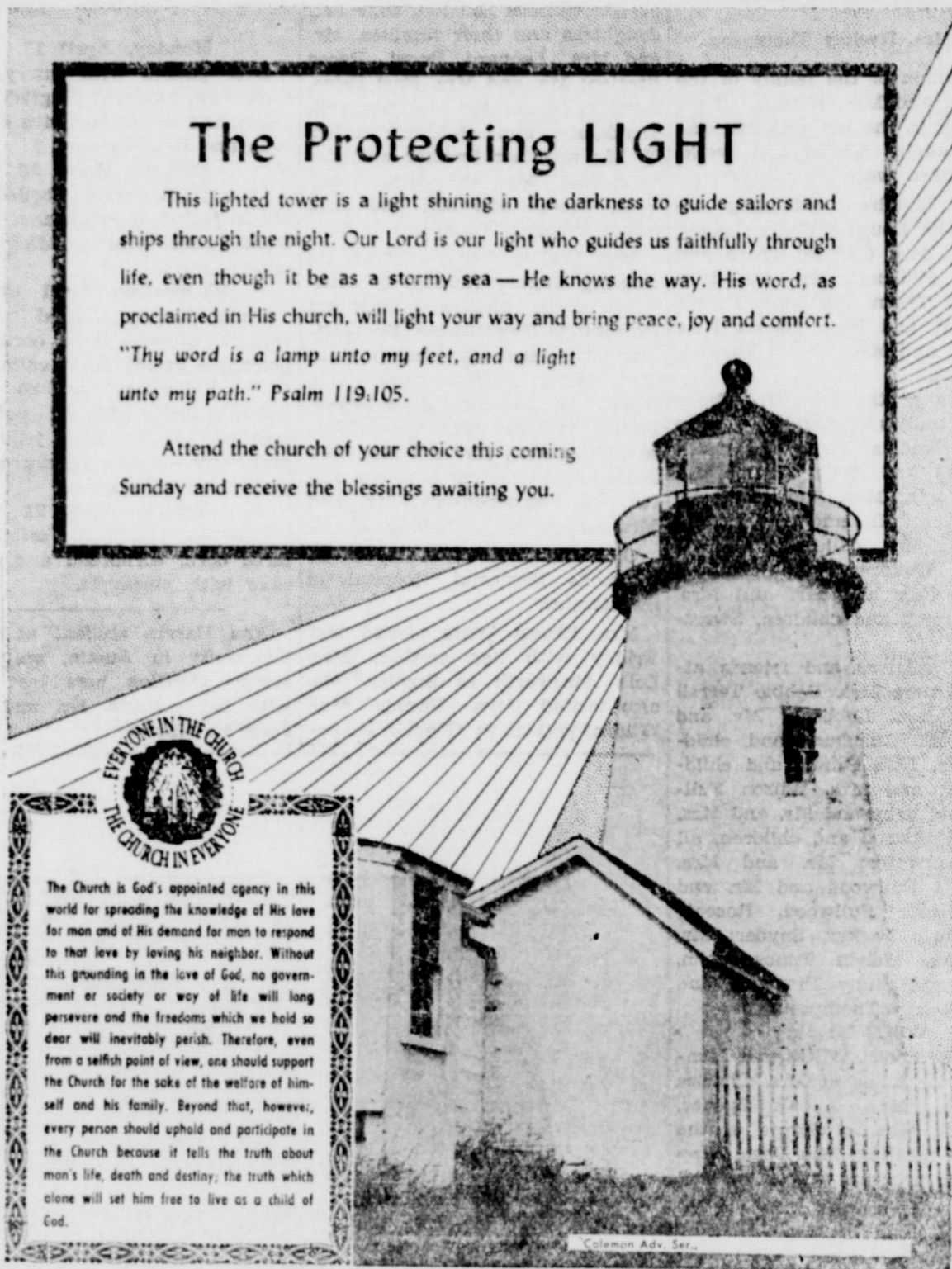

Flame Resistance Treatment

While doing your spring cleaning, why not take a little extra time to be extra safe?

You can make cotton fabrics temporarily flame retardant with two inexpensive, easy-to-obtain chemicals.

Because the chemicals are water soluble, the treatment doesn't last through washing, but it can still be practical to treat again, after washing, such articles as curtains, draperies, potholders, and upholstery padding.

Dissolve seven ounces of borax and three ounces of boric acid in two quarts of hot water. Thoroughly wet the cotton items to be treated and dry them by any convenient means. The items will be flame resistant (but not fire-proof, of course) until wet or washed.

Pruning Tips for Gardeners

Pruning makes the difference between an expert gardener and an amateur. Good pruning is essential to keep your property attractive and to keep ornamental plants healthy. However, you won't need to prune as much if you put plants in the best locations.

Early spring — before growth begins — is the best time to prune evergreens and late flowering shrubs. Early flowering plants, blooming in March, April, May and early June, should be pruned immediately after flowering. Avoid early fall pruning. It tends to produce late, immature growth, which is less tolerant to winter cold.

Prune or remove any dead, diseased, broken or injured branches at any season. And prune all plants when you are transplanting.

Ornamental plants can be pruned several different ways. Shearing or clipping the ends results in a symmetrical shape which is usually very different from the plant's natural shape. These geometric outlines are usually undesirable, and shearing often results in a bushy plant with a brown or bare interior due to shading. Hedge plants are an exception; they lend themselves to this type of pruning.

Most ornamental plants are pruned to keep their natural shape as much as possible. This means thinning, removing old branches at ground level, cutting back some branches, and removing dead, diseased, and broken wood. It's more difficult and time consuming than shearing, but it improves flowering, natural beauty and plant health.

Would you like a recipe for a different, delicious, easy to prepare biscuit? Here is the recipe you have been looking for. Your family will really appreciate you!

Sour Dough Biscuits

- 1 package yeast dissolved in 2 tablespoons warm water
- 4½ cups flour
- 2 tablespoons baking powder
- ½ teaspoon soda
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 2 cups lukewarm buttermilk
- ½ cup melted shortening or salad oil

Sift dry ingredients together in large mixing bowl. Add softened yeast and lukewarm buttermilk and melted shortening, mix well. After mixing thoroughly, put into air tight container, and refrigerate at least several hours or overnight before using.

Pinch off dough as needed. Do not work down. Bake in lightly greased pan about 12-15 minutes at 450 degrees.

This dough will keep one week or longer.

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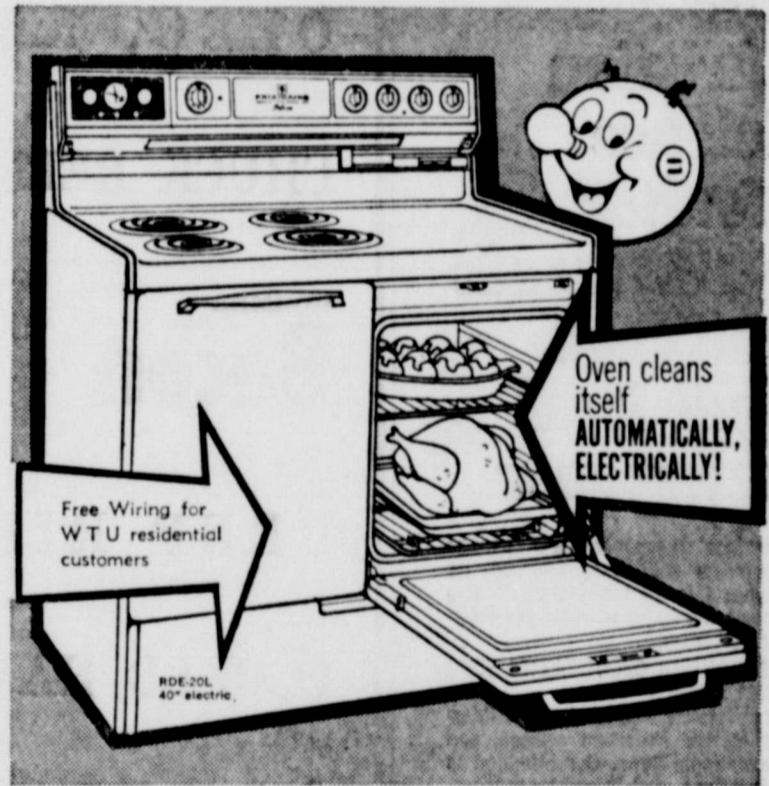

However, if the Signal should be a symptom of cancer, the patient has a much better chance of survival and cure if he heeds the Warning Signal than if he ignores it.

Most Curable

This is based on the fact that cancer is among the most curable of the major killing diseases — if it is found early, and treated promptly and properly.

However, the patient's responsibility for his own health does not end with the Warning Signals. Cancer is often a "silent disease" and does not always give an early warning of its presence. Thus, a patient has a better chance of avoiding the disease by not only knowing the Warnings Signals but by having an annual physical checkup.

Pap and Procto

Through such checkups, many

cancers can be found in their early stages even if the patient has noticed no symptoms. For example, the Pap test can detect cancer of the uterus before the symptom of bleeding. A "procto" examination of the rectum and lower bowel can find cancers when they are still very early.

Thus, the best insurance against cancer is—see your doctor regularly, and learn Cancer's Warning Signals.

Cancer In Children

More school children die of cancer than of any other disease. Cancer took the lives of about 5,000 youngsters under the age of 15 in 1966. Almost half of them died of leukemia, cancer of the blood-forming tissue. A contribution to the American Cancer Society will help support research in leukemia and other childhood cancers.
