Jacoby Announces USDA Assistance In Promotion Of Nation's Rural Areas

W. E. Jacoby Chairman of the Coke County Technical Action Panel said today the Department of Agriculture had instructed its rural development specialists to

"end the migration of rural people to large cities by helping small communities revitalize themselves."

Jacoby said instructions had been sent by Assistant Secretary John A. Baker to all the field staffs of USDA agencies urging them to expand efforts to:

... Provide assistance to multi-county planning and development groups.

... Extend services and benefits to all Federal agencies in rural areas.

... Help rural communities make economic development plans and secure services needed to carry out the plans.

The Assistant Secretary's action emphasized the importance of the Technical Action Panels that the Secretary of Agriculture has ordered established in each State and the approximately 3,000 rural counties to work with local community development organizations.

"Basically, what the department is doing," Baker explains, is realigning and fortifying its field offices to insure that rural communities do not miss out on help available from any source in their development programs.

"We have established a 'one-stop' service concept in every rural county to enable local lead-

Oak Creek Lake has plenty of water in it, according to officials of the City of Sweetwater, owner of the lake. They reported that recent rains added 2.57 feet of water to the lake. This puts the water mark only 6.46 feet below the spillway.

The City of Bronte's water usage is increasing daily, according to Bill Luckett, water superintendent. He said the city is pumping an average of 200,000 gallons or more from the lake each day.

◆ Agreed to replace windows in the homemaking department, awarding a contract to Powell Glass & Mirror of San Angelo.

◆ Approved a school calendar for the 1967-68 school year.

◆ Approved the granting to local teachers the full state salary increase which was recently enacted by the Texas legislature.

◆ Approved the changing of the date of their July meeting from the 13th to the 6th, since most teachers will be engaged in a Small Schools Workshop on the original date.

◆ Approved the addition of five courses to next year's curriculum: Homemaking III, Spanish II, Typing II and the addition of another section in chemistry and biology.

Barbee said the addition of new teachers brings the faculty up to full force for the next school year, unless there are resignations. Two additional teachers were possible, since the faculty operated one teacher short last school year, and the average daily attendance of last school year increased enough to allow Bronte School one more teacher.

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Coke Citizens Receive \$376,740 Social Security

\$376,740.00 in social security benefits was paid to residents of Coke County last year, up 14.5 percent from the year before.

At the end of 1966, 516 men, women, and children were receiving benefits at a monthly rate of \$31,395.00, Ted F. Moellering, social security district manager in San Angelo, reported today. "436 were older people," he said, "receiving benefits as retired workers, the wives and husbands of retired workers and as the surviving widows or aged dependent parents of workers who have died."

But social security is not just for older people, Moellering pointed out. 40 young widows and children in Coke County were receiving monthly benefits amounting to \$2,582.00 at the end of December. 40 disabled workers and dependents were receiving benefits at a monthly rate of \$26-76. Practically every young family in Coke County has survivors protection under social security that can be worth \$75,000 or more, and equally valuable disability insurance protection.

"The average worker," he said, "can expect to collect more than the value of his social security tax contributions just in the benefits payable to him and his wife in retirement." If he does not live to retirement, his family stands to collect far more than the contributions he has paid; and the same will be true if he should become totally disabled for work before 65.

Boecking On Board Navy Assault Ship

Navy Ensign Charls T. Boecking, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie C. Boecking of Bronte, took part in an amphibious assault near the "demilitarized zone" (DMZ) which divides North and South Vietnam, while serving aboard the command ship USS St. Paul.

As part of an operation named "Beau Charger", his ship helped put a special landing force of U. S. Marines into southern buffer area of the "DMZ", for a search and destroy sweep through the free zone just south of the Ben Hai River. The Marines were

landed by small boat as well as by helicopter.

The Leathernecks who made the sweep are Marines of the First Battalion, Third Marine Regiment, who first evacuated the South Vietnamese civilians from the area before beginning the sweep.

While "Beau Charger" was under way, pilots from U. S. aircraft carriers in the South China Sea and Tonkin Gulf flew air strikes over the area, and attacked targets indicated by the ground forces below.

School Officials Outline Lunchroom Policies Designed To Avoid Deficit

Bronte School lunchroom ran in the red last year and school board members and administrators have worked out a couple of changes which they hope will take care of the deficit without an increase in the price of daily lunches.

Supt. C. B. Barbee issued a statement regarding the deficiency and the changes which will be instituted beginning with the 1967-68 school term.

Main changes in policy will be: (1) a reduction in lunchroom personnel from four to three; and (2) lunchroom tickets will be sold on a monthly basis and will be punched each day (paying for a meal) whether or not the student eats. Only exception is when a student is absent from school he will not be required to pay for a meal.

Barbee issued the following statement for publication in this week's Enterprise:

"In bringing to a close its study of the lunchroom operation, the Board of Trustees, at its June 8 meeting, introduced some changes in the operation of the lunchroom program for 1967-68.

In March the Board approved the transfer of \$675 from the local maintenance fund to compensate for a deficit operation. The lunchroom's operating at a deficit was attributable to two main factors: (1) increased food costs and (2) decrease in amount of government commodities received.

"Some increases in the food costs were noted as follows: (1) Milk increased one-fourth cent per carton for white and three-fourths cent per carton for chocolate. (2) Cost of potatoes increased 27%. (3) Cost of sugar increased 5½%. (4) Cost of green beans increased 17%.

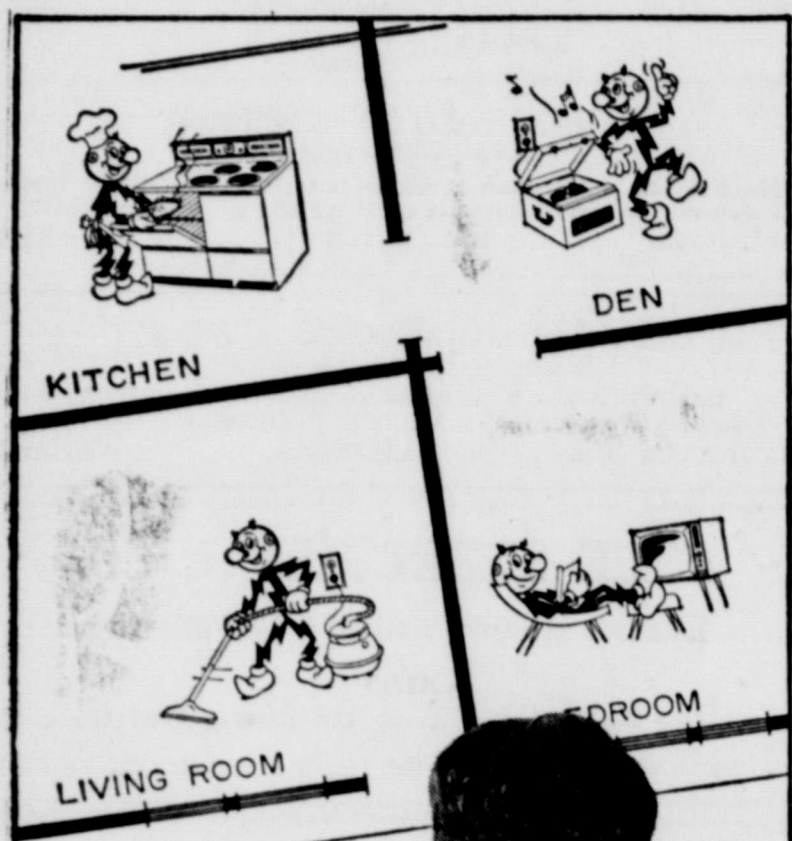

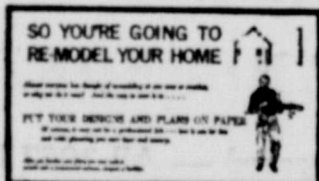

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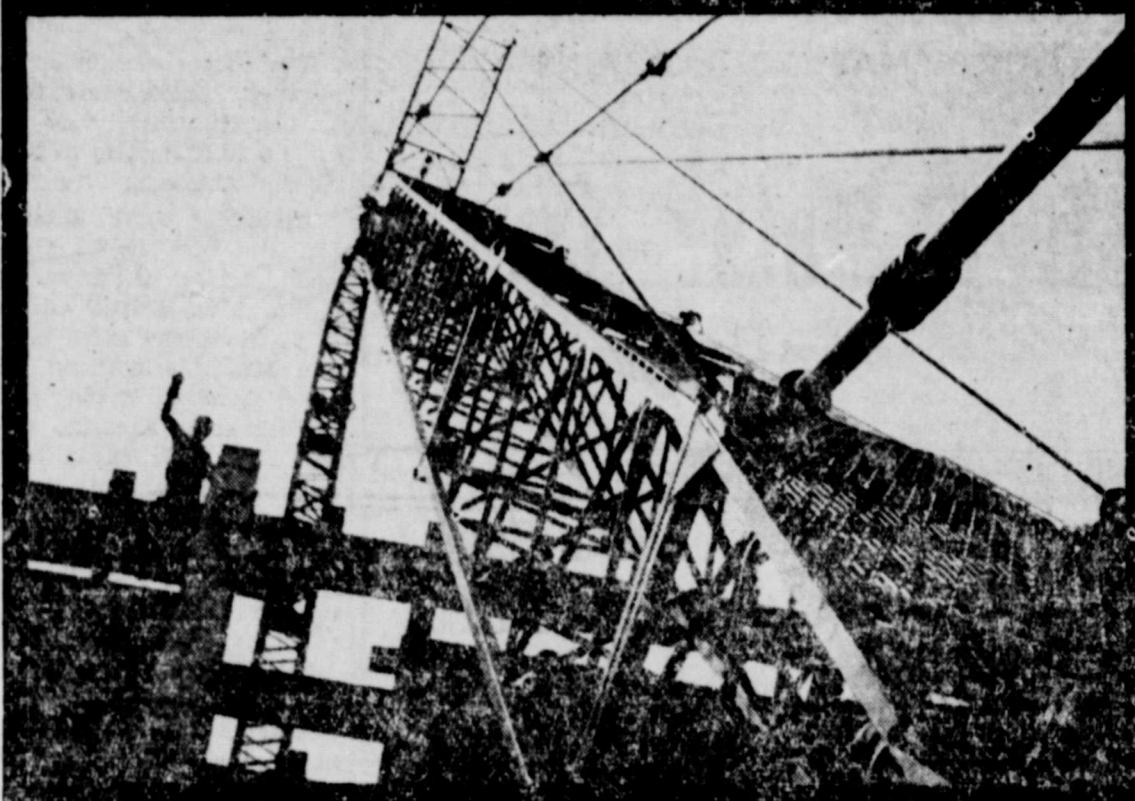
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GOING UP...
