3 High School Students Qualify For State Meet

Bronte High School battled 1000 in literary participation in the regional meet held last weekend at Big Spring. Gary Stroebel was the only Bronte entry and he took first place honors in the science contest. The win got him a spot in the state UIL meet which will be held in Austin May 5 and 6. Two track team members also qualified for state competition when they took second place at regional. Brian Richards won second in shot put with a toss of

49 feet 10 3/4 inches. Doug McCutchen's discus throw of 137 feet and 3/4 inch won him a second place spot. David Holubec of Paint Rock won top spot in both events.

Bronte's 440 relay team won third with a time of 45.5. Team members are Gary Allen, David Glenn, Doug McCutchen and Manfred Thompson with Mason Glenn as alternate. Davis Corley won fourth in the high jump.

Golfers Take Second

Bronte's golf team came out second in the regional meet, losing to Robert Lee.

In the 36 hole affair, the local lads had a total of 719 strokes to Robert Lee's 713. Socorro was third with 724.

T. Hamilton of Loraine was medalist with a 155, and Keith McCutchen of Bronte tied L. Padilla of Socorro for runner-up honors with a 166.

Members of the Bronte team were McCutchen, Steve Williams, Charles Masterson and Bob Bell.

The local team was in the lead at the end of the first 18 holes, 345 to Robert Lee's 349, but was wrecked on the second day's 18 hole round when Robert Lee chalked up 364 to Bronte's 374.

Coach Clint Low said 10 teams were entered in the golf contest.

Mayor Attends WTCC Meeting

Mayor and Mrs. Royce Lee returned to Bronte late Tuesday after spending a couple of days in Del Rio, where they attended sessions of the annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Lee, who is a director of the regional chamber, was on the program, and presented a talk on "the role of leadership in building the small community."

A study of small towns and their problems was the theme of the session, and a complete report of the work done by the Small Town Task Force, at work during most of the past year, was released.

A new project of the WTCC was set up Tuesday when STEP (Small Towns Economic Progress) was created. The program's aim is to improve economic, cultural and educational conditions in small towns.

Outgoing president John Ben Sheppard summed up the key idea of the project when he said "The small town must be preserved as the last citadel of gracious living, neighborliness and close friendships based upon intimate knowledge of the hope, dreams and ambitions of one another."

Don Wooten of Abilene was elected to succeed Sheppard as president.

Large Crowd Goes On Historical Tour Of Coke County

A large crowd of history enthusiasts from Mitchell and Runnels counties took a tour of some of the interesting historical sights of Coke County Sunday afternoon.

The group met at the County Park in Robert Lee at 2 p.m. when the tour started. Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, president of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee, assisted by Mrs. C. E. Arrott and Ben Oglesby, conducted the group on the trip, which started at the courthouse and ended at Fort Chadbourne in the northeast corner of the county.

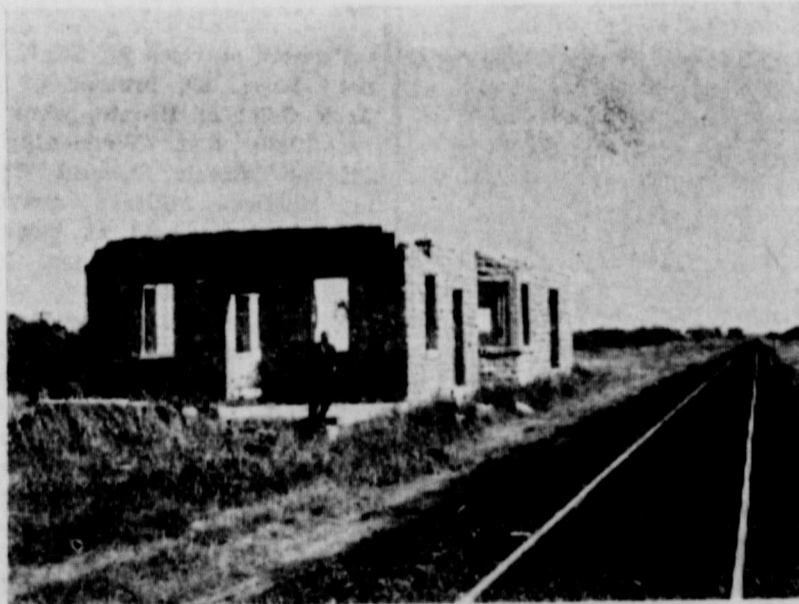
Rankin Pace, chairman of his county group, headed the Runnels County delegation, while Mitchell County chairman Mrs. Witt Hines headed the group from her county.

After looking at the courthouse and inspecting the historical marker on the square, the group drove along the River Road to look at the home of Mrs. John Brown, which was built by her late husband out of stone from the old Coke County courthouse.

Circling around through the new addition of Robert Lee just off the Colorado City highway, the caravan then headed out of town on Highway 158. The first stop after leaving Robert Lee was the roadside park east of town which has a historical marker erected at the site.

The next stop was Hayrick. The group drove into the Hayrick

Rocks, Wire, Etc. Not For Barrels

Bill Luckett, city water superintendent, said this week that in making his rounds reading water meters, he noticed that many Bronte residents are putting rocks, wire, and other heavy objects in their trash barrels, making them extremely difficult to handle.

The city council has instructed the city trash hauler not to hold off heavy objects of this kind. Local residents are asked to cooperate by not filling their barrels with waste matter of this type. In the future, barrels containing heavy and hard to handle objects will not be emptied, it was noted.

Special arrangements with private payment can be made to have heavy trash hauled, however.

Paper and other trash should be burned, also, Luckett said.

AD-LIB-BEN

Supt. C. B. Barbee supplied us with a sheet which shows some interesting figures about finances of Bronte School District. The sheet is entitled "Twelve Year Study of Economic Indexes, Local Fund Assignments and Valuations," which is a little awesome. Nevertheless, the figures give some information which is worth knowing, and compares various items from 1956-57 through 1967-68.

The first columns show county valuations, then there are a couple of columns which have to do with fund assignments toward the state foundation program, about which we are a little fuzzy.

Then comes the last column, which was the one we thought particularly significant. It contains a list of the school district's tax valuation, and shows that the 1967-68 values will be \$8,400,000, the highest figure on the sheet.

We feel that this increase in tax values is a good omen for our school. Coupled with the increase in enrollment which has been enjoyed this year, it looks to us as an indication that things are once again on the upgrade. And, with the recently completed school facilities, things look even better.

Whatever your feelings are on the matter, the time is going to be changed; if you happen to be one of those hardy souls who refuses to set your clock up an hour, you'd better remember it, in case you want to catch a train, attend a meeting or get your child to school.

Coke County District Enters Contest; To Observe Soil Stewardship Week

Coke County Soil Conservation District has entered the 21st annual Goodyear competition to select the nation's top 53 conservation districts according to M. C. Hendry, Silver, district chairman.

Activities of the district will be weighed against the performance of other districts in the state in determining the outstanding district in the annual event sponsored by the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company of Akron Ohio.


Key agricultural leaders will serve as judges and will select the state winner. Soil conservation efforts from January 1, 1967, through December 31, 1967, will be considered.

Grand award for the 53 dis-

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tricts selected nationally will be an expense paid, work-study trip to Arizona in December, 1968, for one member of the district governing body and the outstanding farmer-cooperator in each winning district. The 106 men selected will be guests at Goodyear Farms a 14000 acre general farm operation near Phoenix.

Coke County district has taken part in the competition four times in the past. District Supervisors are Hendry, D. K. Glenn, Weldon Fikes, J. W. Service and Joe Rawlings.

Hendry said the district's outstanding cooperator will be selected from over the 389 farm operators enrolled in the district program. Nationally over 2,000,000 farmers in over 2,950 districts have signed cooperative agreements with local Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Cemetery and inspected some of the old grave markers, especially those known that have historical significance in this area.
