### Gerald Parker Receives Promotion From Army

FT. BLISS, TEX. — (AHTNC) — Gerald F. Parker, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse M. Parker of Bronte, was promoted to Army private pay grade E-2 upon completion of basic combat training at Ft. Bliss, Tex., July 28.

The promotion was awarded two months earlier than is customary under an Army policy providing incentive for outstanding trainees.

As many as half the trainees in each training cycle are eligible for the early promotion, based on scores attained during range firing, high score on the physical combat proficiency test, military bearing and leadership potential.

During advanced individual training, also of eight weeks duration, those who received early advancement to E-2 may be eligible for another "accelerated" promotion, to E-3 (private first class).

### New Lunchroom Rules Announced

A new set of policies for Bronte School lunchroom has been drawn up and will be effective at the start of the 1967-68 school term. Prices of each meal will remain the same as last year, 35 cents for students in grades 1-6 and 40 cents for those in grades 7-12.

The main change in the setup will be that students will buy lunchroom tickets for an entire calendar month and will be charged for the meal whether or not they eat. The only exception to the latter rule is that a student will not be charged if he is absent from school.

Lunches on a day at a time basis will be available at 60 cents each.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said that a deficit in last year's operation prompted a change in rules. Another saving, he said, will result from cutting lunchroom employees from four to three.

Prices for a monthly ticket will vary according to the number of school days it covers. For example, a ticket for the first month of school, from Aug. 28 to Sept. 29, will cover 24 days and will cost a first grader \$8.40, at the rate of 35 cents per day. The same ticket will cost a high school senior \$9.60 at the rate of 40 cents a day.

Another example, in December, when there will be only 16 school days, tickets will cost only \$5.60 and \$6.40. Extra cartons of milk will be charged at the rate of three cents each.

Henry, vocational agriculture; Miss Linda Jones, commercial-English; Clint A. Low, math; Keith D. Noe, science; Charles H. Taylor, Spanish-English; Cecil Toliver, science-P. Noe, Taylor and Walter are all new additions to the faculty, and bring it up to the school's full allotment of teachers.

### New Driving Laws Told For Vehicle Operator in Texas

A new set of ground rules for the state 5½ million licensed drivers will go into effect August 28 when a major portion of the new traffic safety laws become effective. After that date, conviction of driving while a driver's license is suspended or revoked will carry with it a jail sentence of 72 hours to 6 months plus a fine of \$25 to \$500.

Motorists who do not bother to get a driver's license will be faced with fines up to \$500 plus the possibility of jail sentences ranging from 72 hours to 6 months for habitual violators.

### New License Age

New minimum driver licensing ages will become effective August 28. After Monday, 18 years will be the minimum age for a regular drivers license unless an approved course of driver education has been passed by the applicant. With driver education, operators licenses can be issued at 16.

There are two exceptions to this provision. A license may be issued at 16 if an approved course of driver education is not taught at the school regularly attended by the applicant. This exception was put into the law to give the schools an opportunity to offer driver education to all Texas teens and will remain in effect until June 1, 1969. A license may be issued at 15 when certain, severe hardships conditions exist.

An instruction permit may be issued by the Department of Public Safety to persons 15 years of age who have satisfactorily completed the classroom phase of an approved driver education course and have passed all but the "behind the wheel" part of the driver license examination. This provision is in the law to permit the beginning driver to legally get "behind the wheel" driver training. When a driver with an instruction permit is driving, a

Refreshments of cold drinks and snow cones were served following the meeting. A few local prospective members were also present for the meeting.

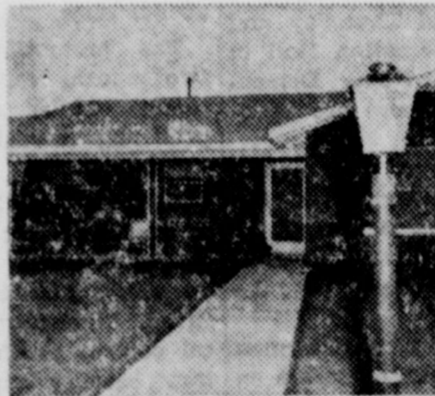
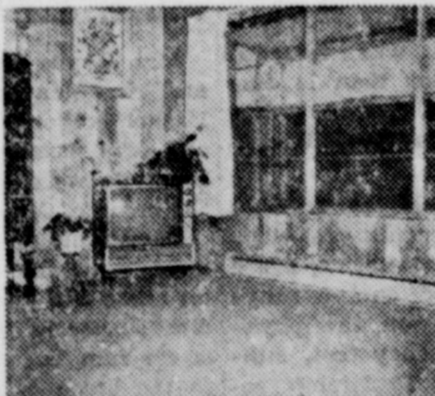
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A CLEAN BREAK WITH THE PAST

Caring for her in an electric comfort-conditioned home is much easier, Mrs. Tracy says. "As you get along in years, drafts and varying temperatures in the winter time are bad. With electric heat, the room stays the same temperature, and there is no dryness like from other heating. And individual room controls allow each of us to select the temperature we like best."

Mr. Tracy is a rancher, and is well known in and around Junction. The Tracys really live in

their home—enjoy it themselves and entertain friends. Mrs. Tracy has cooked electrically for 35 years, and the Tracys have lived in total-electric comfort for two years. The cooling system is ducted-in type, the kitchen total-electric, there is an electric home laundry, water heater and two bath heaters in addition to baseboard heating. The home is of brick construction—6 rooms and two baths—and the average per month cost is only \$26.20. "Electric living is so much less expensive than I ever thought," Mrs. Tracy says.

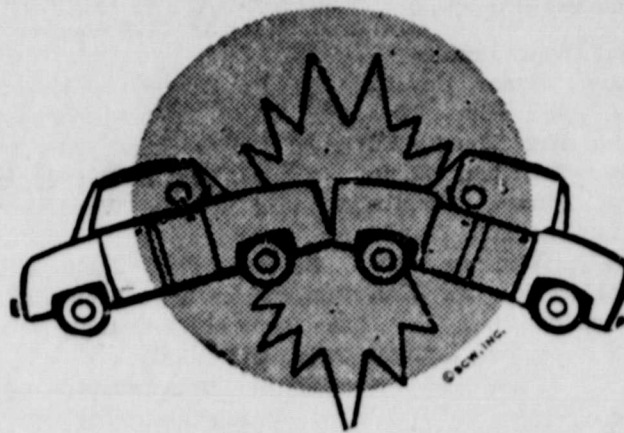

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## Local Ranchmen Named To Head Drive For Rehabilitation Center At Abilene

D. K. Glenn, Ed Cumbie, J. L. Brunson and Conda Wylie, of Bronte have been appointed area co-chairmen of the 1967 Cattleman's Round - Up for Crippled Children.

The announcement was made by Charlie Morris of Abilene, general chairman of the Round-Up, the chief means of support for the West Texas Rehabilitation Center. Several persons from this area receive free treatment at the WTRC, which has accepted neither state or federal funds during its nearly 14 years of operation.

The area chairmen, supporters of the Round - Up for many years act as the chief link between the Round - Up and the ranchers in their area.

Throughout the years, the WTRC has received valuable support from generous area ranchers who have cut out a head or two of cattle — or other livestock — and donated them to the WTRC for sale at the annual Round -

Up. This year, the Round - Up will be conducted September 25 at Ranchers and Farmers Livestock Auction in Abilene.

During each of the last two years, the Round - Up has raised nearly \$80,000 toward the Center's annual budget of \$260,000. Other operational funds come from memorial contributions and from various United Funds.

The Center provides free treatment, without regard for race, creed, color or financial circumstances, to more than 1,600 patients from far-flung areas.

"We have the WTRC at our disposal only because we cattle-men care," Morris said in emphasizing the need for an especially good Round - Up this year. "The cattlemen of West Texas haven't let us down yet, and we don't expect them to this year."

Any livestock donated to the Round - Up will be transported free of charge to the Abilene auction site, the chairman added. Anyone wishing to donate livestock to the sale should contact his area chairman or the WTRC in Abilene, Morris said.

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## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows:

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that while said Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff, Constable, Deputy Constable or other county or precinct law enforcement official is hospitalized or incapacitated that the county shall continue to pay his maximum salary; providing, however, that said payment of salary shall cease on the expiration of the term of office to which such official was elected or appointed. Provided, however, that no provision contained herein shall be construed to amend, modify, repeal or nullify Article 16, Section 31, of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November

11, 1967, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

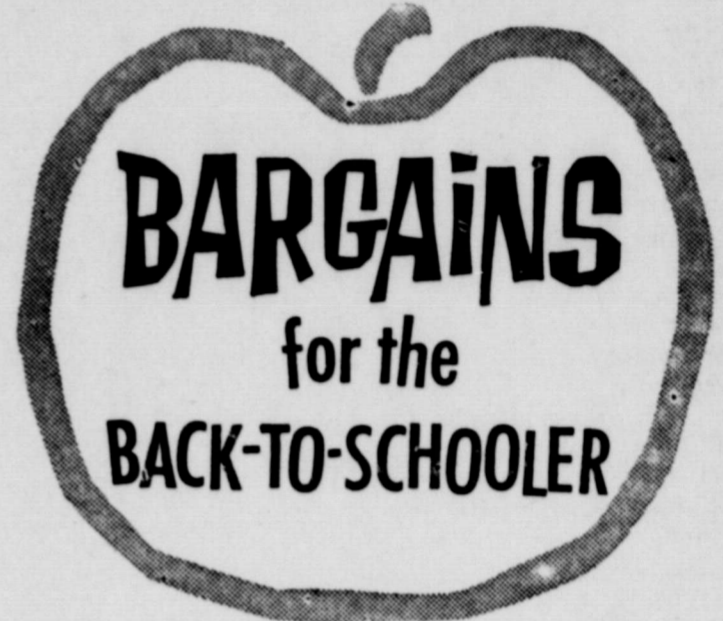

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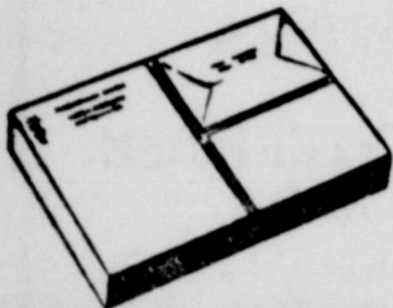
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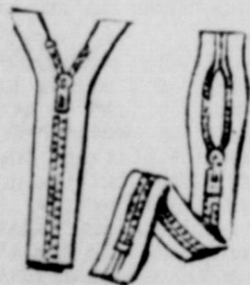

licensed operator who is at least 21 years old must accompany and sit beside him.

The new law makes changes in other types of driver licenses. Minimum age for a commercial or chauffeur's license will be 18 unless the applicant has completed an approved driver education course and in that case it will be 17.

Provisional drivers licenses will be issued to all persons under 21 years of age. These licenses will be clearly designated as provisional permits to drive.

The new law permits the Department of Public Safety to have re-examined any person believed to be incapable of safely operating a motor vehicle. A drivers license may be denied to a person with a physical or mental disability, or disease, that prevents him from exercising reasonable or ordinary control over a motor vehicle. A license may not be issued to a person unable to understand highway wording or direction signs in the English language.

"These new laws will not be worth the paper they are written on if they are not vigorously enforced in every town and county in the State", said Robert Miller President of Texans for Traffic Safety. "Well trained policemen in sufficient number to patrol the streets and highways must

be on the job. We must remember that 3,405 human beings were killed in Texas traffic accidents last year and another 208,310 injured. Traffic law officers can help prevent accidents. Municipal and state budgets must be large enough to provide for the protection Texas needs.

"When the time comes that there is enough manpower on the streets and highways to enforce these laws, there will be fewer accidents, fewer traffic killings and our State will be recognized as the one place where realistic values are placed on the worth of a human life," Mr. Miller stated in urging all-out enforcement of the new laws.

**New Inspection Laws**

Inspection of seat belt accessories, steering mechanisms and wheels and rims are added to the items to be inspected on all Texas vehicles beginning August 28, along with an increased minimum fee of \$1.75 for inspections.

The new items were added to the inspection law by the last legislature and the Department of Public Safety has instructed all vehicle inspection stations in regard to the type of inspection to be made on each item.

The amendment becomes effective August 28, thus accounting for the early inspection date. Inspections for the 1968 sticker will continue until April 15, the usual deadline.

Under the new law, front seat belts are required on every motor

vehicle in which seat belt anchorages are a part of the manufacturer's original equipment. For most American-made vehicles, the anchorages are standard beginning with 1962 models. The vehicles may be rejected during the inspection if: (1) the seat belts are not installed, (2) the belts are unsafe or unserviceable from wear or damage, (3) the attachment fittings are damaged or loose, or (4) the buckles are loose or inoperative.

Steering will be checked on all vehicles, including those with power steering. Vehicles are to be rejected if: (1) the steering wheel has more than two inches of lash measured on the outside periphery of the rim (lash is defined as the condition in which the steering control can be turned through some part of a revolution without front wheel motion), (2) if it is impossible to turn the wheel from full right to full left without jamming, or (3) if the fluid in the power steering is below the recommended level. Vehicles with power steering are to be checked with power on.

Wheels and rims are to be inspected without being removed from the vehicle. The vehicle will be rejected if: (1) the wheel has defective or bent rim flanges, or loose or missing bolts, nuts or lugs, or (2) rims have defects and cracks to the extent that they might impair the safe mounting and proper retention of tires. There are approximately 5500

vehicle inspection stations in Texas, and each displays the official vehicle inspection station sign. Motorists are urged to have their vehicles inspected during the routine visits to garages and stations for ordinary maintenance, thus insuring that their vehicle is mechanically safe to operate over the streets and highways.

## Cooking With Instant Flour

Beware of instant flour. There is more in the cup than meets the eye.

When baking with instant flour, take 2 level tablespoons out of each cup of flour called for by the recipe.

A full measure of instant flour in a cake or cookie recipe, designed for regular flour, may alter the shape, texture and flavor of the final product.

Instant flour is processed with steam or hot water after regular milling to make tiny granules stick together as larger particles. This takes up less space in a measuring cup. Therefore, instant flour mixes more readily with water without forming lumps and is a handy product for making gravy.

In baking, instant flour weighs more pre cup and takes up liquid faster than regular flour, leaving too much flour for the dough in relation to the liquid.

For example, in popovers, the batter doesn't contain enough for the product to "pop" properly.

The Agriculture Research Service suggests improving the taste and appearance of pastry by adding more fat to the dough. Some companies making instant flour suggests that extra fat be added to the product to help overcome the tendency of instant flour to soak up water.

Although a little extra fat helps, researchers warn that adding extra water to the dough is no solution. This destroys the proper balance between ingredients and tends to ruin the baked product.

## Surplus Calories Not From Potatoes Alone

No, potatoes aren't fattening. No food is fattening until your body's need for calories has been met. Surplus food from any source is changed to fat and stored in the body.

One medium - sized potato, 5 ounces, supplies 90 calories. This is about the same as a medium - sized apple, pear, grapefruit or orange, none of which is considered a high - calorie food.

Added fat and gravy, often served with potatoes, do increase the calorie count considerably. For example, fried potatoes may be two to three times as high in calories as the same weight of boiled or baked potatoes. And the sour cream or butter or margarine added to the baked potato for tastiness also add up in the calorie category.

But, it's not the potatoes that add pounds, it's the surplus calories from other sources.

## Home Economic Tips Cleaners With Cleaning In Mind

Different cleaners do different jobs. The upright is best for large areas of rugs or wall to wall carpets. Choose the canister for general housecleaning, corners, stairs, bare floors and "about the floor" cleaning chores. Light-weight vacuum cleaners, such as the stick and hand vac, come in handy for cleaning hard - to - reach places, such as car interiors and draperies.

## Bamboo Boom

Bamboo, a material which has intrigued decorators for centuries, is invading the furniture scene

with success. Home furnishings are featuring the tropic material in complete room settings, as well as accent pieces. As a rule, real bamboo is not used, since the plant is basically a hollow stem. But woods, brass, chrome and even painted plastic are giving the bamboo look, creating a distinctive atmosphere.

Fall will see belts back in the fashion picture, worn for any and all occasions. Women can again show their waistlines, circled by one to three - inch creations. Grained, waxy or split cowhide styles accessories a casual costume; jeweled interpretations are for dress - up. ## Relay Station Will Be Built At Bronte

Construction of a radio relay station near Bronte is scheduled to begin in early October, according to K. L. Hillard, Supervising Engineer with the Kansas City Long Lines Department of the American Telephone & Telegraph Company. As part of the Bell System's expanding long distance network, the station will be one of thirteen, spaced about 30 miles apart, on the San Antonio - Sweetwater segment of the Denver - San Antonio radio relay route.

The station will consist of a building, approximately 1625 square feet in size, at the base of a 300 foot tower. The tower, to be erected in late February, 1968, will be a self-supporting steel structure shoudering four horn - shaped antennas.

Initially, the relay station will have one message channel, providing a capacity of 1,200 voice circuits. When ultimately expanded to full operation, the addition of four message channels will increase the station's circuits capacity to 6,000.

Besides the working channel, an alternate channel will be kept in reserve for immediate use should the operating channel fail. This safeguard will insure uninterrupted service.

The tower's horn - shaped antennas will be used in transmitting microwave signals. Messages carrying microwaves, super high frequency radio waves, travel through the air from tower to tower until they reach their destination. At each tower the microwaves

are picked up by an antenna and sent to the building at the base of the tower to be amplified. Then, they are sent back to the top of the tower where another antenna beams them toward the next tower.

The tentative completion date for the San Antonio - Sweetwater route is mid - June, 1968. The service date is scheduled for the following month.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows:

"Section 13. Notwithstanding any other section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities or services or the operation of such community mental health or mental retardation centers within the boundaries of the hospital districts; and unless a statute creating a hospital district shall expressly prohibit participation by any entity

other than the hospital district in the establishment, maintenance, or support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities within or partly within the boundaries of any hospital district, any municipality or any other political subdivision or state-supported entity within the hospital district may participate in the establishment, maintenance, and support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units and clinics and related public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such purposes as provided by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold

any other office or position of profit under this state, or the United States."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

ize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife De-

partment, or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."
